Preparation for the Session

Turn to Page 61, the Family + Faith page.

Read the **Consider This** feature. What thoughts or reactions do you have to the opening question?

In this chapter you will cover the following objectives:

- Recall that God created human beings in his image and likeness
- Reflect on creation as a gift from God that shows his goodness
- Understand that creation is the work of the Holy Trinity
- Recognize our responsibility to care for all of creation, especially each other

Parents, Consider This: Part of the mystery of creation is just how perfectly the universe is put together. God's well-ordered plan situates planets and plants, buds and bugs, stars and squirrels so that each functions according to its purpose. All creation gives honor and glory to God, yet only humans are created in his Divine image. The Bible tells us that each human being is wonderfully made. Beginning your day by looking in the mirror with your child and repeating, "I am wonderfully made," may help both you are your child grow more deeply aware that you are God's magnificent work of art.

INVITE: Encountering God in His Word

Turn to Page 53, The Creator's Work After gathering the supplies that you will need, find a quiet place to be with your child. This is a sacred time—a time when you will be present to each other and to the Lord. You may want to light a candle as you begin.



Let Us Pray Invite your child to make the Sign of the Cross. Read aloud the Psalm verse from the book. Help your child to respond.

Explain that God made the world and everything in it. He created human beings to be able to know him and live as his friends.

Say: Let's listen to the words of Psalm 139 and hear what God has to say to you about how you were created.

Guide your child through the Preparing for God's Word Ritual you learned in the Introduction Session or play Track 1 of the *Songs of Scripture* CD.

- Proclaim God's Word in the Parchment Paper box on the page.
- Maintain several moments of silence.
- Ask: What did you hear God say to you today?

Invite your child to respond and also share what you heard.

Now, look at the What Do You Wonder? box.

Say: You are God's special creation. There is no one in the entire world like you. Your life is a gift and has a purpose. All of creation is a gift and has a purpose. Let's explore God's plan.

Invite your child to respond to the questions. Ask what else she/he might wonder about being God's special creation.

DISCOVER: Learning God's Truth

Turn to Page 54, The Creation of the World



Proclaim the Scripture reading. Tell your child to close his/her eyes and imagine what is being described in the story as you read.

Emphasize that God created the world and everything in it. Like a good detective, we can search for clues about God by looking at what he created. What can looking at a sunset, understanding how a bat flies, or learning about dolphins tell you about God? (That he has an unlimited imagination, that he wants all things to live in harmony, etc.)

Turn to Page 55, Learning about God **You** may want to complete this chapter sitting on your deck, patio, or porch.

Ask your child to read the paragraphs.

Give your child one index card. Have them write the Catholic Faith Word **creation** on one side of the card and its definition on the other side. Keep the cards for use in a vocabulary memory game or for the unit review.



Discuss the pictures of creation in the circles on the pages. Ask your child to draw or write his/her favorite thing in creation in the blank circle. Tell your child about a time when you were overwhelmed by God's creation. (a camping trip with boy scouts, a vacation to the Grand Canyon, a favorite tree outside the house where you grew up)

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Turn to Page 56, The Beauty of Creation

Ask: What is the purpose of God's creation? (to live together in harmony and peace)

Read the directions for the gold-star activity. Complete the activity. Discuss the illustration with your child. Ask him/her to describe what he/she sees in the illustration. Ask what they think the family in the drawing could be talking about.

Read aloud the definition for **Holy Trinity** and locate the word in the text. On an index card, have your child write the vocabulary word on one side of the card and the definition on the other side. Keep the cards for use in a vocabulary memory game or for the unit review.

Turn to Page 57, The Image of God

Read aloud the first two paragraphs. Have your child place his/her finger on the Catholic Faith Word **image of God** and read the definition for them.

Ask: your child to stand up across from you. Tell them you are going to ask them to do exactly what you do. Stand on one foot with arms outstretched. Stand with legs crossed, with arms crossed behind you, etc. Try to make him/her lose their balance.

Share how hard it is to keep things in balance—playing and school work; eating a balanced diet, spending money on family and others in need, etc. Sin makes God's creation out of balance. Give your child a blank sheet of paper. Fold it in half. On one half, direct her/him to draw something beautiful in God's creation. On the other half, ask them to draw what it looks like when mankind sins, or knocks things out of balance. (A beautiful seashore—seashore with dead fish because of pollution in water; a rainforest—a rainforest cut down with animals who have no place to live.)

Parents, Consider This: While God made each of us unique and wonderful individuals, God also created each of us with the need for relationship and for community. The most basic need of every human being is to be loved and to love. Being a part of the community of faith, our family, our parish, helps us keep our life in balance. Left to our limited, individualistic way of thinking we can easily become out of balance, we can live a life that is out of order—God's order. When you help your child learn to respect and live in right relationship with you and all of the members of your family, you are creating balance in their lives, a balance that begins to reveal God's order in their lives and in the world.

Read aloud the paragraph "Responsible to One Another."

Ask: What is your most important responsibility in caring for creation? (to show love and respect for all people) How might your responsibilities change as you grow older?

Say: Humans are special and deserve respect because they are created in God's image.

Help your child see that beauty and diversity are important aspects of creation.

LIVE: Living Our Faith

Turn to Page 58, Our Catholic Life

Read the question followed by the paragraph.

Point out that the Earth must be cared for in just the same way as people care for the gifts they receive from friends and family members.

Ask: Why is it important to respect the Earth? (It gives us food and materials we need to live. It is God's creation and we are thankful.)

Ask your child to read the directions for the gold-star activity. Allow time for your child to read, think, and mark the boxes that apply to them. Discuss their answers. Help him/her determine a specific and practical plan for caring for creation this week. You do the same. Writing the plan on a piece of paper and putting it on the refrigerator might help you both keep focus during the week.

Turn to Page 59, People of Faith

Read the paragraph about Saint Rabanus Maurus.

- Share your reactions to the information.
- Talk about some ways your family can pay better attention to how God shows his plan in nature.



Complete the Live Your Faith activity. You may already have a family garden. Discuss ways your family can learn about God through your garden or perhaps a community garden.

Turn to Page 61, Family + Faith Page and

conclude with the Let's Pray prayer on this page. **Parents, Consider This:** It's important to form our children in the common language of prayer. We encourage you to pray the Hail Mary (see Page 321) during your night prayer this week.

Turn to Page 71, the Family + Faith page.

Read the **Consider This** feature. What thoughts or reactions do you have to the opening question?

In this chapter you will cover the following objectives:

- Describe the Bible as the Word of God written in human words, the holy book of the Church
- Define the Church as the community of all baptized people who believe in God and follow Jesus
- Recognize that the Church helps us understand God's Word, teaches us about God's love, and gathers us to honor and worship God
- Realize that we can serve God and the Church by living out the Good News of Jesus

Parents, Consider This: In the very first pages of the Bible, God says to Adam, "It is not good for man to be alone." He gives humans families to nurture them and communities in which they can live and work. The Church is a special kind of community. Christians provide one another with strength and hope to live as disciples. The Church's mission is to invite others into God's life by and sharing his plan of salvation. The life, mission, and saving work of Jesus is the heart of the Church. Your family is part of God's divine plan to share his life with the world—really! In your family you help each other to grow in deeper love with Christ and then you bring his life to the world.

