Turn to Page 61, the Family + Faith page.

In this chapter you will help your child to:

• Recognize that the Bible presents the story of God's presence and his saving plan for his People

Turn to Page 53, Divine Revelation **Read** the **Consider This** feature. What thoughts or reactions do you have to the opening question?

Parents, Consider This: One of your most valuable tools that you have as a parent is sharing with your child the stories of your extended family and the lessons learned from them. In Sacred Scripture, God chose to teach us his truth through stories. Sharing your family stories and the stories of our faith from the Bible will help your child form an identity rooted in God's love and in yours. It will help him/her develop a sense of belonging to you and God.

INVITE: Encountering God in His Word

After gathering the supplies that you will need, find a quiet place to be with your child. This is a sacred time—a time when you will be present to each other and to the Lord. You may want to light a candle as you begin.



Let Us Pray Invite your child to make the Sign of the Cross. Read aloud the Psalm verse from the book. Help your child to respond.

Explain that God's words do more than give us information or offer instruction. With His Word, God made the world. We listen to God's Word not just to learn who he is, but to be shaped by it.

Say: Listen to how powerful God's words are in this Scripture passage.

- Proclaim God's Word in the Parchment Paper box on the page.
- Maintain several moments of silence.
- Ask: What did you hear God say to you today?

Now, look at the What Do You Wonder? box.

Say: Imagine if you could say something and it happened. If you said "cat," the word itself would be a cat. That's something like what God's Word is like.

Have your child read the questions in the box and respond. Prompt what else they might wonder about God's Word and what it means to us today.

DISCOVER: Learning God's Truth

Turn to Page 54,
God Makes
Himself KnownRead aloud the first paragraph. Tell your child your favorite story about
someone in your family that they know and love—a story he/she might
not know.

Say: Jesus was a great storyteller. He taught many lessons by telling stories.

Read the rest of the page and discover why stories are so important. When finished reading, ask your child who is the best storyteller in your family. You may want to think about recording that person telling some of your family stories.

Turn to Page 55,
Stories of Our FaithDirect your child to the Catholic Faith Words box and have them read
each word and definition to you one at a time. After each one, ask
her/him to tell you what it means in her/his own words.

Have your child follow along as you read the first three paragraphs. On a separate sheet of paper, ask your child to write a list of all the Bible stories they can remember. Perhaps offer an incentive, like for every story she/he thinks of, you will give one or two minutes of your time doing something she/he loves to do with you.

Let your child silently read the last two paragraphs on this page. Ask them to find the sentence that describes the fullness of God's plan and underline it.

Ask your child to open your Bible to the Table of Contents. Read the first two paragraphs on the page.

Turn to Page 56, Different Types of Writing in the Bible Have your child point to the first blue box, read the text, and then find the example in his/her Bible. Continue this process for the rest of the blue boxes. Emphasize that all of the titles in the blue boxes are literary forms.

Turn to Page 57, God's Message



Direct your child to the Connect Your Faith Activity. Remind them how to find the bible references. (Go to the Contents page and find the location of the Book. The first number indicates the chapter. The second set of numbers indicates the verses. Begin reading at the first number and conclude the reading at the end of the second number.) Have her/him complete the activity.

Parents, Consider This: You are about to share the story of Ruth and Naomi with your child. It focuses on the theme of faithfulness, God's faithfulness to us and our call to be faithful to him and one another. Your unconditional love for your child is a sign of God's faithfulness to him/her. What are the words and actions you use to help him/her understand that kind of love in your family? This is a message that your child needs to hear at every age.



Proclaim the Scripture. Ask your child to read the part of the narrator and Ruth. You read Naomi's part.

Invite your child to respond to the question following the Scripture story.

LIVE: Living Our Faith

Turn to Page 58, Our Catholic Life **Read** the first two paragraphs. Make sure your child understands the practice of *Lectio Divina* and how important it is that we allow God's Word to be part of our lives.

Point out that each session will begin with a prayerful reflection on Scripture similar to *Lectio Divina*.

Read "A Simple Reading Plan," together.

Encourage your child to choose a time at home to put this plan into practice and to follow the plan for two days. Making Scripture reading a part of your faith life as well would be the most effective way to teach this practice.

Turn to Page 59, People of Faith

Read the paragraph about Saint Teresa of Ávila.

- Share your reactions to the information.
- Talk about some ways your family can make Scripture a part of your family life.

your night prayer this week.

Discuss the first part of the Live Your Faith activity. Name one truth you live by that is found in the Bible. Invite your child to do the same. Talk about the importance of moving knowledge of the faith from your head to your heart to your hands. Ask your child to name someone they know who they believe lives their faith.

Parents, Consider This: Have you ever heard a song in the morning that you can't get out of your head? Imagine a world where what people heard in their heads all day was God's Word of peace, forgiveness, and compassion. Opening our hearts through the practice of reading and reflection of Scripture does truly form us. The Creation Accounts

Preparation for the Session

Turn to Page 71, the Family + Faith page.

In this chapter you will help your child to:

- Recall that the two accounts of creation teach that God alone is the Creator and that humans are his creatures
- Consider what it means to be made in God's image
- Recognize that the first man and woman were created by God in a state of Original Holiness, or grace
- Develop a desire to seek God's truth and share in his life
- Define eternity as time without end and new life beyond death

Turn to Page 63, The Creation Accounts **Read** the **Consider This** feature. What thoughts or reactions do you have to the opening question?

Parents, Consider This: The Book of Genesis begins with two accounts of creation. They give great assurance that no matter how the world evolved scientifically, the author of all creation is God. Giving praise to him is a way of living in your family that recognizes the gifts of creation and leads to a caring, responsible approach to his gift of creation. You need, however, to make it clear to your child that for Catholics, being eco-conscious is rooted in stewardship—living responsibly because all things are a gift from God.

INVITE: Encountering God in His Word

After gathering the supplies that you will need, find a quiet place to be with your child. This is a sacred time—a time when you will be present to each other and to the Lord. You may want to light a candle as you begin.



