Have you ever been caught red handed doing something that you shouldn't be doing? You know, stealing from the cookie jar; sneaking a peek at your classmate's exam paper; taking that loose change off the counter top that doesn't belong to you; slipping downstairs to the kitchen at 2:30 in the morning and trying to devour the remaining pieces of that double fudge, caramel, praline peanut butter cheesecake? Then somebody catches you - red-handed - you are as guilty as can be. You may be scolded as you should be. You may be reprimanded; required to return what you have taken or required to stay out of the kitchen in the wee morning hours as you should be. There should be some consequence, don't you think?

Those who commit sin need to be caught and taught about the gravity and the impact of their sin. If you steal then someone is left without what is rightfully theirs. If you cheat then you do no good for your own intellect. If you sneak a sweet treat you deprived someone else the pleasure of what you have just gobbled down. You have been caught but have you ever been condemned? Has it ever been so bad that you have been doomed to death? Maybe you have been sent to the principal's office, put in a time out or restricted from the kitchen but that is not the same as being condemned.

Just so it is with the woman in the Gospel. She has been caught in adultery. "Has no one condemned you?" "No one sir." she answered. Jesus said, "Nor do I condemn you. You may go. But from now on, avoid this sin." This is a very powerful and pointed statement that not only applies to the adulterous woman but to all of us. This gospel story conveys the message that Jesus has come to accept sinners in God's name. His Will is not to condemn them but to save them and not just one person but the whole of humanity.

We have been taught to believe that we should love the sinner but hate the sin. However, I think that we are a far cry from putting the significance of that saying into action. For the most part we still need to give the sinner the benefit of the doubt because we are all sinners ourselves thus, no one can, "be the first to throw a stone at her."

Jesus comes not to condemn the sinners but to confront and challenge the sinners while condemning the power of sin itself. We are invited into that same mission. And honestly, we could do a much better job of confronting and challenging sinners and condemning the sin in our own midst. Yet, we hesitate thinking that it is none of our business.

We shirk our responsibility because of complacency and relativity convincing ourselves that as long as they don't hurt me or my family, I don't care. Some may be surprisingly unclear or ignorant of what is sin or sinful behavior. When that happens, our sinfulness becomes seen or understood as expected or acceptable behavior.

I think that it is important to recognize the fact that we, as a culture, are increasingly apathetic when it comes to confronting and challenging sin and sinful behavior. For the most part, with the mentality of our culture, sin is okay as long as we don't get caught.

The gospel story opens us to the truth of our sinfulness. Who can cast the first stone? Who among us has not sinned? Who among us can condemn a fellow sinner? Yet, the community in the gospel that surrounded the adulterous woman was very aware of the presence of the sin and how sin destroys the integrity of the community itself. So adamant they were that they wanted to eliminate even the sinner, herself. Jesus was very much aware of the same thing so much so that after he saved her he told here to "Go, and commit this sin no more."

In the same way, Jesus does come to confront us in our sinfulness but not to condemn us for our sinfulness. Jesus comes to us in the spirit of saving life rather than destroying it for the sake of ourselves and the faith community to which we belong. A better life for us not only takes on an individual benefit but also contains communal significance.