INVITE: Encountering God in His Word

Turn to Page 63, The Church Gathered After gathering the supplies that you will need, find a quiet place to be with your child. This is a sacred time—a time when you will be present to each other and to the Lord. You may want to light a candle as you begin.



Let Us Pray Invite your child to make the Sign of the Cross. Read aloud the Psalm verse from the book. Help your child to respond.

Explain that Jesus called people to follow him. The disciples were people who said "yes" to Jesus. They became a community of believers. Jesus loved them and wanted them to help other people to learn about him.

Say: Let's listen to some words that Jesus shared with his disciples.



- Proclaim God's Word in the Parchment Paper box on the page.
- Maintain several moments of silence.
- Ask: What did you hear God say to you today?

Invite your child to respond and also share what you heard.

Now, look at the What Do You Wonder? box.

Say: Jesus wants us to be one community, one Church. If we say "yes" to Jesus like his first disciples, we can work together to spread the Good News.

Invite the children to respond to the questions. Ask what else they might wonder about God's life and love and how he shares them with us.

DISCOVER: Learning God's Truth

Turn to Page 64, Serving the Community

Read aloud "Saint André Bessette."

Tell your child you are going to read a story about a man named Brother André. Brothers are followers of Jesus who decide to follow the Church by living together as a family. They make a promise to live simply and will never get married.

Say: Think about how in the beginning of the story Brother André made an ordinary job important.

Ask: Why it is important to help others? Explain to your child that because Brother André did his little job with such love and joy, God chose him to be the instrument of his healing power.

Ask: Why did they have to build another building for Saint André? (so that all of his visitors would have a place to come to talk and pray with him)



Read the directions for the gold-star activity. Ask your child to find the correct answer.

Turn to Page 65,God Teaches You

Read the opening sentence.

Have your child find the highlighted Catholic Faith Word **Bible** and then read the definition.

Give your child an index card. Have her/him write the vocabulary word on one side of the card and its definition on the other side. Keep the cards for use in a vocabulary memory game or for the unit review.



Proclaim the Scripture story.

Ask: So, what did Jesus followers do? (learned from Apostles, broke bread, prayed, sold what they had and gave to the poor, shared belongings with those in need)



Look at the Share Your Faith activity. Ask your child to name the three most difficult things to share that he/she owns. Why is it difficult? Listen with sincerity and seriousness as they talk about their struggle. Invite him/her to take the words of Jesus to heart: "We should love people more than things." Help your child create a simple prayer to repeat when the situation arises. (i.e. Jesus, help me share. Jesus, let me love like you.)

Turn to Page 66, God's People **Have** your child fold a blank piece of paper in half. On one side of the fold, have them make a list of all the communities he/she belongs to. After they complete their list, have them write a sentence across from each item that describes why they are a member of that community. (i.e. school... I go to school to learn.)

Have your child find the Catholic Faith Word **Church** and read aloud the definition. Write the vocabulary word on one side of the card and its definition on the other side. Keep the cards for use in a vocabulary memory game or for the unit review.

Read the paragraphs on the page alternating with your child.



Read the directions for the gold-star activity and have your child do as directed.

Turn to Page 67, Gathered in Jesus' Name **Find** the highlighted Catholic Faith Word **Sacred Tradition**. Ask your child to read the definition and write it on an index card.

Ask: Why do you need the Church?

Go back to the second paragraph and place numbers above the things that we do as members of the Church and that the Church does for us. (Hint: There are six.)



Look at the Connect Your Faith Activity. Ask your child to draw a picture of your family in your parish Church. You can write the name of your parish in the steeple of the Church.

Parents, Consider This: Do you sometimes yearn for some support? Or maybe you might feel an overwhelming need to be understood. The yearning for connectedness is God-given. The need for relationship with God, with family, and with each other in Christ is deep within our hearts. That's why being an active and conscious member of your parish community is so important. Your connection to your parish, especially through the Mass, will help focus you and strengthen you as you face the challenges of daily life.

Turn to Page 68, Our Catholic Life

Read aloud the question and then the first paragraph.

Read the directions for the gold-star activity. After completing the chart, review the list. Next to each item both you and your child write a number that indicates on a scale from 1-5 (5 being the highest) how difficult it is to live this command of God. Discuss ways you can help each other do what God asks.

Turn to Page 69, People of Faith

Read the paragraph about Saint Francis.

- Share your reactions to the information.
- Talk about some ways your family can remember to praise God for all the beauty of creation.

Turn to Page 71,Family + Faith Page and conclude with the Let's Pray prayer on this page.

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ALIVEIN GRADE 3 CHAPTER 3

Families Teach Love

Preparation for the Session

Turn to Page 81, the Family + Faith page.

Read the **Consider This** feature. What thoughts or reactions do you have to the opening question?

In this chapter you will cover the following objectives:

- Appreciate that families teach us how to care for, respect, and help one another
- Recognize the importance of Mary as the Mother of God and our Mother, too
- Connect the words
 Elizabeth used to greet
 Mary with the Hail Mary
- Identify the Catholic family as the domestic Church where we experience love, and learn about God and how we pray and live as Catholics

Parents, Consider This: Family is the place where we first learn we are loved and we learn how to love. The Catechism of the Catholic Church says it this way: "The first school of Christian life is the Christian family" (CCC 1657). The family shapes a child's primary image of God. It does so faithfully when it mirrors God's life and love in the perfect love that flows between the three Persons of the Holy Trinity. Your child learns this from you when you display a loving relationship that results in the physical, emotional, and spiritual well-being of a daughter/son.

INVITE: Encountering God in His Word

Turn to Page 73, Families Teach Love

After gathering the supplies that you will need, find a quiet place to be with your child. This is a sacred time—a time when you will be present to each other and to the Lord. You may want to light a candle as you begin.



Let Us Pray Invite your child to make the Sign of the Cross. Read aloud the Psalm verse from the book. Help your child to respond.

Explain that our families are one of God's first gifts to us. They take care of all the things we need. Most importantly, they help us to live as God's People. We have another family as well.

Say: Let's listen to this story about Jesus.



- Proclaim God's Word in the Parchment Paper box on the page.
- Maintain several moments of silence.
- Ask: What did you hear God say to you today?

Invite your child to respond and also share what you heard.

Now, look at the What Do You Wonder? box.

Say: Jesus helps us to understand that our families belong to a bigger family we call the Church. Learning how to love each other in our family helps us understand how to love other people in the world. God uses our families to teach us important lessons.


