

**DEAR PARISHIONERS,**

The main purpose of Daylight-Saving Time (called "Summer Time" in many places) is to make better use of daylight. A poll conducted by the U.S. Department of Transportation indicated that Americans like Daylight Saving Time because, "there is more light in the evenings and we can do more things." The idea of daylight-saving time was first conceived by Benjamin Franklin as he pondered potential ways for people to be more productive in his essay entitled "An Economical Project."

However, this country never really observed this practice until 1918 during the time of WWI for the purpose of fuel conservation. It was then suspended and enacted again 1942 during WWII for the same purpose. This change in our clocks has since evolved into a more permanent practice that is deemed to aid in the conservation of energy.

Following the 1973 oil embargo, the U.S. Congress extended Daylight Saving Time to eight months rather than the normal six months. During that time the Department of Transportation found that observing Daylight Saving Time in March and April saved the equivalent in energy of 10,000 barrels of oil each day – a total of 600,000 barrels in each of those two years of the oil embargo. After the Energy Policy Act of 2005 and set firmly in place in 2007, Daylight Saving Time now starts at 2:00am on second Sunday in March and ends at 2:00am on the first Sunday in November, thereby saving even more energy.

Another benefit attributed to Daylight Saving Time is the fact that it aids in elimination of night time shenanigans. The more daylight we have means the less night life available for trouble. A study by the U.S. Law Enforcement Assistance Administration found the crime was consistently less during periods of Daylight-Saving Time than during comparable standard time periods. Data showed violent crime down 10 to 13 percent. It is clear that for most crimes where darkness is a factor, such as muggings; there are many more incidents after dusk than after dawn. So, light in the evening is most welcomed.

Those facts, being what they are, are still not convincing enough to some people. When that time of the year rolls around, either to spring ahead or fall back, we seem to hear more about the burden of resetting our clocks than we do about the benefits of having more daylight.

People complain and complain about the nuisance and the inconvenience it places upon them as it might make them late to an appointment or disrupt their sleep pattern. For many this has just become an opportunity for a public service announcement on home safety as we are reminded to change the batteries in our home fire and smoke detectors.

In the Gospel of John (12:46), we hear the words of Jesus speaking to us about being the light who dispels the darkness as He said, "I have come to the world as its light, to keep anyone who believes in me from remaining in the dark." Earlier in the same Gospel of John (8:12), we read of him saying, "I am the light of the world. No follower of mine shall ever walk in darkness: no, he shall possess the light of life."

In the Gospel of Luke, we hear of reference given to the Lord as our saving light through the canticle of Zechariah (Luke 1:78-79), "In the tender compassion of our God the dawn from on high will break upon us to shine on those who dwell in darkness and the shadow of death and to guide our feet into the way of peace."

Even in the writing of St. Paul (Romans 13:12) we hear of how that light of Christ should impact us. "The night is far spent; the day draws near. Let us cast off the deeds of darkness and put on the armor of light. Let us live honorably as in daylight; not in carousing and drunkenness, not in sexual excess and lust, not in quarreling and jealousy. Rather, put on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the desires of the flesh."

Even though our liturgical celebration of Easter is five weeks away, we know that the actual Easter event has already historically taken place through the death and resurrection of Jesus. Our Salvation through the risen savior has been accomplished. Many blessings and so many benefits have been bestowed upon us because of this gift. The light of the world; the dawn from on high; this "daylight saving time" in the Easter experience has redeemed us and renewed our relationship with our loving God.

Through our annual Lenten season observances, we are to renew our efforts to subscribe to this faith reality by deliberately casting off the deeds of darkness with the full intention of putting on the armor of light. Unfortunately, we seem to be a people who let those renewed efforts fade because living out our faith in consistency and with firm resolve seems to be considered, by some, as an inconvenience or overly burdensome. Like Daylight Saving Time - living out the Easter promise through our baptismal vocation is seen as more of a nuisance – a burden rather than of great benefit. Every year we risk condemning ourselves through our lack of belief in His word and in His way.

During this second week of Lent when we feel ourselves start to fade in our resolve, I encourage all of us to constantly renew our efforts of putting Jesus before all other things and keep it that way. Let us recommit ourselves on a daily basis to follow Him and remain faithful to Him. Do not remain in the darkness but believe in his word as it has come from God the Father. And, with God's grace may we constantly "spring ahead" in His light and not "fall back" in our own darkness.




### School Year YFF Reminder
