

Dear Parishioners,

"Give me the benefit of the doubt" is both fitting and timely not only because we hear of the doubting Thomas within the Gospel for this weekend but also because we might be overwhelmed with that sense of doubt during this pandemic. Did you ever wonder what that really means? Let us just pull apart, explore and expound upon that phrase.

"Give me the benefit of the doubt" seems to imply that one should give the "benefit" that is to say, "Give the advantage – give the profit – give the "opportunity" of the "Doubt" that is – "The uncertainty, the question, the indecisiveness, the suspicion, the bewilderment" to the party in question. In other words, "Give the opportunity of your uncertainty the chance to be proven certain."

At the very least, in the Gospel, Thomas gave Jesus the "benefit of the doubt." Thomas did not vehemently reject and utterly refute the possibility that Jesus had been raised from the dead. After all, Thomas was among the twelve when Jesus taught them all about the Kingdom of God and when he foretold of his impending suffering, death, and his ultimate rising from the dead. Thomas knew of the master plan or "The Master's Plan." He did not denounce it completely. He merely doubted it conditionally.

Thomas's condition is spelled out in the Gospel, "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands and put my finger into the nail marks and put my hand into his side, I will not believe." And, as the story continues, Jesus appears one week later and invites Thomas to probe his hands and his side. Jesus also invited Thomas not to persist in his unbelief but to believe. Thomas is to dispel the darkness of his doubts and live in the light of faith.

During these days of pandemic panic when we are engaged in social distancing and self-isolation, it is all too easy for us to start questioning the benevolence of God and the presence of the Risen Jesus in our midst. This is especially true when we witness those who knowingly hoard supplies and harass authorities by disregarding their efforts to mitigate the virus. The lack of civility during this time of unrest is disturbing and the disrespect for the "good of the other" is saddening. Doubt may be circulating in the hearts and minds of many as to whether or not God is alive in those whom He has come to save.

It is important to look for the good in the midst of the bad. Good will always prevail because God will always prevail. See the presence of God in those who tend to the victims of the virus. Sense the love of Jesus in those who smile and wave to others through windows. Feel the power of the Holy Spirit as it compels you to use your common sense to stay home as a way to care for others. Do not persist in your unbelief but believe. Dispel the darkness of your doubt and live in the light of faith where we all say together, "My Lord and My God."