Invite the children to respond to the questions. Ask what else they might wonder about God's life and love and how he shares them with us.

DISCOVER: Learning God's Truth

Turn to Page 74, A Model for Our Families

Read aloud the question. Ask your child how she/he knows that she/he is cared for in your family? How can our family show more care for each other? (Listen to your child's answers. They may surprise you.) Make sure you discuss how important it is for family members to spend time together.

Find the highlighted Catholic Faith Words **Visitation** and **Mary**. Ask your child to read aloud the definitions and then write the word and definitions on separate index cards.





Read the directions for the gold-star activity and then help your child complete the activity.

Discuss the illustration. Mary's response to Elizabeth is called the Magnificat. You may want to play "Mary, O Blessed One" (Track 17) from the *Songs of Scripture* CD Grades 1-3.

Turn to Page 75, The Greatest Mother **Read** aloud the paragraph and the question that follows.



Complete the prayer. If you need help, turn to page 321 to find the Hail Mary. Pray the prayer together.



Read aloud the directions for the Share Your Faith activity. Have your child write one of the ways your family cares for each other that you discussed at the beginning of the lesson.

Turn to Page 76, The Church of the Home

Read the first three paragraphs together.

Ask your child which family members taught them about safety rules and how to care for pets.

Read aloud the fourth paragraph.

Ask: What is something you have learned about the Catholic Church in our family?

Have your child find the highlighted Catholic Faith Word **domestic Church**. Read the definition out loud. On an index card write the vocabulary word on one side, and its definition on the other.



Read aloud the first two paragraphs.

Ask your child what he/she thinks authority means. Reinforce that authority means the right or power to enforce rules or give orders. Note that the power to make decisions is based on responsibility for the good of all.

Explain that families are part of the Church.



Read aloud the directions for the gold-star activity and then complete the activity.

Read aloud "God Loves Everyone."

Ask: Why is it sometimes hard to obey someone who is responsible for you? What can you do to overcome that difficulty?

LIVE: Living Our Faith

Turn to Page 78, Our Catholic Life

Read aloud the question.

Remind your child that respect is honoring God and other people.



Read aloud the directions in the green box and then complete the activity.



Turn to Page 79, People of Faith

Read the paragraph about Blessed Luigi and Maria.

- Share your reactions to the information.
- Talk about some ways your family can help each other be Saints. (i.e. calling out the best in each other)



Read the directions for the Live Your Faith activity. On a separate sheet of paper, help your child name four or five scenes that will tell his/her story. On the other side of the paper help him/her section the paper into the number of boxes he/she will need to tell the story. Direct your child to finish the work.

Parents, Consider This: The one simple truth that God shares with us in the first pages of Scripture is that he is our creator and we are his creation. When we hear people say, "What does faith have to do with my life?" it is indeed a testimony to how far human beings can stray from the truth that God has created us for relationship with himself and others. Our families are sacred for two reasons; in our families we experience the love of God for us through one another and in our families we are formed by word and action to bring Christ to the world. When you lose sight of that amidst the daily blur of everyday life, pray for the grace to remember and see. Pray the words of Scripture "Now my eyes will be open and my ears attentive," (2 Chronicles 7:15) and see the difference.

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The Holy Trinity

Preparation for the Session

Turn to Page 95, the Family + Faith page.

Read the **Consider This** feature. What thoughts or reactions do you have to the opening question?

In this chapter you will help your child to:

- Recognize that a mystery is a truth that is difficult to perceive or understand with our senses, but is known through faith and through signs
- Examine Jesus' teachings about God the Father and God the Holy Spirit
- Identify God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit as a perfect communion of love
- Describe the Creed as a statement of the Church's beliefs

Parents, Consider This: The teaching of the Trinity is a religious mystery. It is the mystery that helps us to probe more deeply into the nature of God. It provides some insight about God as a relational being. The Trinity embodies the energy and power of love that draws all creation into God's embrace. We come to faith in part by recognizing that our loving relationships reflect the love of the Trinity.

INVITE: Encountering God in His Word

Turn to Page 87,The Holy Trinity

After gathering the supplies that you will need, find a quiet place to be with your child. This is a sacred time—a time when you will be present to each other and to the Lord. You may want to light a candle as you begin.



Let Us Pray Invite your child to make the Sign of the Cross. Read aloud the verse from the book. Help your child to respond.

Explain that God created human beings with a great gift. Unlike all the rest of creation, we have the ability to know God. We can use our minds and our hearts to think about him.

Say: Let's listen to God tell us who he is through his Word and the Church.

Guide your child through the Preparing for God's Word Ritual you learned in the Introduction Session or play Track 1 of the Songs of Scripture CD.

- Proclaim God's Word in the Parchment Paper box on the page.
- Maintain several moments of silence.
- Ask: What did you hear God say to you today?

Invite your child to respond and also share what you heard.

Now, look at the What Do You Wonder? box.

Say: We know that God is so great that, even when we try, we can never fully understand his great mystery. This doesn't stop our minds and hearts from wanting to know about our God, who loves us very much.

Share a time when you felt God's love in your life.

Have your child read the questions in the box and respond. Prompt what else your child might wonder about God's life and love and how he shares them with us.

DISCOVER: Learning God's Truth

Turn to Page 88,

Read aloud the three paragraphs.

One God, Three Divine Persons

Have your child find the word mystery and then move to the Catholic Faith Words box. Ask your child to read the definition there.

Ask your child "What helped the people better understand the mystery of the Holy Trinity? (the shamrock)

Turn to Page 89,

Read aloud the introductory paragraph.

Jesus Makes the Mystery Known

Proclaim the Scripture story and refer to the image of the shamrock on the page. Remind your child that Saint Patrick used the shamrock to help people better understand God.



Do the gold-star activity.

Read the section explaining the three persons in one God. Have your child find and point to the word Incarnation. Then move to the Catholic Faith Words box and ask your child to read the definition.

Turn to Page 90,

Read the question and the first paragraph. Tell your child to listen for the definition of the word "mystery."

Read the rest of the paragraphs.

Together, find the definitions for the words **creed** and **Apostle's Creed** in the Catholic Faith Words box and read them.

Turn to Page 91, Honoring the Trinity

Have your child read aloud the first paragraph. Point out the phrases that begin the three main parts of the Apostles' Creed.

Read the second paragraph. Ask your child when the Holy Spirit might guide him or her.



Read the directions for the Connect Your Faith activity. Complete the activity.

Parents, Consider This: Creed comes from the Latin "credo," meaning "I believe." Two well-known creeds are the Apostles' Creed and the Nicene Creed. In November 2011, the translation of both creeds were revised when the Third Edition of the Roman Missal was implemented. The Apostles' Creed honors the Blessed Trinity. If possible, find or make pretzels shaped into a loose knot. Share with your child that the three spaces symbolize the Trinity and the pretzel strips represent praying arms. Share some pretzels shaped in this way after completing this section.

