DEAR PARISHIONERS,

The 2022 Winter Olympics are rapidly approaching in Beijing, China. Considering some of the tensions in play over there and the continuation of Covid, let us all pray for the safety and success of the Olympics that are only weeks away from February 4-20. Of the many events in the Winter Olympics, I would like to call your attention to is Snowboarding.

There are six events in the Olympic competition of snowboarding and the one I want to focus on with you is called the "Half-Pipe." The half pipe gets its name from the course's shape, a half-cylinder that looks like a huge pipe cut down its length. The goal of half pipe is for the snowboarder to perform complicated and acrobatic tricks, all while maintaining perfect form. To do this, the snowboarder uses the half pipe and its engineering to gather speed and perform those tricks. Most of those tricks take place above the walls and feature jumps, twists and rotations set to music chosen by the snowboarder.

So, with a combination of kinetic inertia, angular impulse, momentum, extreme bravado and a good dose of artistic flare the snowboarder does what is known as "pumping the half-pipe." They perform the routine moving from the beginning edge of the half pipe to the other end, all the while, shooting up over the sides 15-20 feet high performing these amazing and miraculous acrobatic moves.

Now, I am sure you are asking yourselves the question, "Why is father referring to snowboarding and what does it have to do with the scripture on the feast day of the Baptism of the Lord?" If you would please remember the image of the snowboarder "pumping the half-pipe" as we consider the actions of Jesus at his baptism and throughout his mission among us, I think we could make a vivid comparisons and connections. At least, I hope we can.

Jesus enters into the waters baptism. Like a snowboarder, he goes down off the bank of the river. He plunges in — not for the sake of being washed from Sin, since he is sinless, but because he begins his ministry to the people of God. He enters into the depths of our human condition to save us. And, with divine momentum, he comes up from the water and on top of the river bank on the other side to be greeted by the Spirit of God and recognized by a voice from heaven that said, "This is my beloved Son with whom I am well pleased." But it doesn't stop there!

Jesus continues his ministry by returning to the significance of his baptism. He remains committed to experiencing the reality of our humanity. He returns to the depth of our human misery and with energy, bravado and flare he comes out the other side performing miracles. He enters into the "half-pipe of our human condition," and according to the scriptures, he does it in progressively profound and spectacular ways.

Remember his first miracle? It was the wedding at Cana wherein he enters a human situation which was troubling and transformed it by changing water into wine. But that's only the first and that's nothing compared to the other miracles he performed. We remember the numerous times he entered into the sorrows and the sufferings of those in need of healing and came out the other side performing miracles of restoration and reconciliation. We remember how he entered into the hunger of a vast crowd (5000) and had felt pity for them. As a result, there was the miracle of the multiplication of loaves and fish. We remember how he entered into the depth of our human grief as he, himself, wept at the death of his friend Lazarus and after four days in the tomb Jesus, in a miraculous move resuscitates him and restores him to life.

All along the way, people are spell-bound and awestruck by his moves. They are wondering, "Who is this guy and were does he get his powers?" Every time Jesus does a miracle we need to recall his baptism and the image of him initially coming out on top of the opposite bank and then being recognized as God's beloved with whom God is well pleased. And for his grand finale during his final days with us, we remember him entering into the extreme depths of our human halfpipe, the darkness of our sin and the shadow of his own death. But we know he breaks through the other side rising up to perform the greatest miracle of all - his resurrection and his ascension into heaven which was a true gold medal moment.

He did this not to impress us but to inspire us to follow him. He calls us to continuously and consistently "die to ourselves so that we might rise up with him." By the grace of our baptism we are, indeed, washed from original sin but, at the same time, we are initiated into his Church and invited to continue his mission among the people of God. That means that we need strap on a snowboard ourselves; get into the half-pipe of the human condition and "pump it."

It is fundamental to our Christian identity and essential to the integrity of our baptism that we not stay on the sideline just looking over the ledge but take courage and enter into the depth of the human misery before us in order to transform it and become part of the miracle on the other side. Too many of us fail to recognize the significance of our baptismal calling. Too many of us remain complacent, distant and/or distracted from embracing our responsibilities as disciples of Jesus Christ.

In order for us to really understand and appreciate the gift of our salvation that comes through Jesus Christ, we must enter more fully into the human condition mindful of God's love for us. Only with, in and through Jesus, by the grace of our baptism, can we have the kinetic inertia; extreme bravado and divine dose of artistic flare to make some miraculous moves. And when we come through the other side in our upward relationship with God, perhaps we will sense that same Spirit of God that descended upon Jesus? Perhaps we will hear similar words from the heavens say to us, "Behold, this is my beloved one with whom I am well pleased."
