

We celebrate the Second Sunday of Lent today. Our Gospel is the Transfiguration of the Lord. No matter which of the three Sunday cycles that we are in, the first two Sundays of Lent are always the accounts of the Temptations in the Desert and the Transfiguration. After that, the remaining three Sunday Gospels are different. This year, Year A, we have the original Lenten readings, that is to say, the readings that were heard yearly until the Church adopted a three-year cycle. Arguably, they are the "best Gospels" because they are tremendously moving and instructive accounts. But that is a topic for following weeks. The Transfiguration is quite spectacular. There is no wonder that the three Apostles are frightened to death. Jesus changes in appearance before their eyes. His body is, how shall we say, illuminated, and if that were not bewildering and out of this world, Moses and Elijah appear and the three are having a conversation. What is Peter, James, and John to make of this scene? I think I just hit upon the answer. Jesus is out of this world, in other words, Jesus does not belong exclusively to this world as we may think of ourselves. He is also other worldly. He is divine. The Apostles see the divine nature coming through his human nature. They are receiving a glimpse of how the Lord will look after the Resurrection. I have wondered if on that first Easter evening when Jesus appears to them, Peter, James and John exclaimed "that's how he looked on the top of the mountain!" We might find ourselves considering why the Apostles were so shocked at Easter. I guess that despite the witness to his divinity that Jesus gave them, it was too big of a stretch to confidently trust that divinity cannot die. Aren't we like that? We question and worry that the divinity in us won't rise. Lent reminds us that we are residents of both earth and heaven and our soul will rise but only if while in this world we project the divinity within us. Our Lenten disciplines and practices make us more radiant.

Since I just happened to mention disciplines and practices, I remind you of the value of setting aside time, especially on Fridays, for personal and communal prayer, like the Stations of the Cross, our Soup and spiritual talk preceding the Stations, our parish almsgiving, and the Loaves & Fish campaign to feed the hungry in our county.

Every year All Saints Press sends out samples of some of their Lenten publications. Included in the packet will be a card which on one side has a piece of artwork and on the other a prayer or two. I keep these cards and should share the prayers. Here is one written by St. Bonaventure.

Lord, Holy Father,

show us what kind of man it is who is hanging for our sakes on the cross, whose suffering causes the rocks themselves to crack and crumble with compassion, whose death brings the dead back to life.

Let my heart crack and crumble at the sight of him. Let my soul break apart with compassion for his suffering. Let it be shattered with grief at my sins for which he dies. And finally let it be softened with devoted love for him.

REGISTRATION 2023/2024- There have been numerous inquiries about registration for the next religious education school year. While the enthusiasm to register is exciting we are challenged to provide the classes needed to accept everyone. However, like all religious education programs we operate with kindhearted, dedicated volunteers. We need your help to provide the number of classes to ensure that everyone who comes to us for instruction has a space. Currently we need Catechists and Assistant Catechists for every level but especially for First Communion One classes. We cannot register any students unless we have classes with a Catechist and an Assistant Catechist to teach. Please be aware that students already in our program will register first, then students of registered parishioners and students from neighboring parishes if we have space.

We are committed to providing these meals on the first and fourth Sunday of each month.

The demand has been increasing as inflation has been rising and we find that we could use more hands to help with this ministry. If you would like to cook a tray of food once a month or even every month this could help tremendously. Examples of what we currently provide would be trays of chicken, meat loaf, sausage and peppers, mashed or roasted potato, rice and beans, vegetables of any variety, green salad etc. There is no particular request- just anything you might cook at home for your family. The only item excluded would be pasta- so much already comes in!

The first and fourth Sunday we would ask that you bring your donation to the parking lot here at church at 11:30 and we would gather the food and transport it to the Dorothy Day House.

LENTEN REGULATIONS

The church gives us the following regulations for Lent:*Fasting and Abstinence on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are required for those 18 to 60 years of age.
*Abstinence from meat is required on ALL Fridays during Lent for all those 14 years of age and older.
Fasting is defined as eating, during the day, only one full meal and two light meatless meals. Eating between meals is not permitted, although liquids are permitted.
Abstinence is not eating meat at all during the entire day. Illness exempts one from these regulations.