LIVE: Living Our Faith

Turn to Page 92, Our Catholic Life **Discuss** the question, "Where can you find answers to your questions about the Church?" (parents, guardians, grandparents, parish priest, your religion book)

Read the paragraphs together.



Do the gold–star activity.

Remind your child that we grow in wisdom and grace when we learn about the Catholic faith.

Parents, Consider This: As a Catholic person, it is our responsibility to learn about the Catholic faith. As adults, it is our obligation to find correct information about Church issues. As a parent, you can share this knowledge with your child and help them learn how to live the faith.

Turn to Page 93, People of Faith

Read the paragraph about Saint John of Matha.

- Share your reactions to the information.
- Talk about ways your family can show that you love the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit.



Have your child complete the Live Your Faith activity.

Parents, Consider This: Catholic Social Teaching is an important dimension of our faith. It is our responsibility to learn more about the Church's teachings regarding family life so that we can grow in our own faith. Consider learning more about a Catholic Social Teaching issue that relates to your family.

Turn to Page 95,

Family + Faith Page and conclude with the Let's Pray prayer on this page.

Parents, Consider This: It is important to form our children in the common language of prayer. We encourage you to pray the Glory Be (see Page 321), during your night prayer this week.



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The Church Celebrates

Preparation for the Session

Turn to Page 105, the Family + Faith page.

Read the **Consider This** feature. What thoughts or reactions do you have to the opening question?

In this chapter you will help your child to:

- Describe worship as adoring and honoring God, especially at Mass and in prayer
- Discover that at the Last Supper Jesus celebrated the Passover with his Apostles
- Identify liturgy, including the Seven Sacraments and forms of daily prayer, as the public prayer of the Church

After gathering the supplies that you will need, find a quiet place to be with your child. This is a sacred time—a time when you will be present to each other and to the Lord. You may want to light a candle as you begin.



Let Us Pray Invite your child to make the Sign of the Cross. Read aloud the Psalm verse from the book. Help your child to respond.

Explain that we already have something to thank God for when he opened our eyes in the morning—the gift of our life.

Say: Even if we tried, we could not keep count all of the gifts that God gives us in a single day. We should give thanks to God at all times and in all ways. Jesus knew how much we need God in our lives.

Guide your child through the Preparing for God's Word Ritual you learned in the Introduction Session or play Track 1 of the *Songs of Scripture* CD.

- Proclaim God's Word in the Parchment Paper box on the page.
- Maintain several moments of silence.
- Ask: What did you hear God say to you today?

Invite your child to respond and also share what you heard.

Now, look at the What Do You Wonder? box.

Say: Jesus ate many meals with his family and friends. But, Jesus knew that people were hungry for more than food. He knew they were hungry to learn about God and his love. God, our Father, knows what we need. If we trust in God, we do not need to worry. We learn to trust God as we trust those who care for us in our everyday life.

Share a way you like to give thanks to God.

Have your child read the questions in the box and respond. Prompt what else they might wonder about giving thanks to God.

DISCOVER: Learning God's Truth

Turn to Page 98, Special Celebrations **Read** aloud the first paragraph. Have your child find and point to the words **Seven Sacraments**. Have your child read the rest of the page. Then have them point to the words **Last Supper** in the last paragraph. Move to the Catholic Faith Words box and ask your child to read the definitions there.

Turn to Page 99, The Last Supper



Proclaim the Scripture.

Have your child recall a time when he or she expressed thanks.

Ask: Why were Jesus and his friends celebrating in the story? (it was the Jewish feast of Passover) Discuss how Jesus' words are used at every celebration of the Mass.



Do the Share Your Faith activity. Have your child decide what the special celebration is and write the story together.

Parents, Consider This: We remember things we celebrate. Keep in mind the dates of your child's Baptism and First Communion. As a family, celebrate them in some special way; light your child's Baptismal candle on the anniversary date of their Baptism or bake or buy some special bread together on the anniversary date of your child's First Communion.

Turn to Page 100, The Heart of Our Worship

Ask your child to describe what they know happens at Mass.

Read the first three paragraphs. Discuss how all the ways we worship are pleasing to God, but the Eucharist, or the Mass, is the most important to Catholics.

Direct your child to the Catholic Faith Word box and identify **liturgy** and **Nicene Creed**. Review the definitions.

Read the paragraphs under the heading, "At Mass."

Turn to Page 101, At Mass **Move** to the Catholic Faith Word Box and have your child read the definitions of the **Tabernacle** and the **Blessed Sacrament**.



Read the directions for the Connect Your Faith activity. Complete the activity.

Parents, Consider This: Children learn what is important by what we say to them, what we teach them, and what we do with them. Describe to your child how the Blessed Sacrament, as the Holy Eucharist, the Body of Christ, is kept and reserved in the Tabernacle at church. Visit your church when you can spend some quiet time together in prayer and adoration. A short reverent visit is a great way to pray with your child and pass on your belief in the importance of the Eucharist.

Turn to Page 102, Our Catholic Life

Discuss the question, "How do you show respect at Mass?"

Summarize the information presented on this page. Demonstrate and practice with your child the gestures that show respect at Mass.

Remind your child that Christians celebrate both inside and outside of the church building. Within a church, Church members gather for Mass and joyously celebrate the Sacraments. Recall family gatherings that have been held as extensions of Church celebrations such as Baptisms, First Communions, and weddings.

Turn to Page 103, People of Faith

Read the paragraph about Saint Mary MacKillop.

- Share your reactions to the information.
- Talk about what your child's favorite part of the Mass is.



Have your child complete the Live Your Faith activity.

Parents, Consider This: The Eucharist is a sacrifice and a shared meal. The sacrifice offered is Jesus suffering and death. The meal that Christians share unites them with Jesus and with one another. It also nourishes us to do God's work. Family life also involves both sacrifice and shared meals. When someone sacrifices something for someone in your family, praise that action. When you gather to share a meal, make it a regular practice to thank God and bless the food that nourishes your family.

Turn to Page 105, Family + Faith Page and conclude with the Let's Pray prayer on this page.

Let Us Pray Invite your child to make the Sign of the Cross. Read aloud the Psalm verse from the book. Help your child to respond.

Explain that prayer is an important part of our life with God.

Say: In prayer, we give thanks and we ask forgiveness. We tell God about what worries us and ask for help. Most of all, we give God praise. It is important to think about how we should pray.

Parents, Consider This: Recall a time in your own life when you asked God for something in prayer and you believe your prayer was answered. Try to remember to share those stories in your family. That is often how we come to recognize God's action in our lives.

Ask your child to listen to the directions Jesus gives for praying.



Proclaim the Scripture story. Have your child talk about where and what he or she prays for most often.

Ask: What does God know about your prayers? (God knows what is in their hearts.)

Move to the Catholic Faith Word box and have your child read the definitions of the highlighted words. Explain that these are the five forms of prayer.



