From the Pastor's Desk ---

Last week I had nothing to tell you. Then I was saved when I opened my emails and saw that we were approved for a Payroll Protection Plan loan. This week I didn't have anything to tell you either until the conclusion of a conference call.

The pastors had another zoom meeting with the Bishop today. As I said in my announcements after Mass on Sunday, I don't do the zoom. I call in so that no one sees me or my mess in my office and also so that I can put the phone on speaker and walk around the room, stretch, snack, etc. The Bishop and the Vicar General are very good communicators, and I enjoy their portion of these meetings. But watch out when the meeting is turned over to questions/comments from the pastors! They talk too much and wear me out. At that point in these meetings I can do other things. The Bishop has prepared a draft for the eventual return to public worship. We were asked not to discuss the particulars until he has written a letter to the Faithful and issued the prescriptions that we will need to follow. I know everyone wants to know when public Mass will resume. No one yet knows. It depends upon what the Governor decides. The Bishop is optimistic that we will begin in mid-June.

The Bishop's talk covered fundamental principles that we will have to follow and considerations that each pastor and his parish will have to work out. There are procedures that have to be universally followed, but because every church's size and layout is different there will be some local differences in how they are applied. First and foremost, we have to be diligent about the safety and health of everyone who comes to Mass and the preservation of the integrity and sacredness of the Mass. We will have to abide by social distancing and rules about masks and sanitation. Because the Eucharist is an intimate experience, we as Catholics have some peculiar considerations, don't we? The Bishop mentioned that he and Archbishop Blair have spoken about having a set of principles that would be implemented in all of the parishes statewide. I will talk more about the principles as we go forward.

Among the preparations that I need to make is the formation of a group of parishioners who would be willing to oversee the arrangements Sunday to Sunday. Not everyone is going to feel comfortable coming back to Mass and no one has to. (And, I may as well add now, we probably cannot all fit given limits to the size of gatherings.) Some of us, whether or not we have predisposing conditions, may need or want to stay away from public spaces.

Realizing that a risk of exposure is always present no matter how many things we do to mitigate it, the Bishop is not going to reinstate for some time to come the obligation to attend Sunday Mass. For these reasons, our parish will continue to stream Mass even when we re-open. I am looking to form a team of four to six individuals for each of our five English Masses. It's still a little early, but if you are in good health, not in a high risk group, willing to return to public worship and to help with the logistics, kindly send me an email (frgmecca@aol.com) and I will begin to compile a list of names. Some of the things I will need help with are keeping a count of the number of people in the building, seeing to it that everyone has a face mask, and sanitizing surfaces touched after the conclusion of Mass. When our plan is pulled together, I would distribute it to you and then we would meet prior to the Sunday when we return. I appreciate your consideration.

Well, mothers. It's certainly not the nicest of Mother's Days, and I don't know if you want to eat your husband's cooking, but Fr. Riley and I wish you a pleasant day nonetheless. We honor you and thank you for your selfless love, the love that Our Lord and Blessed Mother exhibit.
