

DEAR PARISHIONERS,

The Prince and the Pauper is an English-language novel by American author Mark Twain. It was first published in 1881 in Canada before its 1882 publication in the United States. The book represents Twain's first attempt at historical fiction. Set in 1547, the novel tells the story of two young boys who are identical in appearance: Tom Canty, a pauper who lives with his abusive father in Offal Court off Pudding Lane in London and Edward VI of England, son of Henry VIII of England.

The novel begins with Tom Canty, an impoverished boy living with his abusive family in London. One day, Tom Canty and Prince Edward, the son of King Henry VIII, meet and, as a joke, switch clothes. While dressed in the pauper's rags, the Prince leaves the palace to punish the guard who knocked Tom down. However, the boys look remarkably alike and because they switch clothes, the palace guards throw the prince out into the street. The Prince fares poorly in London because he insists on proclaiming his identity as the true Prince of Wales. Meanwhile despite Tom's repeated denial of his birthright, the court and the King insist that he is the true prince gone mad. After the death of Henry VIII, Edward interrupts Tom's coronation and the boys explain, switch places, and Edward is crowned King of England...All's well that ends well.

This story is an illustration of what is commonly called, "A case of mistaken identity." In the gospel reading John the Baptist is asked, "Who are you?" We see that John the Baptist is asked this question in the specific context of the messianic expectations of the Levites and priests, who represent the religious establishment of the society of which John the Baptist is a part. This establishment expects a messiah who fits into its preconceived notion of the extraordinary. John almost falls into a case of mistaken identity. He could have taken full advantage of the situation but he doesn't.

Today's readings for the middle of Advent seek to bring us closer to an understanding of the coming Messiah by reflecting back upon us the problem of our own identity. This question, "Who are you?" is asked of us. We, too, could fall into a case of mistaken identity in a world where our existence could easily be misconstrued as either Christians who give witness in joy or consumers who live for the moment in selfishness.

John responds first by giving a negative definition of him self. He is not the Messiah. Nor is he the re-incarnation of figures like Elijah and Moses. We likewise need to be able to say who we are not. We need to have a healthy sense that we are not defined by the unfounded expectations of others, by our particular economic position, our job, what we can buy or the clothes we wear.

The Baptist then moves to a positive definition of himself. "I am the voice of one crying out in the wilderness, 'Make straight the way of the Lord'." This answer is as startling, as it is unique, poetic and beautiful. It is a response given from the stance of humility in his being in relationship to the coming Messiah. It speaks of John the Baptist's identity and responsibility while at the same time expresses his position as one of urgency and joy.

We too are called to find such a positive definition of ourselves and to demonstrate it in our daily living through our words and actions. With humility and joy we are to be, in relationship, with God who assists us in defining our self and helps us to discern or determine the life path we follow.

Christians are those who live in the context of their relationship with the Lord Jesus. We are called to be open to doing the will of God in joy. In Paul's first letter to the Thessalonians, our second reading for today, we Continued on page 6.

the birth of Jesus! A
wonderful tradition
in our church is
commemorating a

period of eight days, otherwise known as an Octave. This weekend we celebrate the last eight days of Advent. Today we will sing the great Advent Hymn, "Veni, Veni Emmanuel" or as we know it in English: "O Come O Come Emmanuel." This hymn has seven verses, one for each day of the Octave. We will conclude our Mass singing the contemporary hymn "Emmanuel" by Steve Angrisano, which uses the same text in a more lively musical setting.

Our bell choir will ring the classic Advent Hymn, "People Look East" today along with a beautiful meditative version of "Lo How a Rose E'er Blooming." Our parish choir is working on a beautiful setting of "Of the Father's Love Begotten." The text is a doctrinal hymn based on the Latin poem "Corde natus" by the Roman poet Aurelius Prudentius in the 4th century. The music was written in plainchant during Medieval times, but the message tells of the story of the Divine Mysteries:

Of the Father's love begotten, Ere the worlds began to be, He is Alpha and Omega, He the source, the ending He, Of the things that are, that have been, And that future years shall see, Evermore and evermore!