Read the directions for the Connect Your Faith activity. Together, look up the passages from Scripture and have your child complete the activity.

Parents, Consider This: Think of the importance of daily prayer in the life of your family. Prayer that is done often becomes a habit. Praying regularly changes our lives. Praying as a family strengthens and roots our family in God's loving presence.

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The Paschal Mystery

Preparation for the Session

Read the **Consider This** feature. What thoughts or reactions do you have to the opening question?

In this chapter you will cover the following objectives:

- Recognize that Jesus offered the greatest sacrifice: he gave his life to save us from sin so we could have new life with God in Heaven
- Recall that the Resurrection is the event of Jesus being raised from Death to new life
- Define the Paschal Mystery as the mystery of Jesus' suffering, Death, Resurrection, and Ascension

Turn to Page 133, Sacrifices Show Love

Read aloud the paragraphs.

Ask: What did Jesus sacrifice mean for the world? (Because of Jesus' sacrifice, all people can have new life with God in Heaven.)



Ask your child when they have made a sacrifice for someone? How did your sacrifice show love? Have your child write his or her answer in the Share Your Faith box. Share a time when you made a sacrifice for someone.

Parents, Consider This: Although children often make sacrifices, they may be unfamiliar with the term. Build the word, sacrifice, into your child's vocabulary by using it in everyday situations. A charism is a call to live in a particular way that will serve the church's mission, the continuation of the work of Jesus Christ. The Holy Spirit generously bestows charisms on all members of the Church. Have you thought about what your charisms might be? Those of your family? We each have gifts given by God to share that will build up the community, the Body of Christ. What gifts do you and the members of your family bring to the Church?

Turn to Page 149, Family + Faith Page and conclude with the Let's Pray prayer on this page.

Parents, Consider This: It's important to form our children in the common language of prayer. We encourage you to pray the Hail Mary (see Page 321), during your night prayer this week.

Turn to Page 163, the Family + Faith page.

Read the **Consider This** feature. What thoughts or reactions do you have to the opening question?

In this chapter you will cover the following objectives:

- Recognize that Peter was the leader of the Apostles and first Pope, head of the entire Church
- Identify the Apostles as the first twelve leaders called by Jesus
- Recognize the bishops as successors of the Apostles
- Understand that the Pope, bishops, priests, and deacons lead, guide, and make the Church holy

Parents, Consider This: You know when you are in the company of a natural leader. A good leader inspires and motivates a group. The Church needs good leadership to remain unified and to function effectively. Our primary teachers are bishops and priests, whom God calls to leadership by the power of the Holy Spirit. The bishop of Rome, the Pope, has the primary place among all of the bishops. He is the visible sign of unity for the Church throughout the world.

Turn to Page 155, Church Leaders

After gathering the supplies that you will need, find a quiet place to be with your child. This is a sacred time—a time when you will be present to each other and to the Lord. You may want to light a candle as you begin.



Let Us Pray Invite your child to make the Sign of the Cross. Read aloud the Psalm verse from the book. Help your child to respond.

Explain that the first "Mark" of the Church is unity. As the People of God, we are called to live in unity with one another.

Say: Let's listen to the reading from Ephesians that tells us about this unity.

Tell your child that they are about to hear three separate stories from the New Testament in the Bible that tell us about Peter, the Apostle. In each section, read the story in parts: "Peter's Belief" (Peter/Simon, Narrator, Jesus); "Peter Denies Jesus" (Narrator, Jesus); "Jesus and Peter" (Peter, Narrator, Jesus).

Ask: What did you learn about Peter in these stories?

Turn to Page 157,Jesus and Peter

Play: "Upon This Rock" from the *Songs of Scripture* CD, Track 20.

Ask: What did the song teach us about Peter?

Read aloud the final paragraph. Go to Catholic Faith Words Box and review the definition of Pope.

Turn to Page 158, Chosen to Lead

Tell your child that we need leaders to help us be the best we can be. Tell him/her about someone you know who is a good leader and what he/she helped you to accomplish.

Say: We are going to talk about Church leaders. Today, someone else has the same job that Jesus gave to Peter.

Have your child read the two paragraphs aloud. Tell him/her to listen to discover who does Peter's work now. (the Pope)

Ask: Who takes the place of Jesus' Apostles today? (Pope and bishops) What do you think the responsibilities of a bishop are? (leads and serves a diocese)

Read the definitions for the Catholic Faith Words Apostolic Succession and **bishop**. Give your child three index cards. Have your child write the words on one side of the card and the definitions on the other side. Collect the cards and save them for review.

Parents, Consider This: When we look at the family through the lens of spirituality, we realize that God intends for parents to be the leaders in their family. You lead by word and example. You understand the purpose of the family and so set the goals and priorities of your family life to uphold your purpose. To help you keep your focus and support you in living out your purpose, God gives you the Church. Being able to stay connected to the universal Church through an active connection to your parish is truly a gift.

Turn to Page 159, Leaders of the Parish **Read** aloud the paragraph.



Complete the gold-star activity.

Help your child learn the names of the pastor and deacon(s) of your parish. (You can find these in your parish bulletin, which are often available online.)


Have your child silently read the paragraph under "Church Members Serve." As your child reads, ask them to list the different kinds of ministries on a separate sheet of paper. Review their list.

Let Us Pray Invite your child to make the Sign of the Cross. Read aloud the Psalm verse from the book. Help your child to respond.

Explain that we use the word *church* to talk about a building, but it's important to remember that the word *Church* (with a capital C) means the baptized people who are disciples of Jesus.

Say: Let's listen to hear what Saint Paul said about the Church.

Guide your child through the Preparing for God's Word Ritual you learned in the Introduction Session or play Track 1 of the Songs of Scripture CD.

Say: Jesus sent his Spirit to the Twelve on the Feast of Pentecost. The Holy Spirit made the Apostles one community and gave them the courage to tell the Good News about Jesus. The Holy Spirit does the same for you.

Invite your child to respond to the questions. Ask what else they might wonder about God's life and love and how he shares them with us.

DISCOVER: Learning God's Truth

Turn to Page 166, United as One **Read** aloud the paragraphs.

Ask your child to read the three captions above the illustration. Pause between each caption to discuss the following:

- what your child sees in the photographs
- which countries the photographs were taken in
- the countries location on the map

Turn to Page 167, Identifying Characteristics Read aloud the definitions of the Catholic Faith Words Marks of the **Church**, **one**, **holy**, **catholic**, and **apostolic**. Give your child five index cards. Have your child write each of the words on the five separate cards. They should add their definitions to the back of each card. Keep the cards for review.

Read the paragraph as your child follows along.

On a separate sheet of paper, have your child draw a bicycle wheel. Ask him/her to write Jesus name on the hub of the wheel. Use the wheel to explain how we are "one." (In Baptism, I become one with Christ. I am a spoke on the wheel. I do not directly relate to someone else. My spoke is not directly connected to another spoke. My spoke connects to another through the hub. We are all connected to each other through Christ.)

