

My dear family in Christ,

While many of our religious holidays have been embraced by the secular world, e.g. Christmas, Easter, even St. Valentine's Day, there is one Feast that the secular world has not embraced: Pentecost. This might be because it is harder to market the descent of the Holy Spirit than the birth of a child, the resurrection to new life, or even the life of a saint dedicated to the love of husband and wife. I would like to propose this week that Pentecost, though not celebrated in the secular realm, needs to be celebrated by us, and not just in church. Why do I propose this? It is because Pentecost is the reason we are able to be the Church.

Think about the events recorded in Scripture about Pentecost and the descent of the Holy Spirit. It is the Spirit that empowers the apostles to leave the Upper Room and the fear that filled that room behind and go out to all the world to tell the Good News. Consider the life of St. Paul and the effect the Holy Spirit had in his life to bring about a radical conversion and a life in service to bringing the message of Christ to so many. Pentecost is about transformation and witness. Transformation because of the presence of the Holy Spirit, leading sinners to forgiveness and righteousness. Wisdom because it is the Spirit who empowers us to embrace the call of Christ to go out to all the nations to teach them and baptize them in the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit is the reason we can live and share our faith with others, especially in the face of difficulties and challenges.

The Holy Spirit also enlivens the Church when it gathers together for prayer, especially the Eucharist. It is the Spirit that lifts our hearts and minds to God the Father through Jesus Christ as we offer the sacrifice of the Mass. It is by the power of the Holy Spirit, invoked by the priest, which affects the miracle of the bread and wine becoming the Body and Blood of Christ. It is the Spirit, called down upon the water of the font, which washes away sin and gives divine life in Baptism. It is the Spirit that helps us become soldiers for Christ in the sacrament of Confirmation. Without the presence of the Holy Spirit in the life of the Church, we would remain unable to be who we are called to be as children of God.

For all of these and many other reasons, we should celebrate Pentecost, not just as the end of the fifty days of Easter, but as the beginning, the birth, of the Church.

May the Holy Spirit enflame our hearts and empower us to go forth to witness to Christ and to share our belief that we are saved in and through His death and resurrection. Come Holy Spirit, renew our hearts, our parish, our Church, and renew the face of the Earth.

PUBLIC MASSES

It is very likely that we will be able to return to the public celebration of Mass beginning June 1st. However, there will be some essential requirements as we ease back into gathering as a community of faith:

- *The obligation to attend Sunday Mass is still suspended until further notice.* No one is obligated to attend Mass for now.
 - If someone is not feeling well, out of love of neighbor, they should remain at home and watch Mass on TV.
 - Those in higher risk categories, over 65, pre-existing health issues, are encouraged to stay home.
 - Churches can only accommodate 25% of their capacities. Meaning for both of our churches, no more than 80 people in attendance for any one Mass.
 - Social distancing must be maintained in Churches. A maximum of 4-5 people per pew. Family members may sit together, others must maintain 6 foot spacing, including in the communion line.
 - Every other pew will be taped off.
 - Hand sanitizer will be used. Please bring your own to church.
 - Masks are to be worn in churches as an act of charity toward others.
 - Holy Communion will be distributed only in the hand.
 - Collection baskets will not be passed, but will be placed near the backs of the churches to receive offerings.
 - We ask that people bring their own wipes to wipe down pews after each Mass.
- Additional instructions will be given at Masses.

ANEW'S INDEPENDENCE PLACE

For the past year and a half, our parish has cultivated a special, supporting relationship with ANew Place, providing meals once a month to the homeless community there. Though we cannot continue providing meals at this time, we encourage parishioners to support them in another way: ANew Place has an amazing opportunity to provide affordable housing to formerly homeless individuals who participate in their transitional housing program. Just a few weeks ago, Cathedral Square approached ANew Place about co-managing their Independence Place property located at 130 Mansfield Ave. This property provides 7 apartments, an office, laundry facilities, and community rooms where they can provide after-care supports while moving guests towards independent living in their own apartments. Over the next six weeks, ANew's goal is to raise \$36,000 to fund this project. This amount represents the operating costs for July–December and helps ANew Place qualify for a matching grant from the UVM Medical Center. A message from Msgr. John McDermott, vicar general of the Diocese of Burlington

In the midst of difficult and trying times I try to find hope and joy very ordinary situations; [recently] I had an ordinary event, which brought a smile to my face and a spirit of joyful expectation for the coming months. What was this event? My new pair of running shoes arrived at the rectory.

If you are not a runner, you may not be able to relate to what I am about to share. I have been running since I was a freshman in high school ... and a new pair of running shoes has always been something that lifted my spirits. Why? I think part of the joy comes from the anticipation of where the running shoes will take me. They will take me down well-worn running routes that I know like the back of my hands, routes that typically I run in the very early hours of the morning when all is quiet and still. This running time has always helped me stay centered on what is most important and allowed me to let go of the stress and worry which can creep into my life.

The shoes have also led me to explore new and exciting places around Vermont (the Lake Morey loop), around the country (the beaches of the North Carolina and the mountains of Colorado) and around the world (the village roads of rural Ireland and Scotland). A new pair of running shoes reminds me of what can be rather than looking only at the challenges or struggles of today.

Now, if you are not a runner, you may experience this same joyful expectation when a new book arrives to be read, a new recipe is going to be tried in the kitchen or a new piece of

equipment allows you to build something in the workshop. I guess what I am trying to say is that all of us need to have things in our lives that bring us this sense of hope and joyful expectation, especially when our present situation is anything but ideal.

Now I would be remiss if I did not bring God into this reflection. I would say that ultimately what we need in our life in order to face the future with joy and hope is not a what, but a Who. God needs to be the true source of hope when facing a difficult present and uncertain future. It is God who guides us on the running path, in the kitchen or the workshop. And just as He has sustained in the past in our challenging and difficult times, just as He sustains us in our present uncertainties, He will guide us into a future that we should not fear but anticipate with hopeful joy.


As the prophet Jeremiah reminded the Israelites while they struggled in exile: “For

I know well the plans I have in mind for you, plans for your welfare and not for woe, so as to give you a future of hope. When you call me, and come and pray to me, I will listen to you. When you look for me, you will find me. Yes, when you seek me with all your heart” (Jer 29:11-13).

So, even if you are not a runner, this week, let us seek the Lord and His hopeful plans for us with all of our hearts.