Let Us Pray Invite your child to make the Sign of the Cross. Read aloud the Psalm verse from the book. Help your child to respond.

Say: Listen to this Scripture about the Lord and where he has placed humans in creation.

- Proclaim God's Word in the Parchment Paper box on the page.
- Maintain several moments of silence.
- Ask: What did you hear God say to you today?

Now, look at the What Do You Wonder? box.

Say: Everything you see in the natural world comes from God. Pay attention and you'll see his glory in it all.

Invite your child to respond to the questions. Ask what else she/he might wonder about how human beings are unique in God's creation.

DISCOVER: Learning God's Truth

Turn to Page 64, In the Beginning Remind your child that Divine Revelation is how God makes himself known to us in Scripture and Tradition. We also come to know about God through his creation.

Ask: Which book of the Bible contains the creation accounts? (Genesis)

Have your child find and read the definition of the **Old Testament** in the Catholic Faith Words box.

Remind her/him that the Genesis passages present religious truths, as opposed to scientific or literal truth.



Read the Scripture from the Parchment Paper box.

Ask your child if she/he can remember what God created on which of the six days of creation. Have them write them on a piece of paper. Then review Genesis 1:14-25 and see how much of his/her list was correct.



Direct your child to complete the gold-star activity as they read the last three paragraphs on page 64.

Turn to Page 65, A Different Order Have your child continue to read the first paragraph on this page.



Proclaim the Scripture in the Parchment Paper box.

• Ask: Are you surprised that there are two different accounts of creation? Why do you think there are two accounts? (They come from two different groups of Jewish people. As Catholics, we do not ask which one actually happened, but rather, what is God telling us through both of these stories?)

• Say: These accounts, though different, teach one important truth—that God is the Creator of all things.

Have your child complete the Share Your Faith Activity.

Parents, Consider This: Our value and dignity do not come from our achievements, possessions, attractiveness, or status. They find their source in the truth that we are the work of God's hands. At this age your child has probably already begun to measure him/herself against others. Take every opportunity to help your child look at him/herself through God's eyes. If the Creator of the Universe created her/him—what a masterpiece she/he must be.

Turn to Page 66, Lessons of Creation

66, Ask your child to silently read page 66.

Point out that God created people to be in relationship with each other.

Discuss how people should treat one another, knowing that humans are made in God's image. (with respect and love)

Turn to Page 67, Truths about God **Direct** your child to the Catholic Faith Words box on the following page. Review the definitions to prepare for the reading.

Ask your child to read aloud the three paragraphs on this page.



Complete the gold-star activity. Discuss what your child underlines.

Parents, Consider This: One of the most basic rights of the human person is to be treated with dignity and respect. At school and at home your child encounters many ways in which people are bullied and hurt. They themselves may have been victims of this abuse. Take the time to discuss the simple ways to respect others found in the answers to the gold-star activity. Why not ask your child to recreate this list on the computer and use it as a constant reminder in your family of the ways you act with respect toward others?

Ask your child to respond to the question under the heading and then read the first paragraph.

- Share your reactions to the information.

God's Faithfulness

Preparation for the Session

Turn to Page 81, the Family + Faith page.

GRADE 6

In this chapter you will help your child to:

CHRIST

- Describe faithfulness as the loyalty and steadfastness that God shows to all humans even when they sin
- Discover that the first man and woman brought sin and death into the world through free choice
- Identify one of the effects of sin as separation from God
- Recognize that Jesus is the "new Adam" because he makes amends for the disobedience of Adam
- Develop a deeper understanding of Jesus as the fulfillment of the new covenant

Turn to Page 73, God's Faithfulness **Read** the **Consider This** feature. What thoughts or reactions do you have to the opening question?

Parents, Consider This: Because humans are created in the image of God, they are given the gift of freedom. As Genesis recounts the story of the fall of our first parents, it becomes clear that sin entered the world through humans who turned away from God's love. As a parent, you know what it is like when your child chooses something that you know will do them harm. Your heart is overwhelmed with pain and grief at the thought of what will now befall him/her. Your love always seeks her/his happiness. As you read the story of the fall of creation, imagine what God can see that Adam and Eve cannot.

Say: Listen to what Saint Paul tells us about faithfulness.

- Maintain several moments of silence.
- Ask: What did you hear God say to you today?

Now, look at the What Do You Wonder? box.

Say: If our faith should falter, we can still know that God has faith in us.

Invite your child to respond to the questions. Ask what else he/she might wonder about God's faithfulness.

DISCOVER: Learning God's Truth

Turn to Page 74, Humans Turn From God Point out that these two pages will address how God responds to human disobedience. Read aloud the first paragraph to introduce the Scripture story.



Have your child silently read about what happened in the Garden of Eden. Ask her/him to summarize the story of humankind's first sin.

Read aloud the paragraph at the bottom of the page.

Have your child underline what happened as a result of Adam and Eve eating the fruit of the tree. Spend some time discussing responses to the question on "forbidden fruit." Ask him/her what a 6th grader might be tempted to do. Share what you think an adult might be tempted to do in this world.

Turn to Page 75, God Makes a Covenant

Ask your child to read aloud the definitions in the Catholic Faith Words box.

Direct your child to read the first two paragraphs silently.

Parents, Consider This: All of the stories before Abraham are considered pre-history. Because it is God's inspired Word, the Holy Spirit speaking through the Church helps us to know what God wants us to learn in these stories. In all of these accounts the Church emphasizes that despite our sin, our failings, God is always faithful. Even while humans live in the consequences of the harm and unhappiness they have chosen, God is planning to send his Son to save them. Helping your child to understand this now will help him/her to trust God's providence in the future when life becomes even more challenging.



Proclaim the Scripture passage to your child.Ask your child what is important about the Noah story. (God,

promising his faithfulness forever, makes a covenant with Noah.)

 Together write a short sentence that you can both repeat that reminds you of your need to be faithful to God. Tell your child that he/she can repeat this one line prayer over and over when they are confronted with temptation or are feeling alone. The sentence should have no more than 14 syllables. (Help me to return the love you have given me.)