Turn to Page 168, Made Holy

Set the stage for the Scripture story by explaining that the Apostles did not yet feel Jesus' presence after his Ascension.



Proclaim the Scripture story.



Complete the gold-star activity.

Ask: What happened after the Holy Spirit came to the Apostles at Pentecost?

Share with your child a time when the Holy Spirit helped you to do something that you were afraid to do. (stick up for someone being picked on; saying no when a friend asked you to do something wrong)

Point out that the arrival of the Holy Spirit fulfilled Jesus' promise to the Apostles.

Turn to Page 169, Communion of Saints

Read aloud the first paragraph.

Ask your child to underline what the Holy Spirit does.

Return to your drawing of the bicycle wheel. Explain that the Holy Spirit works at Baptism to make you one with Jesus. It is the Holy Spirit that guides you to follow Jesus more closely.

Ask your child to write people's names on some of the spokes.

Have your child read aloud the second paragraph. Explain that unity and holiness are not limited to the earthly Church.

Read the last paragraph.

Ask: Whom do you know that belongs to the Communion of Saints?

Return to your bicycle wheel and write some names of the Saints on the empty spokes. For assistance, review the People of Faith from previous lessons.



On the opposite side of the paper where the bicycle wheel was drawn, have your child write down five questions he/she would like to ask a Saint?

Parents, Consider This: At the Baptism of your child, you committed yourself to helping your child grow in the understanding of the miracle that had happened in that sacred moment. His/her life was forever joined to Christ. If we continue to reflect on the image of the bicycle wheel, it helps us to understand that there is nothing in our lives that does not flow through Christ. Our connection to our families, friends, neighbors, and strangers happens through our center (hub), Christ, himself. The deeper we grow in relationship to Christ, the more capable we become of living our mission—to serve in his name.

Turn to Page 170,

Read aloud the first paragraph.

Our Catholic Life

Take turns reading one stripe in the chart.

Remind your child that the Saints are special people. They are beautiful examples of how to lead holy lives in service to God and others.

Point out that many Saints led interesting lives and that children can learn a great deal from them.

Turn to Page 171, People of Faith

Read the paragraph about Saints Perpetua and Felicity.

- Share your reactions to the information.
- Discuss a Saint who is important to a member of your family and talk about the special "friendship" between that person and the Saint.



Ask your child to complete the Live Your Faith activity.

Turn to Page 177, Sharing God's Good News

Have your child read the first paragraph.

Tell him/her to listen carefully as your proclaim "Doing God's Work. While you read, they should think about what the seed was that St. Paul planted. Proclaim the Scripture.



Have your child complete the Share Your Faith activity.

Share a good work that you have done to help spread the Good News with your child. Emphasize how often actions speak louder than words.

Turn to Page 178, Universal and Missionary **Read** aloud the question. Tell your child you will read to find the answer. Alternate reading the four paragraphs with your child.



Complete the gold-star activity.

Give your child three index cards. Read the Catholic Faith Words definition for **evangelization**, **mission**, and **missionaries**. Tell her/him to write the words on one side of the card and the definitions on the other. Use the cards to review.

Parents, Consider This: When you see someone doing something generous or compassionate, you recognize that it is good. Because you are faith-filled, you know that whatever is good begins in God. We cooperate with his goodness; we are his instruments. All baptized Christians share in the mission of the Church. Our words and deeds proclaim the Good News. We show people the face of God. Your children, however, still need to learn that profound truth. They must see you act and then they must hear you tell them why you act. This process of doing and telling is what we also do as we bring Christ to the world. We call this evangelization.

Turn to Page 191, The Story of Joseph **Ask** your child to read the paragraph after the Scripture story.

Discuss the two purple follow up questions.

Spend some time discussing why it can be more difficult to forgive people in your family than others outside of your family.

Look at the illustrations on this page and on page 190. Have your child tell you who the characters are and what is happening.

Turn to Page 192, The Way of Love **Read** aloud the opening paragraph.



Proclaim the Scripture.

Read aloud the closing paragraph.

Talk about the difference between forgiving and forgetting. While some hurts we may never forget, forgiveness is a daily choice to let go of the hurt and choose to act in love.

Say: Let's listen to the words of Jesus as he talks about light.

Guide your child through the Preparing for God's Word Ritual you learned in the Introduction Session or play Track 1 of the Songs of Scripture CD.

- Proclaim God's Word in the Parchment Paper box on the page.
- Maintain several moments of silence.
- Ask: What did you hear God say to you today?

Invite your child to respond and also share what you heard.

Now, look at the What Do You Wonder? box.

Say: Jesus helps us to see what we must do so that we can be his light in the world. But just like when we are learning to ride a bike or dance, we must practice. We must practice how to be faith-filled, hope-filled, and loving people.

Invite your child to respond to the questions. Ask what else they might wonder about how to be Jesus' light in the world.

DISCOVER: Learning God's Truth

Turn to Page 200, The Light of the World **Ask** your child to read aloud the opening paragraph.



Proclaim the Scripture story. Emphasize that Jesus' words apply to modern times, too.

Read the questions that follow the Scripture and allow your child to respond.



Complete the gold-star activity.

Read the caption and then invite your child to interpret the photograph at the bottom of the page. (Easter Vigil is the greatest Mass of the Church year, celebrated on Holy Saturday evening. The new Easter candle, representing Jesus as the Light of the World, is welcomed and the light passed.)

Turn to Page 201, Be a Light **Read** the three paragraphs. Ask your child to explain what Jesus meant when he said, "You are the light of the world."

Give your child one index card. Tell her/him to write the Catholic Faith Word, **vocation**, on one side and its definition on the other. Collect the card and hold it for review.



Read aloud the directions for the Share Your Faith activity. Affirm your child's example and think of some other ways he/she has done loving things in your family or for others.

Turn to Page 202, The Virtues **Read** the first paragraph.

Ask: When do we first receive these virtues? (at Baptism)

Read the next two paragraphs. Afterward, review the definitions for the Catholic Faith Words **virtues**, **Theological Virtues**, and **faith**. Give your child three index cards. Have them write the words on one side and the definitions on the other. Collect the cards for review later.

Turn to Page 203, The Theological Virtues **Ask** your child to place her/his finger on the word **hope**. Read aloud the definition. Repeat this process for the word **charity**. Create two additional vocabulary cards. Collect the cards until time for review.

Ask your child how she/he can grow strong in virtues. (by practicing them)



Read aloud the directions for the Connect Your Faith activity. Have your child complete the activity.

Parents, Consider This: You are about to begin a conversation with your child about prayer. Your child may not be aware of all the ways that you pray. Share your prayer life with him/her and tell him/her how often you pray for his/her needs. This may also be an opportunity to reflect on the prayer that you do or do not do together as a family. Developing intimacy with God requires communication, just like every other relationship. Help your child develop a sense of security and peace by making prayer an intentional part of your family life. Our common Catholic prayers can be found in the Our Catholic Tradition reference section of your child's book, beginning on page 320.

