

Lent has begun. What is Lent but a journey toward a more authentically lived life of God. God long ago entered

into a Covenant with His people. In that sacred relationship, God adopted a people to be His own. He promised to be with His people forever. He promised to give His people life, an authentic life because it is His life. After the Resurrection, the Apostles began baptizing followers into this life of God made more perfectly manifest by Jesus. The Covenant was extended to everyone. God's promises extended to everyone. The Baptized agreed on their part to reject evil and sin and to embrace the Lord's teachings. We have done the same thing. First, our parents and Godparents made the statements for us at our Baptism, then, we did ourselves at our Confirmation. Each Easter Sunday we renew those promises. Nonetheless, we can stray, we can fall into bad habits, we forget our obligation to God to live exclusively by His Word and not by our ego or by very wrong ideas circulating within society. Lent is our annual recommitment to God. The first words we hear from Scripture on Ash Wednesday are "return to me with your whole heart" from the Prophet Joel. We listen to the Lord, we examine where and how we have strayed, and we make the appropriate changes. As I said to the 8th graders recently, God does not ask something of us without giving us the means to accomplish it. God has given us His Spirit, He has given us precepts to follow, He has given us His Son in the flesh as teacher and example, and He has provided us with the Sacraments within His Church to guide, strengthen, and sanctify. We take full advantage of all of this during Lent to make us better reflections of Jesus.

I understand that parishioners have received their Annual Bishop's Appeal letter and invitation form the Bishiop to participate in this year's campaign. I have to rely on others to know when the letter arrives at your homes because the letter to the priests comes a couple of weeks later. I am aware of how many requests from so many worthy causes asking us for support. I have a stack of solicitations on my upstairs desk. I suspect as with me, several of the solicitations you have are from Catholic organizations. During Advent, I just never got around to making gifts, but I will during Lent as part of my almsgiving. If you never thought about the ABA in this way, include it as an act of almsgiving because it very much is. Remember, the ABA dollars go to people whom the Church serves and not towards the operational expenses of the diocese. Those are covered by the monthly tax on the parishes. The ABA is for the Church's charitable and evangelical outreach and spiritual and educational formation of its members. Our gift benefits people we will likely never meet but also people right here at home, particularly the children in our Religious Formation classes and our St. Peter School through

to our program and tuition assistance. This Lent, select the Appeal as one of the recipients of your almsgiving, and remember, small gifts are not insignificant.

Looking back a week, Cecil De Mille's "King of Kings" tops the list of Jesus films! There were so many moments that were moving and noteworthy in the sense of cinematography. A lot of us have been talking about it this week. One example that impacted me was how the viewer did not see the face of Jesus until we saw it through the eyes of the girl whom Jesus cured of blindness. The out of focus, fuzzy image gradually sharpens, and we experience seeing the face of our God. Genius! Brilliant, too, was Peter on the organ and our choir when they so subtly and delicately became part of the soundtrack. I thank them for their gift of their time and talent and Glen for bringing us a wonderful experience.

Reflections on Gregorian Chant – Part 1

Before reflecting specifically on the importance and beauty of Gregorian chant, I believe it would be helpful to review what the Second Vatican Council had to say about Latin and the vernacular in the liturgy.

The Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy (1963), the foundational document outlining the liturgical reforms of the Second Vatican Council, states: "... the use of the Latin language is to be preserved in the Latin rites." (§36). It then goes on to make exceptions to this rule, suggesting that the use of the vernacular may be of "great advantage to the people," especially regarding the readings and the prayers. What are we to make of this? Latin is to be preserved, but the vernacular may be permitted. Isn't this a contradiction?

Concerning the vernacular, the Council Fathers wanted the faithful to experience more deeply the love God has for us through Jesus Christ. How? Through "full, active, and conscious" participation at the liturgy. But how can we possibly achieve full, active, and conscious participation when the liturgy is in a language we do not understand? Indeed, allowing the liturgy to be celebrated in one's mother tongue was not only inevitable, but one of the most beautiful reforms to come out of Vatican II. But what about Latin? That will be the topic of next week's reflection.
