

DEAR PARISHIONERS,

"It's not fair", I screamed at my mom as we stood together in the grocery store aisle. It was the beginning of the classic showdown between a 7-year-old child (me) and the mother. She just told me to put that box of Fruity Pebbles back on the shelf. Fruity Pebbles is a sugared cereal that I had recently been introduced to at my cousin's house.

We never got sugared cereal at home. Growing up on the farm, we were always subjected to the standard cereals like Cheerios, Rice Crispies or Corn Flakes. But it seemed like my cousins in town, my uncle worked for John Deere, always had a wide selection of sugared cereals to choose from as their pantry included Lucky Charms, Cocoa Puffs and my favorite, Fruity Pebbles.

"Mom, it's not fair that our cousins can have all these great and glorious things while we always get stuck with the plain and the simple. Don't we work hard enough on the farm to deserve the good stuff? Aren't we good enough to enjoy the same things?" My mother's response was, "In your opinion it may not be fair, Life is not fair, but it is just the way it is. Others have been gifted and we just have to learn how to live with it even though it may not make any sense."

Only later did I learn the reasons why we never had Fruity Pebbles on the breakfast table. It wasn't because we didn't work hard enough or that we weren't good enough. It was because we couldn't afford it. As a farm family struggling through that time - in the early Seventies - we were getting by with the bare essentials.

In my seven-year-old mind, it wasn't fair and it didn't make sense but it was just the way it was and we learned how to live with it and live through it.

If we take the scriptures into consideration, it seems as though this cry of discontentment "It's not fair" and this note of confusion, "It doesn't make any sense." are issues that are addressed and areas of our lives to which we need to pay attention.

In the gospel the first workers who come into the field and worked all day in the heat of the sun are baffled when the landowner intentionally pays them the same wages as he does those who only worked one hour and hardly even broke a sweat. We can picture them in their bewilderment and we can identify with their frustration as they say "This is not fair. This does not make any sense."

As well as we can identify with the din of the laborers (their uproar and grumbling), we are invited to recognize the design (the divine way) of our God who is good and generous. Please remember that the landowner did not cheat them out of their daily wage. They had agreed to what they had received. However, the laborers presupposed or assumed - based on their own design (the human way) that they worked harder and so deserved more than what they had agreed upon.

God's ways are different than ours. This reality is so eloquently stated in the first reading from the prophet of Isaiah as the Lord says, "For my thoughts are not your thoughts, nor are your ways my ways, says the Lord. As high as the heavens are above the earth, so high are my ways above your ways and my thoughts above your thoughts."

This is a classic lesson in what is known as Theocracy. Theocracy is a system, better known as God's kingdom, in which God rules, God wields the power, God has the authority. As the gospel indicates, the landowner (God) has the freedom to do as He wishes with His own wealth. In His kingdom we are assured to receive what is just and equal but only on God's terms and according to God's design - not ours. So, rather than being overly concerned about our economy we should be mostly concerned with God's economy.

We, particularly as American people, are so used to the idea of Democracy where elected representatives rule, wield the power and have the ultimate authority. In this democracy we are supposedly assured of the equality of rights, equal opportunity and fair treatment based upon our terms and according to our design. In reality, free enterprise and the pursuit of wealth compromises our efforts toward the common good.

Unfortunately, we, in a sense, try to diminish the authority of God and God's ways by equating them with the level of popular opinion or public consensus. It is here that crucial matters of our Catholic faith collide with the current cultural trends.

And, inevitably we hear the cry from some, "It's not fair, It doesn't make any sense." It is here that we are invited to look at the situation more in terms of God's intended design for us through this notion of Theocracy rather than seeing everything as being politically correct and subscribing to the popular trend through the lens of Democracy.
