



#### KINDLY REMEMBER THE SICK OF THE PARISH

On the first Sunday of Lent, the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults moves into a more intense period of preparation. In

the tradition of the Church the catechumens and the candidates for full communion within the Church are invited to the cathedral to meet with the Bishop. We have three women all of whom are catechumens, that is to say unbaptized persons seeking entrance into the Catholic Faith. They are Sypaseuth Khounvongsa, called Sissy, Eliana King, and Mixtli Suarez. Sissy, Eliana, and Mixtli and their sponsors met two of our catechists and me at the cathedral and we sat in a pew together. At the ceremony last Sunday, they were presented to the Bishop by standing and their sponsors were asked to give testimony to their preparedness for the Sacraments. They were asked if they were faithfully listening to God's word proclaimed by the Church, if they were responding to the word and walking in God's presence, and if they have been joining us in prayer. With that done, the Bishop called them to the Easter sacraments. They have been elected, or, selected (from the Latin verb eligere) by the Christian Community, ie. the Church for entrance. For the remaining weeks of Lent, if I remember to dismiss our three catechumens for their instruction after the homily, I should call them the Elect. During the Lenten season, we pray more consistently for the Elect that they may be drawn more deeply into a relationship with Christ.

As we continue our Lenten journey, I want to encourage us in keeping to our prayer, reflection on God's word, and good works. I was very pleased that every copy of the Word Among Us in both languages was gone by the end of last weekend's Masses. I don't want to rank Lenten practices, but reading the scriptures and reflecting on God's Word is very important. How do we know who God is? How do we know what God desires for us? By listening to Him. I feel fortunate that reflecting on God's Word is necessarily built into my day. I HAVE to read the scriptures prior to Mass and to think about them because I have to have something to say about them to those present. The Lectionary drives my reading, and I'm glad that it does because it provides me with passages that people much smarter than me chose for their value. The scripture passages for Lent speak to us of faithfulness to the covenant we have with God, of right behavior, and of a love that gives us life.

Speaking of a love that gives life, keep in mind the value of participating in the devotion of the Stations of the Cross. This Friday is the First Friday of the month, so I will expose the Blessed Sacrament during the praying of the Stations, and we will conclude with Benediction. We show our gratitude to Jesus for His Passion and death when we pray the Stations. Make a note that next Friday, the 8<sup>th</sup>, our choir is offering us the beautiful and moving Via Crucis (Way of the Cross) by Franz Liszt. Do try to set aside the

Fridays of Lent for some prayer and reflection so that they are not the same as all the other Fridays during the year. Giving a portion of your Fridays to the Lord during Lent is a great act of love. The Stations or the soup and spiritual talk prior to the Stations are ways we can make an act of love.

Last week I mentioned that I had not received my Bishop's Annual Appeal letter. It arrived this past week. I won't wait too long to make my gift. My aim is to do it within a week or two. I don't believe in asking parishioners to donate when I have not yet done so. All of us have to juggle our money and select from the many deserving charities and causes what we will support. I ask you to make room for the ABA and give thought as to how you will participate. Say it with me. No gift is too small. Participation, as with other giving, is an act of love for others. As I said last week, the ABA dollars go to people to help and strengthen lives and make them whole through contact with God. Thank you for joining in the Appeal.

# Music Notes—-

## Reflections on Gregorian Chant - Part 2

In last week's reflection, we examined the necessity and beauty of the vernacular. But what about Latin? What exactly does Vatican II say about Latin? Here are three important quotes:

- Section 54 of the *Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy* states that "steps should be taken so that the faithful may also be able to say or to sing together in Latin those parts of the Ordinary of the Mass which pertain to them." This is a reference to the Kyrie (Lord, have mercy), the Gloria (Glory to God), the Creed, etc.
- And from Section 114: "The Church acknowledges Gregorian chant [i.e. Latin chant] as specially suited to the Roman liturgy; therefore, other things being equal, it should be given pride of place in liturgical services."
- And as recent as 2007, the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops issued a document, *Sing to the Lord*, which has an entire section devoted to Latin in the Liturgy. It states "care should be taken to foster the role of Latin in the Liturgy, particularly in liturgical song."

Based on the above, I would like to offer two observations: 1) Vatican II very much wanted to continue the use of Latin the liturgy; 2) the use of Latin was specifically envisioned in the context of liturgical song. In other words, I believe the Council Fathers did not want to abandon our rich tradition of Gregorian chant. Why? That is a question to be examined in next week's reflection.