Introduce the Scripture story, remembering that this story is in the pre-history part of Genesis.



Proclaim the Scripture story.

• Remind your child that this account teaches us that the consequence of sin is people's inability to live in harmony.

Direct your child to the Catholic Faith Word box and have him/her read the definition aloud.

Read the paragraph under "Free Will," stopping at the highlighted vocabulary words and asking your child to tell you what they mean.

Turn to Page 77,
The New CovenantHave your child recall the definition of the word covenant. (a solemn
agreement or contract between two parties)

Ask him/her to silently read the text to find out how God revealed himself through a new covenant.

Read aloud the paragraph under "The New Adam."

Discuss with your child why Jesus is called the new Adam. (Jesus "undoes" what Adam did. He restores our relationship with God the Father that was ruptured by Adam.)

LIVE: Living Our Faith

B, Read aloud the first two paragraphs.

Explain the different meanings for the statement "God is faithful."

Talk about the importance of being reliable and faithful to others. This applies to both adults and children.

Have your child read the bubbles and then add his/her own examples.

Turn to Page 78, Our Catholic Life

Turn to Page 76, Sin and God's Faithfulness **Parents, Consider This:** Often, children this age have not developed skills to express their feelings appropriately. Accusing others ("Marcus took the CD") or judging how others feel ("Rose doesn't like me") leads to further dissatisfaction and arguments. Teach your child to use "I" language (for example, "I saw Marcus pick up the CD," or "I don't think Rose likes me very much") so as not to lead others to act defensively. In using this technique, you can help your child (and you) to develop healthy and faithful relationships.

Turn to Page 79, People of Faith

Read the paragraph about Blessed Peter To Rot.

- Share your reactions to the information.
- Talk about the courage it would take to be faithful to God if you were not free to practice your religion.



Discuss the last part of the Live Your Faith activity. Write a description of your child's faithfulness on a sheet of paper and ask her/him to describe yours on another sheet of paper. Talk about what you have learned from each other in this activity.

Turn to Page 81,

Family + Faith Page and conclude with the Let's Pray prayer on this page. **Parents, Consider This:** It's important to form our children in the common language of prayer. We encourage you to pray the Hail Mary (see Page 321) during your night prayer this week.

People of faith become more intimate with God through prayer. Often, the most fervent prayers emerge from situations that test a person's faith. Talk about prayer in your family. Recall a time when you were being tested in life and you turned to prayer. Share that story with your family. That is how they will know what to do in their hour of need.

INVITE: Encountering God in His Word

Read the rest of the page and discuss why David was grateful that people had been made in God's image.



Proclaim the Scripture story.

Point out that Abram and Sarai were not told in advance where they were to go. God told them to begin the journey, and they had faith that he had a plan for them.

Discuss the purple question at the bottom of the page with your child.

Turn to Page 89, Hav The Journey Continues

Have your child silently read the introductory paragraph.

Point out that God changed the names of both Abram and Sarai as a sign of the covenant he made with them.



Proclaim the Scripture story.

Discuss the purple question at the bottom of the page.



Have your child do the Share Your Faith activity. Once they complete it, have them share their answers with you.

Parents, Consider This: Abram and Sarai left their country of Ur (which is now Iraq), traveling along the Fertile Crescent of the ancient world to the Land of Caanan (which is now Israel). They journeyed through Haran, Scechem, and Hebron to the Negev desert area. They traveled with a large number of followers, flocks, and herds. It is hard to imagine the amount of trust they had in God to make the journey and the courage they had to lead the way for this large group. They were a family, in many ways, just like any family who is willing to be led by God. Consider what your family can learn about radical trust in God in this story.

Turn to Page 90, God's Plan of Salvation

Turn to Page 91,

God Invites

Read the question and the first paragraph. Together, make a family tree sketch of the names of Abraham's descendants' (mentioned in the text).



Have your child silently read the Scripture story of Joseph and retell the story to you.

Have your child silently read the first three paragraphs. Ask your child to underline the words in the text that tell who or what can help them on their journey of faith. (Bible, Seven Sacraments, Church, Jesus, the Holy Spirit)

Review the highlighted words. Ask your child to find the definitions in the Catholic Faith Word box on the previous page. Have them explain them to you in his or her own words.

Summarize the section "Faith and Prayer" and share that with your child.

Discuss the purple questions at the bottom of the page.

LIVE: Living Our Faith

Turn to Page 92, Our Catholic Life

Discuss the question, "What are some ways to develop your prayer life?" (read the Bible, pray different types of prayer, pray memorized prayer, pray in your own words)

Do the gold–star activity. Have your child share his or her answers with you. Review the "Forms of Prayer" chart after your child completes the activity.

Parents, Consider This: The Book of Psalms includes many different kinds of prayers. Prayers of blessing acknowledge God's gifts; prayers of adoration worship God the Creator; prayers of petition ask God for forgiveness of sin and care of needs; prayers of intercession pray to God for others; prayers of thanksgiving and praise thank God. The journey of faith involves communication with God. The Psalms are a rich source of prayers. Find a Psalm that is appropriate for your family. Share it as part of your family prayer this week.



Turn to Page 99, The Exodus Proo

Proclaim the Scripture story.

Ask your child to find the reason for the plagues in the Scripture passage. (Pharaoh refused to grant freedom to the Jewish people.)

Do the Share Your Faith activity. Have your child share his or her answer with you.

Parents, Consider This: In the hectic pace of life today, we may not often think about God's saving actions in our lives except in times of challenge or distress. But throughout our lives, through continued faith and the action of grace, we experience salvation. However, there may be areas where we, or someone in our family, are in need of his saving action. These are the concerns to bring to him in prayer, remembering God's faithfulness and his promise to our ancestors in faith. Bring these requests to God with trust in his saving grace.

Turn to Page 100, Memorial Meals

Summarize the information in the first paragraph.

Have your child silently read "The Passover Meal." Then discuss, together, the two questions at the end of that section.

Turn to Page 101, Jesus Saves Ask your child to silently read the first paragraph.

