

My dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

Every year, this first Sunday of Lent, we are invited to consider the temptation of Christ in the desert. For forty days Our Lord fasted and prayed as He prepared for His public ministry. The temptations are well known: turn stones into bread, leap off the high point of the temple and bow down to worship the devil. As we know, Jesus resisted the temptations of the devil and proved Himself as the faithful Son of our heavenly Father.

It is interesting to note that the devil's temptations moved from asking Christ to feed Himself privately with bread, to the more public display of divine power at the temple, to finally to the universal assumption of authority if He were to simply worship the devil. I think there is a lesson for us to consider the different aspects of these temptations, because we face similar temptations in our lives—the private to the more public.

Regarding the temptations to the more public sins, we are probably not tempted to jump off a building or seek world domination, but we can be tempted to draw attention to ourselves in order to make ourselves feel important, or to seek power in our own lives so as to lord it over others. This can happen to anyone, the rich and the poor, the lowly and the mighty. It is not our position in life that dictates the possibility of temptation but the fact that we are children of God whom the devil wants to turn away from our Creator.

I would like to propose that the first temptation, the very private invitation to turn stones into bread, is more likely the kind of sin we are being tempted to commit—those sins that are only known to us and God, and perhaps one other person. We can convince ourselves that, because we are not hurting others or no one else really knows, that it's not really that bad. I mean, would it have been so bad if Jesus had turned just one stone into a slice of bread? But isn't that how sin can take over our lives? A small sin leads to another and then to another and another; that is, unless we take a stand, and with God's grace, say no to the small, little, private sin.

Lent is a time for us to pray for the grace to say "no." We engage ourselves in prayer, fasting, and almsgiving to strengthen ourselves against the temptations—the great and small—that the devil throws against us. Let's use this time well, be strong in our resolve to resist the temptation, so that by saying no to the devil we grow in our likeness of Christ and prepare ourselves for the joy of Easter.

GUIDELINES FOR LENT

The time of Lent is to be observed by Catholics as a special season of prayer, penance, and works of charity.

*Ash Wednesday and Good Friday, in particular, are the most important penitential days of the liturgical year. They are days of both fast and abstinence. All Fridays in Lent are days of abstinence.

*The rule of fasting states that only one full meal a day can be taken. Two small meals, "sufficient to maintain strength", are allowed, but together they should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals breaks the fast, but drinking liquids does not. The rule of fasting obliges all Catholics from 18 to 59.

*Abstinence refers to the eating of meat. The common estimation of the community is used to determine what falls under the category of meat. The rule of abstinence binds all Catholics 14 years or older.

*The substantial observance of the laws of fast and abstinence is a serious obligation.

*Self-imposed fasting on the other weekdays of Lent is recommended. Abstinence on all Fridays of the year is also highly recommended.

*Parents and teachers should see to it that, even those who are not bound by the laws of fast and abstinence because of age, are brought up in an atmosphere that is conducive to a sense of penance.



Trying to figure out who's who is a common human activity. We like to know who we are sharing our time with and what relationship they have to us. So it is with the Church that gathers on Sunday for Mass. Many of the faces are as familiar as our own, but as with any healthy group, new faces are to be expected and welcomed. Some of those new faces may be responding to a call to find out more about Christ and His Church.

The Church opens its arms to these seekers with the wisdom and rituals of the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults. People who desire to learn more about the Catholic faith and its mission falls into two main groups: catechumens and candidates. A catechumen is someone who has never been baptized while there are others (called candidates), already been baptized in another Christian denomination, who desire to become fully initiated members of the Catholic Church. Catechumens and candidates undergo a period of formation involving a number of steps and phases.

After this formation, usually at the Easter Vigil or in the Easter Season, they receive the Sacraments of Initiation: Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist. In 2018, the Diocese of Burlington had 42 catechumens and 47 candidates.

For these catechumens and candidates, Lent is a period of intensified spiritual preparation. At the beginning of Lent, the

Diocese celebrates a special ritual: the "Rite of Election" for the catechumens and the "Call to Continuing Conversion" for the candidates. Based on the testimony given by the sponsors and catechists, Burlington Bishop Christopher Coyne will declare the catechumens to be "Elect," chosen by God for the Sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist at the upcoming Easter Vigil.

The bishop will also recognize the desire of the already-baptized candidates for the Sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist within our Catholic Community.

All members of the faithful throughout the Diocese are encouraged to pray for and with the catechumens and candidates. Join us for the Rite of Election and Call to Continuing Conversion, and commit to praying in Lent for these newest faces in your parish and throughout the Diocese.