Ask your child how Saul changed. (from hurting Jesus' followers to becoming one of them)

Remind your child that people who make selfish choices can change and make better choices. Ask him/her to think about how he/she might be less selfish at home. Discuss some ideas that might help your child handle those situations differently.

Turn to Page 213,The Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation

Read aloud the first paragraph. Distinguish between a sin and an accident or a mistake. Remind your child that the choice to sin is intentional, but that an accident or a mistake is not intentional.

Ask: Why did Jesus want to help Jairus? (Jairus had great faith.) How is Jairus a role model for us? (When we are troubled, we can remember that Jairus had great faith and that Jesus helped him and his daughter.)

Turn to Page 236, Church Membership **Read** the opening question and paragraph.

Parents, Consider This: One of the greatest things we can learn in our family is to make peace with one another after you have wronged or been wronged by another person. 

Turn to Page 248, Our Catholic Life **Have** your child silently read the opening question and the three paragraphs. Ask your child to tell you some of the main points of the section.

Ask: When you serve others, should you be thinking of how it will help you or how it will help the ones you are serving? (how it will help the ones you are serving)

Read aloud the captions for each photograph. Between each caption, invite your child to give his or her impression of what's going on in the photographs.

Turn to Page 249, People of Faith

Read the paragraph about Saint Jean-Baptiste de la Salle.

- Share your reactions to the information.
- Talk about how your family has served the poor.



Have your child complete the Live Your Faith activity.

Parents, Consider This: Those who are ordained live out their common ministerial priesthood in service to the entire Church, proclaiming the Good News in Word and Sacrament. Consider how your family has been served by this unselfish commitment to the faith community. Discuss some of the concrete ways—presiding at Eucharist, hearing confessions, wisdom shared in homilies, baptizing family members, being visited when sick—your pastor has helped your family.

Turn to Page 251,

Family + Faith Page and conclude with the Let's Pray prayer on this page.

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The Church Through Time

Preparation for the Session

Turn to Page 265, the Family + Faith page.

Read the **Consider This** feature. What thoughts or reactions do you have to the opening question?

In this chapter you will cover the following objectives:

- Define a covenant as a sacred promise between God and humans
- Examine the covenant between Abraham and God, which led to the beginning of God's People
- Recall that, through Jesus, the Church continues to be a sign of God's covenant, which extends to all people
- Recognize the faithfulness and commitment of early Christians to the covenant and to God

Parents, Consider This: From the time of the first people, humans gathered in community and made efforts to relate to God. They did so because God made us capable of hearing his invitation to relationship. After many generations, God called Abraham and Sarah to form a People who would be particularly his own. They heard his call and responded in faith. Can you hear the call of God amidst the noise and distractions of your life? It is not easy. Our lives are filled with so many, many things. Yet, as a parent, you have been given the responsibility to teach your child to listen for God's voice. Your family will grow in both a deep sense of unity and purpose when you join the generations before you who listened and responded to God's invitation.

INVITE: Encountering God in His Word

Turn to Page 257, The Church Through Time

After gathering the supplies that you will need, find a quiet place to be with your child. This is a sacred time—a time when you will be present to each other and to the Lord. You may want to light a candle as you begin.



Let Us Pray Invite your child to make the Sign of the Cross. Read aloud the Psalm verse from the book. Help your child to respond.

Explain that, after Jesus was raised from the dead and ascended into Heaven, there were not very many people outside of his own country who knew about him.

Say: The first disciples, strengthened by the Holy Spirit, learned how to live together and went out to spread the Good News.

Guide your child through the Preparing for God's Word Ritual you learned in the Introduction Session or play Track 1 of the *Songs of Scripture* CD.

- Proclaim God's Word in the Parchment Paper box on the page.
- Maintain several moments of silence.
- Ask: What did you hear God say to you today?

Invite your child to respond and also share what you heard.

Now, look at the What Do You Wonder? box.

Say: A very long time ago, God spoke to a man named Abraham and asked him to live as his friend. The promise, the covenant God made with Abraham, was to always be with him and his family. The coming of the Son of God shows us that God keeps his promises.

Invite your child to respond to the questions. Ask what else they might wonder about God's promises.

DISCOVER: Learning God's Truth

Turn to Page 258, God's Covenant

Read aloud the introduction to the Scripture.

Tell your child that they are about to hear a story about Abraham, Sarah, and Isaac. It is based on the very first book of the Bible, the Book of Genesis.



Proclaim the Scripture story (continued on page 259).

Point out that God later changed Abram's name to Abraham.

Ask: What family stories do you enjoy hearing again and again? Tell your child your favorite family story and your favorite story about him/her when he/she was younger.

Ask your child to read aloud the Catholic Faith Words, **covenant** and **proclaim**, and their definitions. Direct him/her to write the words on one side of the card and their definitions on the other. Save these cards for review.



Complete the gold-star activity.

Turn to Page 259, I Will Be Your God **Point** out that this lesson may seem to be on "fast forward" as it moves from Abraham to Jesus. Explain that the Bible contains so many stories about people's faith in God that one lesson cannot tell all of them.



Have your child complete the Share Your Faith activity.

Turn to Page 260,

The Early Church

Read the three paragraphs.

Explain that some people did not want to hear the Good News about Jesus and that they made laws against the Christian faith. Help your child understand the term persecution—harassment of or harm done to a group because of some difference.

Ask: Why is it important to learn about the early Christians? (They teach us how to live as disciples of Christ.)

Have your child read the caption over the photograph. Discuss this information with your child.

Review the definition of the Catholic Faith Word, faithful. Have your child write the word on one side of the card and its definition on the other. Keep the cards to use for review at the end of the unit.

Turn to Page 261, The Church Grows **Ask** your child to read aloud the paragraph under "The Church Grows."

Explain that many years passed between the beginnings of the Church and the time of the Irish and Scottish Saints. Even more time passed before the Church spread to the Americas.

Read aloud the paragraphs under "Into the Present."

Ask your child how he/she is part of the Church's history. (They follow Jesus and share their faith with others. They might be a parent someday and teach the faith to their children, or be a Catechist and teach the faith to many children.)



Have your child complete the Connect Your Faith activity.

Parents, Consider This: "Promises, promises..." You might have said those words yourself out of frustration because someone did not follow their promise with action. No Christian could ever utter those words to God. The covenant he made with Abraham and Moses resounds throughout history until the coming of his Son, Jesus. In Jesus, we see a promise fulfilled—the beginning of a new covenant that is realized in the ultimate sacrifice of love. In the promises you made at your child's Baptism, you pledged to raise your daughter/son in the awareness of the gift of that covenantal love. Keep your promise. It will lead your child to the promise of eternal life with the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

Read aloud the text on the page.