Explain how we participate in the new covenant. (by participating in the Seven Sacraments and/or by following Jesus)

Read aloud the second and third paragraphs together. Make sure that your child understands that the Eucharist is the Passover meal for Christians because Jesus replaced the Passover lamb of the Israelites.

Review the definitions of the words **Passover** and **Savior** in the Catholic Faith Words box.

Ask your child to describe the role of a present day judge. Explain that during the time of the Judges, Israel was ruled by God alone, through a type of government called a *theocracy*. Tell your child that the Greek word *theo* means "God" and that the word part *-cracy* means "rule by." Your child may be familiar with the term democracy. The word *demos* means "people"; therefore *democracy* means "rule by the people." This may help them understand this different time of history for our ancestors in faith.

Ask: Why do you think the Israelites wanted a human king? (They wanted to be like other nations.)

Continue reading alternating sections with your child. Point out the highlighted word **anoint** and review its definition in the Catholic Faith Words box (page 122).

> Review what happened when Saul was disobedient to God's will. (His army was defeated and he became unpopular.)

Ask: What do these results tell us about Saul as a leader? (Saul was successful as a leader as long as he followed God's will.)

Discuss with your child why he or she thinks God allowed Israel to have a king. (Responses will vary, but may include the fact that God gave his people free will.)

Turn to Page 123, Israel's First King



Parents, Consider This: In Israel's history, God called many different men and women to lead his People. The material in this chapter is an excellent opportunity to remind your child that leaders in our Church or in our home must always seek out God's will and follow that as a guide in life. Share with your child how you strive to know God's will and follow it in your family.

Turn to Page 124, A Line of Kings

Have your child read silently the opening question and paragraph. Tell your child that this story is about an ancestor of Jesus named David who became a leader.

Read aloud the text. Discuss how David set a good example for God's People by trying to follow and obey God. David can still be a good example for people today.



Turn to Page 125, Jesus, Son of David Have your child silently read the paragraphs under the "Jesus, Son of David" section. Review the definition of the highlighted word, **Christ**, in the Catholic Faith Words box.

Read aloud the text under the "Men of Prayer" section and review the definition of **psalms** in the Catholic Faith words box.



Have your child complete the Connect Your Faith activity.

Parents, Consider This: Every parent is the leader of faith in our own family. Without our example, discussion, teaching, and participating in faith practices, it is unlikely the members of our family will develop a deep faith. Like any leader, those who we lead will be most influenced by hearing what we say, as well as, watching what we do. The dedication and commitment to faith in our own life is founded on the relationship we have with God based on prayer and trust in God's constant care and abiding love.

Ask: Who were some of the people that learned from Hildegard's writings? (nobles, scholars, and religious people)

Point out that we can all learn from people who have wisdom. Review the definition of the Catholic Faith Word, **wisdom**, on page 133.



Do the gold-star activity.

Tell your child that the Hebrew people valued wisdom so highly that it is often mentioned in the sacred writings.

Have your child read the first two paragraphs.

Ask your child how he or she seeks wisdom. Discuss how we know that our sources of wisdom are reliable.

Read aloud the Proverbs on the page. Alternate reading with your child.



Do the gold-star activity.

Discuss the possible meanings of the Proverbs and which Proverbs you have found to be true in your lives.

Turn to Page 133, Wisdom Writing in the Bible

Have your child complete the Share Your Faith activity.

Parents, Consider This: The Book of Proverbs is a collection of poetry compiled in the fifth century, B.C. Its purpose is to teach wisdom. It is based on the principle that "the fear of the Lord is the beginning of knowledge." There is much valuable advice for parents, children, and families in this book. Explore the wisdom of this book of the Bible together as a family.

Turn to Page 134, The Wisdom Books

Turn to Page 135, A New Way of Seeing **Have** your child silently read the first two paragraphs. Then have them summarize what they read and tell you about it.



Proclaim the Scripture "Solomon's Request."

Discuss why Solomon would ask for an understanding heart.

Read aloud the last paragraph and discuss the questions at the bottom of the page.

Ask your child to name a popular belief that he or she thinks is true and another one they think is false. Point out that a belief may be popular, but may or may not be consistent with what we know from Scripture.

Read aloud the first two paragraphs to introduce the Scripture passage.



Have your child read the Scripture, "The Story of Job."

Discuss the two questions at the bottom of the page.

Turn to Page 136, Our Catholic Life Read aloud the two introductory paragraphs.

Share with your child that Elijah followed Moses as a mediator between God and Israel. Because Malachi predicted Elijah's return, some thought that Jesus was Elijah. He was important and a highly regarded prophet. His messages called for complete conversion, or change of heart.

Have your child read the letter on parchment paper and underline in the book why King Ahab should be considered the true "disturber of Israel."

Have your child silently read the text.

Review the "Who Are We?" chart. Read it aloud for your child and have him or her circle the names of the prophets when you say them.

Ask your child to explain what happened because the People did not listen to the prophets in the south. (They experienced great hardships, just as the prophets had warned.)



Do the Share Your Faith activity. If you have time, look up more than one of the Scripture passages. Discuss what your child discovers.

Turn to Page 143, Repentance and Restoration **Parents, Consider This:** Because your child has grown in an ability to understand various eras in Scripture, he or she might think of the prophets as people who foresaw the future. This is part of what prophets did, but prophecy means more than this. It is sharing God's Word with others. It is the call of our Baptism to share in Christ's message. Encourage your family to live this baptismal promise. Consider how one of the messages of the prophets you are reading about speaks to your family.

Turn to Page 144, Message of a Messiah **Read** aloud the text.

Review the definition of the word **Messiah** in the Catholic Faith Words box. Ask your child to tell you what Messiah means in his or her own words. Read the definition of the word **Incarnation**. Tell your child you will read more about this on the next page.



Have your child read aloud the Scripture.

Point out the artwork depicting the birth of Jesus, which fulfilled the prophecies.

Do the gold-star activity.

Turn to Page 145, Jesus the Christ **Read** aloud the first three paragraphs.

Have your child read the sections on Saint Paul and Dorothy Day. Then have them tell you what qualities Saint Paul and Dorothy Day have in common.

