

DEAR PARISHIONERS,

The Solemnity of the Christ the King serves to remind us that we are in the last week of Ordinary Time. Also, at this celebration, we make a conscious effort to acknowledge the Kingship of Christ and recognize that Jesus, the Lord, has dominion over us and over all of time from the past, at the present and into the future.

Today, when we hear words such as King, Lord, and Dominion, some of us may be uncomfortable because these words may speak of oppression. This may be true considering some ancient biblical or historical figures (Kings) or current day leaders who have used their positions of power to conquer surrounding territories; dominate their subjects and destroy their enemies. Even some of the games that kids play seem to indicate a certain power and position when it comes to being a king.

When I was a child I played a game called, 'King of the Mountain." Since I grew up on the farm, it could be played year-round. We could play it in the hayloft of the barn or on the snow piles outside. The objective of the game was to mount the peak and then defend your position on the top of the heap. And, once you took your place of honor you would declare to all others with an attitude of pride, "I am King of the Mountain."

Checkers is a game in which you work to diagonally jump your opponent in order to collect their checker pieces in the hope of reaching their side so that you can have them crown you when you proudly proclaim, "King Me." Even the game of Chess implies a series of moves, counter moves and various strategies in order for you to eliminate pieces of the opponent's court and corner their King to declare the victory pronouncement with an heir of pride, "Check-mate."

History does reflect the human reality of those games in terms of our desire for places of honor and positions of power. We have numerous historical accounts of conquered kingdoms, destroyed dynasties, governments that are toppled and dictators that dominate.

As we celebrate this solemnity of Christ the King and reflect upon the scriptures presented, we do not see that incessant human desire for positioning and power in Jesus. No man nor woman was neither willing nor able to take the place his place on the cross. There was no attempt to topple him from his position. It was not a human desire nor was it a human possibility. Rather, it was of a divine desire and a divine position that the Son of God, the Lord of Lords assumed to have dominion over us. This was not a posture of oppression but a position of inspiration to lift us up from the ways of this world.

St. Paul speaks so well of this as he writes to the Colossians, "He (referring to God the Father) delivered us from the power of darkness and transferred us to the kingdom of his beloved Son, in whom we have redemption, the forgiveness of our sins." Later, in the same scripture, Paul makes reference to the fact that it was by the blood of his cross that we had been reconciled with God. In the gospel of Luke, as Jesus hung on the cross in the midst of the sneering and jeering crowd, one criminal says to the Lord, "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom." Jesus said in reply, "Amen, I say to you, today you will be with me in paradise."

Jesus, the King of the Jews (as the inscription read), in complete and total humility with a crown of thorns placed upon his head took his position of power on the Cross. And from there, as characterized in his dialogue with the criminal, he reaches out to all of us and invites us from our crosses into his paradise. Instead of pushing us away to keep all the glory to himself, he opens up the gates of paradise for all who believe in him. All that is required of us is that we take up our own crosses and follow him.

The three synoptic gospels of Matthew, Mark and Luke all have that prerequisite spelled out in early chapters. In Luke (9:23-24), Jesus said to all: "Whoever wishes to be my follower must deny his very self, take up his cross each day, and follow in my footsteps. Whoever would save his life will lose it, and whoever loses his life for my sake will save it."

In a day and age where places of honor, positions of power and pride rule our hearts and determine the course of our action in this life, it is most difficult for us to take up our





own crosses and live in humility especially if we believe we should have no crosses to bear. The rush of success, the thrill of competition and the expectation of a pleasing self-image overwhelm us, blinding us to a fundamental faith reality that only Jesus saves and we cannot save ourselves.

The whole concept of selflessness, sacrifice, surrender and submission to our King, Christ the Lord is getting lost as all of us become consumed with the development and maintenance of our own kingdoms be they our homes, businesses, farms and even our parish churches. How often to we take pleasure in saying with pride either out loud or with subtly under our breathe, "I am King of the Mountain, King Me, or Check-Mate?"

On this feast of Christ, the King, the liturgy urges us to discern in our own human way of life, with its tragedies and triumphs and with its failures and successes, to remain steadfast in faith and take a knee to the kingship of Christ over us. Living in the shadow of His saving cross and by bearing our own crosses daily, there within are the keys to the kingdom.




