DEAR PARISH FAMILY,

First, I would like to give you an update on one piece of news regarding the parish and follow that up with a reflection on Scriptures.

No Associate Pastor: I regret to inform you that Resurrection Parish will not be receiving an associate pastor this next year. As it was, we were to have been blessed with welcoming a newly ordained priest, Nick Radloff, on July 14. Unfortunate circumstances have arisen in the archdiocese concerning the health and well-being of one of our active pastors. Therefore, the future Fr. Nick Radloff has been reassigned to become a pastor in this priest’s place. The archbishop expressed his remorse to me about not having a priest available to serve with me at Resurrection. The parish staff and pastoral council are aware of this and we are in the process of discerning how to fill in this void for this coming year.

Thus, my following Scripture reflection...

“The Lord giveth and the Lord taketh away; blessed be the name of the Lord.”

Job 1:21 King James version

All humor aside (and please forgive me as I use humor to help me deal with the stress in my life) this phrase, at least the first part of this phrase, is often used all too flippantly as an expression related to “Easy come, easy go.” Or, sometimes it can be misinterpreted and be posed as a challenge to the benevolence of God as a higher being that intentionally and insensitively removes a prized possession – like a bully that forcefully takes away a favorite toy from a child.

Rather, it is meant to express our stance toward the transience of life’s benefits. It serves as a good stewardship message, helping us realize that all that we have is of God as a benefit to “Me and We,” and should be returned to God as a blessing unto “Thee.” How often have we taken for granted our good health, good fortune, good relationships and a good life and lived out those benefits selfishly? Blessed as we are, how often have we failed to give due praise and thanks to our God who has entrusted these blessings to us to be used for the greater good of others and God’s Holy Church? And then, soon enough *and sometimes surprisingly*, they are gone. Then, how do we think of God? Then, how do we feel about God?

The latter part of the phrase, “blessed be the name of the Lord” implies that without ever blaming God for the trials or tests that we encounter in this life, we are to forever bless God as the One who is the origin of our life and the One who is the ultimate destiny to which we hope to return.

Within the context of the Scripture passage Job, who was upright and blameless before God, undergoes a series of “trials” established by a challenge issued forth from Satan. Satan insists that the reasoning behind Job’s unwavering faithfulness is the fact that Job has always enjoyed a life of blessing and plenty, rather than had a life subjected to hardship and want. God allows these trials to happen wherein Job loses everything pertaining to his fame, fortune, and even family. Yet, Job endures in his faithfulness and does not say anything disrespectful of God. Job gives meaning to the phrase, “Whatever doesn’t kill you, makes you stronger.” In his case, stronger in faith.

In this life don’t you believe that we are subjected to “trials” sometimes attributed to circumstance or other times perhaps orchestrated by Satan? And, don’t you believe that they are permitted by God to test our faithfulness? During those times of “testing” are we, as was Job, unwavering and forever faithful to God? Or do we have a tendency to gravitate toward despair and say things disrespectful to God?

Within the context of this season of Easter and as we celebrate the Ascension of the Jesus as He returns to the Father in Heaven, I wonder if that iconic phrase ever comes to our minds, “The Lord giveth and the Lord taketh away: blessed be the name of the Lord?” We received Jesus as such a great gift through the incarnation being born into the world on the night of the Nativity to show us the light and the love of God. He taught us through his words and actions how to love and serve each other. Through his passion, death and resurrection, Jesus has reestablished our right relationship to God as beloved sons and daughters who are recipients of eternal redemption through baptism and God’s grace. And now, He ascends into heaven to sit at the right hand of the Father in heaven where we hope to join Him someday. This is cause for rejoicing!

As chagrined as I am, and perhaps you are, with the news about not getting an associate pastor at Resurrection for this next year, I ask that you please rejoice with the Archdiocese of Dubuque as we are blessed to receive Nick Radloff as a newly ordained priest. I ask

that you please rejoice with the parishes he has been assigned to serve as they are getting a healthy priest to serve as their new pastor. I ask that you please renew your commitment to this parish as good stewards of your gifts of time, talent and treasure. And finally, I ask that you please help me to pray and say in a new and positive way, "The Lord giveth, the Lord taketh away; blessed be the name of the Lord."