Have your child complete the Connect Your Faith activity.

Parents, Consider This: Discuss as a family what prophetic messages people need to hear today? Who are people in your community or extended family who have a prophetic message?

Now, look at the *What Do You Wonder?* box.

Jesus' message is Good News, and he himself is the Good News. It's our delight to discover both and to share that Good News with others.

Invite your child to respond to the questions. Ask what else they might wonder about Jesus' Good News.

DISCOVER: Learning God's Truth

Turn to Page 156,

Jesus is the Good News

Read aloud all three paragraphs.

Point out that Jesus was probably around your child's age in the Scripture story of Jesus in the Temple.

Ask: How could Jesus know so early in his life who he was and what his role would be?

Ask: What does the word Redeemer mean?

Read aloud the definition of **Redeemer** from the Catholic Faith Words box. Then read aloud the definition of the word **Sabbath**.

Ask your child if he/she has heard the term used before. (In the Ten Commandments: Remember the Sabbath day—keep it holy.)



Read the Scripture story. Ask your child to read Jesus' part. You be the narrator.

Discuss why anointing was significant in Jesus' day. (Anointing designated a person as chosen by God.)



Complete the gold-star activity.

Turn to Page 158, The Gospels

Turn to Page 157,

(cont'd)

Jesus is the Good News

Discuss the question at the top of the page.

Read aloud the first two paragraphs. As you read the text about each of the gospels on pages 158-159, have your child develop a list of facts for each Gospel on four separate index cards.

Encourage your child, during the week, to research the symbolism in the images for the Gospel writers shown on this spread (lion, ox, eagle and angel). Ask her/him to share what they have learned.

Turn to Page 159, The Church and the Gospels **Direct** your child to the Catholic Faith Words box on the previous page and review the definition for **Church**.

Ask: What does the phrase, "we trace our origins back to the Apostles," mean? (What we believe about Jesus was handed down to us from the Apostles who walked with him.)

Take turns reading the paragraphs on page 159.



Have your child look up the Bible passages listed in the Connect Your Faith activity. Then have them write a description of the image of the Church in each passage.

Parents, Consider This: Because we so often think of the Church as an institution, it is sometimes difficult to claim Saint Paul's words that we are the Body of Christ. Another way of imagining that is to understand, "where I go, the Church goes." Pope Francis says it this way: "... Jesus did not say: 'One of you go,' but 'All of you go': we are sent together. ... be aware of the companionship of the whole Church and also the communion of the saints on this mission. When we face challenges together, then we are strong, we discover resources we did not know we had. Jesus did not call the Apostles to live in isolation, he called them to form a group, a community" (Close of World Youth Day, 2013).

Read aloud each description of love and have your child add "love" at the beginning of each phrase you read.

Ask your child to circle the descriptions that best describe him/her, and underline the areas in which they feel they need to grow.

On a separate sheet of paper, write down the descriptions of love you believe your child exhibits. Share with them how the quality of her/his love affects the whole family. You may also want to discuss how not loving well also has an effect on the family.

Proclaim the Scripture, communicating the drama of the event.

Point out that the disciples believed in Jesus' promise, even though they did not know what would happen.



Have your child highlight the effect the Holy Spirit had on the Apostles.

Then, turn to page 324 in the Our Catholic Tradition section in the back of your child's book. Pray aloud the Prayer to the Holy Spirit.



Complete the Share Your Faith activity. Discuss the two gifts from the Holy Spirit (p. 318) that the world needs most.

Turn to Page 168, The Church's Work

Turn to Page 169,

Leaders and Martyrs

Read aloud the question at the top of the page. Tell your child he/she will learn the answer as you study the next two pages.

Ask your child to silently read the first paragraph and circle the word **mission** in the text. Read aloud its definition in the Catholic Faith Words box.

Ask: Have you ever been given a special mission or job before? Share a time when you were given a mission by someone. Bring the conversation back to the mission of the Church.

Summarize the text under "The Early Church."

Tell the children that Jesus promised the disciples that they would be his witnesses "to the ends of the earth." Saint Paul and others fulfilled this promise. (See Acts 1:8.)

Ask your child what he/she might know about Pope Francis. (He's the first Pope from Argentina; he's the first Pope who is from The Society of Jesus; he took the name Francis because of his love for the poor.)

Ask: Do you think it is a good idea to share Jesus' message through social media? What ideas do you have that could make young people your age pay attention to that message?

Say: Jesus tells us that love of God and love of our neighbor are not in competition with one another. If we truly love God, we will also love our neighbor.

Say: There are civil laws that help us to live in society, but the most important laws are the laws given to us by God that help us live in right relationship with him and others.

Read aloud the two paragraphs.

Remind your child that the Laws of Israel helped people to live in response to God's love. It helped them understand how to love God in return.

Point out that the Old Law is still important and that the Commandments are still binding today.

Emphasize that the Old Law was a preparation for the New Law revealed by Jesus.

Direct your child to find Jeremiah 31:33-34 in your Bible.



Proclaim God's Word.

Ask: What does it mean to have the law written in your heart? (We are creatures made by God; we desire to know good, truth, justice.)



Complete the gold-star activity.

Turn to Page 191, The Sacrifice of Jesus **Summarize** the paragraph, stressing that Jesus interpreted the Law in a new way.

Direct your child to find Matthew 17:1-8 in your Bible.



Ask your child to read the Scripture.

Read the next paragraph explaining the Transfiguration. Have your child read the definition of **Transfiguration** in the Catholic Faith Words box. Have them make a vocabulary card for this term.

Discuss the reaction of the Apostles as shown in the artwork on the page.

Ask: How would you have reacted if you had been there that day? Share with your child how you would have felt.

Complete the Share Your Faith activity together. Affirm something your child is doing in your family that is living in right relationship. Share your struggle in doing what is right. Try to give a specific example. (struggle with patience, with making time for doing things for others, etc.)

Summarize the first paragraph, emphasizing that Jesus summed up the Law of Moses and the prophets.



Read the Scripture aloud together.



Do the gold-star activity.

