

I saw a metaphor for Laetare Sunday at home on Wednesday. I don't know why, given how spring arrives earlier every year now a days, but I was surprised to see the tulips in the front border beginning to push through the wet-muddy even-soil. The daffodils had done that many weeks ago, and, in fact, are probably six inches high or more in the back yard. But tulips coming up out of the soil in March? Aside from my cursing of climate change, I saw a correlation with our church calendar as we reach the 4th Sunday of Lent or Laetare (Rejoice) Sunday. At this point in the Lenten journey, the Church points to the joy to come in three more weeks—the brand-new light of the Resurrection. The appearance of the tips of the first tulip leaves reminds me and you of the approach of blooms luminous in the bright spring sun. Our prayerfulness, our fasting from sin, and our almsgiving during these days of Lent opens us to greater holiness and to the joy passing from death to life with Jesus our risen Lord.

Our new sound system is installed. How is it different from what we had? The former system, if I wrote it down correctly, was line array technology which broadcasts sound everywhere. What we now have is a point system which lazar focuses the sound to the congregation. Practically, that means reverberation is practically eliminated. The preceding word will not still be moving through the building when the following one is spoken. Without reverberation, the quality of sound will be cleaner and more distinct. Because the system is created to bring the voice closer to you, the speakers are also further down the columns than the former ones. (More on that below.) You should notice a positive difference today listening to the spoken word.

The system has the capacity for custom settings which can allow us to enhance the sung word. We know that it can be difficult to hear the cantor when the organ is played with fullness and richness, especially when seated in the rear, closest to the great division of the instrument where most of the ranks of pipes are located. (Just an aside, it always baffles me that the folks who don't like loud organ seem to like sitting in the rear. I would think they would sit up front away from the source and where the sound is much more diffused.) Keep in mind that with this point system, the cantor's voice is no longer being broadcast throughout the entire air space as is the sound of the pipes. The voice is closer to you. But, in addition, with settings that Glen and Peter Scandone created, and can tweak as we spend time with the system, the speakers in the rear of the church can be upped in volume while those in the front are not. We would appreciate your feedback, so please let me or

Glen know what you are hearing and what you are not. Now, I need to confess one thing. I was not as ready for these high-tech speakers as I thought I would be. The overall appearance of the speakers, which are hung at the height they are meant to be, bother my eye. For me, they change the aesthetics of the church. As each day passes, I am getting more comfortable with them but not totally, and I believe a large part of that is the whiteness. Unfortunately, the speakers are made only in white or black, but fortunately, they can be painted to blend in. That is something we certainly will consider when we look at freshening up our interior.

Music Notes—-

Reflections on Gregorian Chant – Part 4

Last week I talked about how Gregorian chant embodies and encourages our Catholic unity. This week, I would like to reflect more specifically on why this unity is so important for our particular community of faith here at St. Peter.



Ours is a multicultural parish with a growing Spanish-speaking population. While we typically celebrate Mass in our respective languages (English and in Spanish), the Church occasionally calls on us to worship together as *one* community of faith. Holy Thursday and the Easter Vigil are two such occasions. At such gatherings, the Church documents state that "it is most appropriate to celebrate the liturgy in Latin, with the exception of the readings, the homily and the prayer of the faithful. In addition, selections of Gregorian chant should be sung at such gatherings, whenever possible" (*Sing to the Lord*, Par. 62).

This year we will be singing the Latin Chant Mass at both our Holy Thursday and Easter Vigil Masses. When we join our voices together for the *Sanctus* (the Holy, Holy) and Agnus Dei (Lamb of God), we will be singing in Latin, the Church's language that unites us all. We will be singing Gregorian chant, the Church's song that unites us all. St. Peter's is becoming an increasingly diverse community of faith, a wonderfully diverse community united in our Lord Jesus Christ. Simply put, Gregorian chant provides a practical and beautiful way for us to express this unity.


Loaves and Fishes Campaign
