### **Assignments:**

Please write 3 journal entries as you read the group book. Journal entries should be at least a half of one page. Here are some ideas to get you started:

- \*How did the book make you feel
- \*Whether you are enjoying the book or not and WHY
- \*What type of reader would you recommend this to
- \*A quick summary of the part you are up to
- \*What you predict will happen
- \*Something you're wondering about
- \*What you think the author's message is
- \*Something you don't understand
- \*How you feel about a character
- \*How the setting affects the characters

For your choice book, you may prepare a book talk to present in class the first week of school.


A book talk is a short oral presentation (1-2 minutes)

The following is a list of points that should be included (and what should not be included)

- Bring the physical book
- Title
- Author
- Genre
- Any awards or movie adaptations (you may have to research to find this information)
- Give the listener a basic understanding of the set-up of the book without summarizing the plot or spoiling the story.
- Your goal is to inspire others to want to read this book
- It's a good idea to pick out similar books to mention or some character or plot aspect to compare it to. For example:

- If you loved Winn Dixie, you will love Charlotte's Web.
- If you love stories that feature characters who have to overcome disabilities to succeed, you will love Insignificant Events in the Life of a Cactus. If you love a great adventure tale, you will love The Swiss Family Robinson.


### MANDATORY: INSIGNIFICANT EVENTS IN THE LIFE OF A CACTUS




Out of My Mind by Sharon Draper


Brown Girl Dreaming by Jacquline Woodson

Raised in South Carolina and New York, Jacqueline Woodson always felt halfway home in each place. The Fourteenth Goldfish by Jennifer L. Holm Eleven-year-old Ellie has never liked change. She misses fifth grade. She misses her old best friend. She even misses her dearly departed goldfish. 


Amina's Voice by Hena Kahn


Smart Cookie by Ellie Schwartz

Peabody presents the facts about these creatures and YOU decide whether or not they really exist based on the evidence!