Tell your child to read aloud the last two paragraphs on the page.

Ask your child to take four index cards and, on each card, write the Catholic Faith Words: morality, Beatitudes, charity, and Precepts of the Church.

Read aloud each of the definitions in the Catholic Faith Words box without stating the actual Catholic Faith Word. Ask your child to find the index card that describes what you have just read.

Expand your discussion on the Beatitudes by having your child turn to page 316 in the Our Catholic Tradition reference section of their books.

Turn to Page 193, Freedom to Love Have your child silently read the two paragraphs.

Point out that many people in Jesus' day equated happiness with wealth, trouble-free living, and security. In fact, many people today still think the same way.

Ask: Who can help us follow the true path to happiness? (the Holy Spirit)

Talk about the importance of the virtue of charity. Give your child an example of a time when you saw her/him act with charity and discuss the difference it made.

Read aloud the two paragraphs. Turn to page 317 in the Our Catholic Tradition reference section of your child's book for a list of the Precepts of the Church.



As you explain the directions for the activity, draw a sample word map (the same as the one pictured in the activity), on a piece of paper. In the center circle, write the name of someone who is a Christian that your child knows. Around the person's name, write words that describe his/her Christ-like qualities. Once your child sees how it is done, have him/her complete the activity using a person of their choice.

Turn to Page 194, Our Catholic Life **Parents, Consider This:** Were you challenged by the lines in your child's text, "many people in Jesus' day equated happiness with trouble-free lives, security, and wealth"? In many ways, things haven't changed much in two thousand years. It is so easy for our thinking, and thus our actions, to become disordered. The Great Commandment and the Precepts of the Church help us to keep our hearts centered in the love that is offered to us in Jesus. They give us the capacity to understand what our loving response must be. Guiding your child to make decisions based on God's laws will set her/him on the true path of happiness in this life and the next.

Justice and Peace

GRADE 6

- Define justice as giving God and others what is due to them

Parents, Consider This: The Church follows the path of the prophets by recognizing that all humans live in solidarity with one another. To live in justice means to respect the dignity of all, to protect life in all its forms, and to be champions of those whose basic needs are being denied. The presence of injustice in society is a sign of social sin. Social sins are structures in society that promote injustice or make it difficult for people to care for one another. It is the responsibility of all Christians to work for the common good at every level of society.

INVITE: Encountering God in His Word

After gathering the supplies that you will need, find a quiet place to be with your child. This is a sacred time—a time when you will be present to each other and to the Lord. You may want to light a candle as you begin.



Let Us Pray Invite your child to make the Sign of the Cross. Read aloud the Psalm verse from the book. Help your child to respond.

Say: Over and over, the Scriptures remind us that God is just. Over and over, the Scriptures challenge us to work for justice for all of God's People.

Turn to Page 199, Justice and Peace **Guide** your child through the Preparing for God's Word Ritual you learned in the Introduction Session or play Track 1 of the *Songs of Scripture* CD.

- Proclaim God's Word in the Parchment Paper box on the page.
- Maintain several moments of silence.
- Ask: What did you hear God say to you today?

Invite your child to respond and also share what you heard.

Now, look at the *What Do You Wonder?* box.

Say: We sometimes confuse justice with fairness. It is important to understand the difference. Today we will talk about God's constant demand that we work for justice in the world.

Invite your child to respond to the questions. Ask what else they might wonder about justice and acting as a peacemaker.

DISCOVER: Learning God's Truth

Turn to Page 200, Seeking Justice Ask: What does it mean to act justly?

Alternate reading the paragraphs with your child. When you come to the highlighted Catholic Faith Words, **justice**, **virtue**, and **grace**, go to the Catholic Faith Words box and read their definitions.

Emphasize that the search for justice is a response to the natural moral law, which expresses the God-given dignity of all persons.

Turn to Page 201, The Beatitudes **Invite** your child to find Matthew 5: 3-10 in your Bible.



Proclaim the Scripture to your child.

Ask your child what message he/she heard about justice in this passage. ("Those who hunger and thirst for righteousness," is another way of saying "justice.")


Read aloud the Share Your Faith activity instructions. Both of you think of a situation and share the injustice with each other.

Turn to Page 202, Peace **Tell** your child you are going to explore the relationship between peace and justice.

Have your child silently read the text under the "Peace" heading.

Give your child a blank sheet of paper. Have him/her fold it into threes. At the top of each column write: Hosea, Amos and Micah. Ask your child to read "Three Prophets," and in each column under the name of the prophet, ask her/him to record the central idea of what the prophet says.

Go to your Bible and find Micah 6:8 and read the text. Look for the books of the other prophets as well.



Read aloud the first paragraph.

Turn to Page 203, Justice Seekers and Peacemakers

Direct your child to read aloud one of the boxes in the side column.

Discuss why the word "duty" is used in each box and not "suggestion."

Read the last paragraph silently together. Discuss examples of social sins.

Read aloud the first paragraph. Alternate reading the rest of the text on the page.

Ask your child to point out the difference between mortal and venial sin. (Mortal sin is a serious and deliberate act that rejects God; venial sin is less serious.)

Give your child examples of a venial sin and a mortal sin. (lying about homework, taking a pencil from your sister's supplies/murder, stealing someone's life savings) To make sure he/she understands the difference between the types of sins, encourage your child to come up with a few examples of their own.

Review definitions of **sin**, **venial sin**, and **mortal sin**, in Catholic Faith Words box.

Remind your child that parables teach religious truths.

Tell your child to silently read the Scripture passage. When he/she has finished reading, ask him/her to point out the details that are the same in the first and second paragraphs. (The one owing money begs for mercy.) Then ask how the second incident differs from the first. (The servant does not follow the example of mercy set by his master.)

Emphasize that we are to forgive one another as God forgives us.

Read the directions for the Share Your Faith activity. Take the time to discuss with each other, the ways that you show forgiveness as a family. Make suggestions for dealing with the hurt or anger that you feel when you are harmed. This is one of the most valuable lessons your family teaches.