Complete the gold-star activity. Help your child find information about the topic she/he chose. Use the chart in the Live Your Faith activity on page 263 to organize the information. Ask your child to share that information with the rest of the family.

Read the paragraph about Saint Clement of Rome.

When the Church works for the care and liberation of those who are poor, she is acting as a parent who is giving that attention to the ones most in need. As Christians, we work to cooperate with God's Kingdom. We must look, not only into our own homes, but also outward, to those who are most in need of the Good News. Aiding those who are poor or in need shows solidarity with all humanity.

INVITE: Encountering God in His Word

Turn to Page 267, The Work of the Church

After gathering the supplies that you will need, find a quiet place to be with your child. This is a sacred time—a time when you will be present to each other and to the Lord. You may want to light a candle as you begin.



Let Us Pray Invite your child to make the Sign of the Cross. Read aloud the Psalm verse from the book. Help your child to respond.

Explain that because we are the Church, we have a mission.

Say: Our mission is to share the Good News and to serve God and each other. Saint Paul told the people who lived in Corinth how they should act.

Sau: When we respect others, we help bring God's peace to the world. When you work to make the world a place where people have what they need to live, you work for justice. As a member of the Church, you share in God's work.

Invite the children to respond to the questions. Ask what else they might wonder about living in peace.

DISCOVER: Learning God's Truth

Turn to Page 268, Doing Jesus'Work **Ask** your child to silently read the paragraph.

Have your child underline the sentence that tells the work of the Church.

Emphasize the idea that, as baptized members of the Church, we are all called to perform positive actions and work for the Kingdom of God.

Ask your child to explain how a simple action could help make a better future. Examples from this chapter's People of Faith feature may help start ideas flowing.



Proclaim the Scripture.

Ask your child what was the most difficult thing Jesus asked the disciples to do?

Turn to Page 269, Called to Work **Read** aloud the first paragraph.

Complete the gold-star activity. While your child fills in their answers in the book, answer each of the questions yourself on a separate piece of paper. After they share their answers with you, share your insights with them.

Turn to Page 270, The Church in the World

Have your child silently read the three paragraphs on this page.

Ask your child to tell you how we can share the Good News of Jesus.

Discuss a person you know who has impressed you with his/her actions as an example of sharing the Good News.



Complete the gold-star activity.

Read aloud the photo caption. Ask your child to tell you what is happening in the picture on this page and on page 271.

Turn to Page 271, Sharing a Mission

Alternate reading the first two paragraphs. When you get to the highlighted words, **peace** and **justice**, go to the Catholic Faith Words box and read their definitions. Have your child make vocabulary cards. Collect the cards so they can be reviewed at the end of the unit.

Read aloud the paragraph under "Why Help with the Church's Work?" Remind your child that all people are called to share their gifts and serve one another.



Have your child complete the Connect Your Faith activity.

Parents, Consider This: It is a wonder how many things we can cram into a twenty-four hour period. When parents are asked to describe their family life, the words most often used are harried, overwhelmed, and exhausted. In our culture, time is more valuable than money. It is a precious commodity. And yet, to live as a disciple of Christ we are called to service and that service takes time. It takes time to notice the needs around you. It takes time to imagine a way to help. It takes time to do what needs to be done. God is asking us to be intentional about the way we use the gift of time that he has given us. As your family serves those who are poor and vulnerable, you are a sign of God's love in the world.

In this chapter you will cover the following objectives:

- Reflect on Jesus' Resurrection as proof of his promise of eternal life
- Recognize that the last book of the Bible, Revelation, ends with John's vision of God's everlasting Kingdom
- Understand that the Particular Judgment is the individual judgment by God at the time of a person's death

INVITE: Encountering God in His Word

Turn to Page 277, Everlasting Life

After gathering the supplies that you will need, find a quiet place to be with your child. This is a sacred time—a time when you will be present to each other and to the Lord. You may want to light a candle as you begin.



Let Us Pray Invite your child to make the Sign of the Cross. Read aloud the Psalm verse from the book. Help your child to respond.

Explain that when Jesus rose from the dead, we had proof of his promise of eternal life.

Say: Eternal life means that when we die, we too can live forever with God, if we believe and accept his grace in our lives. Listen to Saint John describe the gift of eternal life.

Guide your child through the Preparing for God's Word Ritual you learned in the Introduction Session or play Track 1 of the Songs of Scripture CD.

- Proclaim God's Word in the Parchment Paper box on the page.
- Maintain several moments of silence.
- Ask: What did you hear God say to you today?

Say: If we are faithful to God, we will live forever with God in happiness. We call that Heaven. If we choose to turn completely away from God, we will be separated from him forever. We call that "Hell."

Now, look at the What Do You Wonder? box.

Invite your child to respond to the questions. Ask what else they might wonder about Heaven and everlasting life.

DISCOVER: Learning God's Truth

Turn to Page 278, Cycles of Life

Read aloud the first paragraph. Point out that the story on this page tells about both the beginning and the end of life.

Read aloud the story, "The Little Daisy," using your voice to express the character's feelings.

Ask: Why did Daisy feel better after learning that flowers would bloom from her seeds?

Ask your child if he/she has heard another story about a death that led to new life. Have them share that story.



Complete the gold-star activity.

Turn to Page 279, New Life **Ask** your child to read aloud the text to introduce the Scripture story.



Ask how John described the city in his vision. (a holy city of justice, love, and peace; a life with no more tears, sadness, suffering, or death)

Explain that the holy city is John's way of describing his vision of the new life Christians will have when Jesus returns.

Tell your child that, although death is an ending, it is also a beginning. Share with them about a time when you have suffered the loss of someone you loved. How did God's promise of eternal life bring you comfort and hope?

Remind your child that Jesus promised his followers everlasting life.



Have your child complete the Share Your Faith activity.

Turn to Page 280,Our Future

Alternate reading the paragraphs with your child. When you get to the highlighted words, **Heaven**, **Hell**, **Purgatory**, and **Last Judgment**, go to the Catholic Faith Words box and read their definitions.

Have your child make vocabulary cards and keep them so they can be used for review at the end of the unit.

Turn to Page 281,

The Beginning and the End

Read aloud these paragraphs.

Remind your child that as followers of Jesus, he/she can look forward to a reunion with God. The Catholic Church looks forward to the time when the Reign of God will come in its fullness.



Have your child complete the Connect Your Faith activity.

Parents, Consider This: Thoughts of the Last Judgment can make people uncomfortable. Jesus teaches that God is merciful and compassionate, just and loving. He gave humans free will; they are responsible for their actions. Upon death, it is time to face the ultimate truth. By their actions in this life, especially their acceptance or rejection of the grace and friendship God offers, all people choose everlasting life in Heaven or Hell. Helping your children understand that their choices have consequences that are both immediate but also far reaching, will help them develop wisdom. It will give them a consciousness that this life is only the beginning, and they will be able to welcome the next life with peace, not fear.