Turn to Page 212, Making Things Bight

Making Things Right

This part of the lesson will review what the Church teaches about an informed conscience. The importance of this teaching cannot be emphasized enough as you help your child to make good decisions.

Read the first two paragraphs aloud. Ask your child to retell what you read in his/her own words.

Review the definition of the Catholic Faith Word, **conscience**.

Read aloud the text in the next section. Then have your child silently read the "Celebrating the Sacrament" chart.

Ask your child to look at the pictures at the top of pages 212 and 213 and identify which steps are probably occurring in each.

Pray the Act of Contrition (found in the yellow box), together.

Parents, Consider This: There are moments in our lives when we believe the worst about ourselves; moments when we think we are unforgivable. At Mass, we are reminded that throughout the history of salvation, God never abandoned those who had sinned or failed to keep their covenant with him. There is no sin that cannot be touched by God's mercy when sinners turn their hearts back to him. God has given us the gift of the Sacrament of Penance. In the Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation, people experience and celebrate God's mercy and forgiveness by confessing their sins and pledging to do what is right and good.

Turn to Page 213, Effects of the Sacrament **Ask** your child to read aloud the text and then name the benefits of the Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation. (friendship with God is restored or healed; reconciliation with the Church; freedom from the threat of hell; peace and strength to do what is right and good)

Have your child complete the Connect Your Faith activity.

LIVE: Living Our Faith

Turn to Page 214, Our Catholic Life Read aloud the introductory paragraphs.

Explain that a conscience must be exercised to remain informed.

Ask your child to tell you what is happening in the cartoon story to the left. Help him/her to imagine what decision the girl might be making.

Parents, Consider This: The Apostles willingly carried out the mission of Jesus. Jesus gives us the Holy Spirit to help us on our mission, which begins when we enter into the Christian life through the Baptism. At his or her age, your child may not consider him or herself a "missionary," but the Church teaches that as baptized persons, we are all called to spread the Gospel to others. We do this most often by example. In time, we may learn how to use words to articulate what we believe. Turn to Page 227, Sacraments of Initiation (cont'd) **Continue** to read the text about Confirmation. Then read the text in the "Eucharist" section. Tell your child to look for the terms that the Church uses for the Eucharist.

Ask: Why do you think the celebration of the Eucharist completes the Sacraments of Initiation? (At the altar, we are united with the People of God.)

Write the words, Eucharist, transubstantiation, Real Presence, and Tabernacle on index cards. Have your child read their definitions in the Catholic Faith Words box on page 226. When your child is confident of their meanings, read each definition and have your child hold up the word that matches the definition.

Parents, Consider This: Although a few of us might find it difficult to ask for help, wouldn't it be nice to know that you had a whole community of people who were there to help when you needed it? Living with that kind of support would lessen some of the anxiety we walk around with daily. Actually, you were given the gift of that community at Baptism—the Communion of Saints. All of the faithful, both living and dead, are included in the Communion of Saints. Christians believe that death does not mean an end to their relationship with those who have died, but a change, because not even death can separate people from the love of Christ.

INVITE: Encountering God in His Word

After gathering the supplies that you will need, find a quiet place to be with your child. This is a sacred time—a time when you will be present to each other and to the Lord. You may want to light a candle as you begin.



Let Us Pray Invite your child to make the Sign of the Cross. Read aloud the Psalm verse from the book. Help your child to respond.

Say: It is sometimes hard to imagine that God created us all to be Saints. Sometimes we think that the Saints did not have struggles and challenges, but they were human beings just like us. In God's Word today, we will

hear an invitation to be God's beloved children, so that his grace can help us to live holy lives.



Guide your child through the Preparing for God's Word Ritual you learned in the Introduction Session or play Track 1 of the Songs of Scripture CD.

- Proclaim God's Word in the Parchment Paper box on the page.
- Maintain several moments of silence.
- Ask: What did you hear God say to you today?

Invite your child to respond and also share what you heard.

Now, look at the What Do You Wonder? box.

Say: These words of Saint Paul, originally addressed to the Church at Rome, also comprise an invitation issued to us at our Baptism. After presenting a lighted candle the priest says,"...walk always as children of the light... When the Lord comes, may they go out to meet him with all the saints in the Heavenly kingdom" (Rite of Baptism, 64). God calls all of us to be Saints.

Invite your child to respond to the questions. Ask what else they might wonder about Saints-both living and dead.

DISCOVER: Learning God's Truth

Turn to Page 258, The Church Community **Read** aloud the first two paragraphs as an introduction to the Scripture passage.

Ask your child to tell you the group that she/he felt most oneness with. Share with your child the group where you experienced the greatest sense of oneness.



Ask your child to find Acts 2:42-47 in your family Bible and then proclaim the Scripture.

Turn to Page 259, All the Faithful

Invite your child to silently read the text and to look for ways in which believers are united.



Complete the gold-star activity.

Review the definitions of the words, Communion of Saints, Heaven, Purgatory, and Hell, presented in the Catholic Faith Words box on page 258.

Ask your child to explain which believers are honored on All Saints' Day. (all those who are with God in Heaven)

Ask which believers are prayed for on All Souls' Day. (those in Purgatory)

Share with your child someone in your family who has died that you consider a "Saint." Talk about the virtues and attitudes this person had that helped you to know God.

-AGINIGY-

Have your child complete the Share Your Faith activity.

Parents, Consider This: Life is all about choices. There are moments when we look back at decisions we have made and wonder how different things would be if we had not made a particular choice. Knowing the importance of those choices, how is it that we do not spend much time thinking about the ultimate choice we have been given—the choice of where we will spend eternity? If your child lives with the security and joy of knowing that God created her/him for an eternity of communion with him, this life will have meaning and purpose. Guiding him/her to make the choices that will help him/her accept this gift from God is your true purpose.

Turn to Page 260, Charity and Prayer Charity and Prayer do with the Communion of Saints as you cover the next two pages.

Read aloud the text in this section, alternating paragraphs with your child.

On a separate sheet of blank paper, ask your child to draw a triangle in the middle. At each point of the triangle, have her/him write the name of one of the three persons of the Holy Trinity. In the middle of the triangle, direct your child to draw a heart. Remind her/him that all love begins in the heart of God the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

Look up the Spiritual Works of Mercy on page 318 of the Our Catholic Tradition reference section and discuss how these actions are the way we share God's loving presence in the world.

Look at the definitions for the Catholic Faith Words, Corporal Works of Mercy and Spiritual Works of Mercy, in the Catholic Faith Words box on page 261.

Turn to Page 261, Have your child silently read the information under "Intercessory Prayer."

Brainstorm people or causes that we include in intercessory prayers. (people who are sick, Church and government leaders, family and friends, unity in the Church)

Intercessory Prayer

Have your child underline the different ways to pray that are mentioned in the reading.

Ask: What way to pray feels most comfortable for you?

Share your favorite way to pray. Emphasize your need to pray to your child. He/she might not see you do so and assume that you do not pray.

Read aloud the two paragraphs under "Personal Prayer."

Ask your child to explain reflection in their own words.



Have your child work on the Connect Your Faith activity. Give your child a blank index card. List the people you know who have died on one side of the card. Ask your child to draw a sacred image on the other side. Place the card in his/her room as a reminder to pray for these people that you love.

Ask: Why do you think unity was so important to Jesus?

Parents, Consider This: While ecumenism has been a great gift to the Church in the past decades, there is a subtle danger when we think, "We are all Christians, so there must not be too much of a difference among us." Each Christian denomination has its own creed, its own set of beliefs. While many of our beliefs we hold in common, there are sometimes small—sometimes big—differences. That is why it's critical to not only know, but be able to articulate, your Catholic faith so that you can first share it with your children and then respectively with your neighbor.

Parents, Consider This: Within your lifespan, how many times have you heard the end of the world was imminent? Some person or group is always calling us to pay attention for the time is near. Life is short. Time is limited. What is really important? Whether we are reflecting on our own death or the end of the world, Christians do so with joy. We trust that the God of love—who created us in love—wants us to live in response to his love, so that someday we will live in the fullness of his love. Meditate on that truth and live each day in your family as if it were your last on Earth.

Let Us Pray Invite your child to make the Sign of the Cross. Read aloud the Psalm verse from the book. Help your child to respond.

Say: In the Nicene Creed, we pray, "I look forward to the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come." Until the new world arrives, we strive to live holy lives as "we await the blessed hope and the coming of our Savior, Jesus Christ" (*Roman Missal*).

- Ask: What did you hear God say to you today?

Say: Hope is the virtue that trusts God will act on our behalf. It is not wishful thinking, but the sure conviction that God will keep his promise of a new creation where we will enjoy happiness with him forever.

Invite your child to respond to the questions. Ask what else they might wonder about the end of our lives.

DISCOVER: Learning God's Truth

Turn to Page 278,

The Triumph of Good

Read aloud the first paragraph. Discuss the difference between literal and symbolic language. Ask your child to give you examples of each.

Have your child read aloud the rest of the text. Stop at the highlighted word, **apocalyptic literature**, and have them read the definition in the Catholic Faith Words box.

Ask: How does apocalyptic literature differ from most books that you have read? (It uses numbers and symbols to help convey a message.)

Ask the children why the Holy Spirit inspired John to write the Book of Revelation. (to encourage Christians in a time of persecution)



Have your child locate Revelation 21:1-4 in your Bible. Read the Scripture passage.

Ask: What is God's message for us today?

Listen to the Song, "New Jerusalem," on the Songs of Scripture CD, Track 22. You can find the lyrics at aliveinchrist.osv.com. Discuss the lyrics and ask your child to tell you what he/she understands the image of the New Jerusalem to mean.

Turn to Page 279, Unveiling the Future **Read** aloud all three paragraphs. Tell your child to follow along in the book as you read. Then use the "Key to Revelation" and reread the text. Discuss the images mentioned.

Invite your child to share ideas about why the symbols were used. (The symbols were important because those who might want to harm Christians would not understand the meaning of the book, but Christians facing persecution would understand its meaning.) Sacred Scripture is not always easy for us to understand the first time we read it. Go to page 304 in the Our Catholic Tradition reference section of your child's book and read "How to Better Understand Scripture."

Discuss the difference between the Bible and a history book.

On a separate sheet of paper ask your child to write a list of the evils in the world that she/he would like God to conquer.

Parents, Consider This: There are some news stories we read or news reports we hear that make us wonder, "What is this world coming to?" Or, we learn of places in the world where people are suffering and dying because of natural disasters or disease and we might wonder, "How can this be?" We may even ask what kind of world are we creating and leaving for our children and grandchildren? All we can do is hope. Hope, however, is not a wish. It is a gift from God that helps us to trust that God can redeem all evil. It is a virtue that helps us trust that God has created us for life eternal and will offer us the grace to receive it.

Remind your child that we believe God has the power to conquer all evil and that the time will come when God will defeat every evil.

Turn to Page 280,Alternate reading aloud the paragraphs.Hope for the Future

Ask: How does our belief in the Resurrection affect how you feel about the people we love who have died? How should it affect the way we live today?

Remind your child that the Resurrection is the foundation for all Christian living and future hope. We believe that our bodies will also rise to new life. While we do not know what form it will take, we will once again be body and soul.

Look at the illustration of the Resurrection. Talk about what the women must have felt like before they went to the tomb and after they left the tomb.

Turn to Page 281, New Creation

Invite your child to silently read the text.

Tell him/her to look for ideas and images of what the new creation will be like. Point out that the Church is the beginning of the New Jerusalem on Earth.

Read the definitions of the words, **Resurrection** and **new creation**, in the Catholic Faith Words box.

Ask your child what the "new Jerusalem" would look like here on Earth. What would be the indicators that evil had been conquered once and for all and that we were truly living in the Reign of God? Share what would make you most happy in this "new city."

Our Catholic LifeTell your child that they may hear some people talk about the end of the
world. They talk about destruction and pain. Catholics emphasize God's

Have your child read aloud the next three paragraphs.

- Share your reactions to the information.
