

My dear family in Christ:

I pray that this reflection finds you enjoying a fruitful Lent thus far. We may only be one week in, but I pray we have all had time to open our hearts and homes to the Lord's loving presence and experienced His grace.

While I typically spend some time pondering the Sunday Gospel passage in this column, this weekend I want us all to spend some time considering the words of St. Paul to the Church at Rome. The words taken from Romans Ch. 8 are among the most encouraging in any of Paul's letters: "If God is for us, who can be against us?" Let those words sink in for a few moments. "If God is for us, who can be against us?" These words can help put any problem, obstacle, pain, or sorrow into perspective. They remind us that we are in the hands of a loving Father who does not abandon His children. These are the words that empowered the martyrs to face their deaths with confidence and, sometimes, even joy. These are the words that can help us when everything seems to be going wrong in our lives or in the world. "If God is for us, who (or what) can be against us?"

The real challenge of these words is to allow them to take such deep root in our hearts that we face all of life—the good, the bad and the ugly—with the utmost confidence, knowing that, regardless of how things may work out in this life, the ultimate and eternal resolution has already been provided for us. The failures of this life, and even death itself, cannot destroy the love that God has poured forth into the world through His Son Jesus Christ. It is this truth that is meant to sustain Christians, not only though Lent, but through every period of their lives.

I think about these words frequently, especially when I am facing a difficult decision or situation, and I have often used these words during the course of a funeral to provide some hope to those whose hearts are broken because a loved one has died. They may not take away all earthly sorrow or pain, but to a believer, they provide a sure foundation to continue on in our lives because we know that God is for us always and everywhere.

In conclusion, I'd like us to reflect upon the rest of the words from this portion of Paul's letter: "For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor present things, nor future things, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor any other creature will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord." Romans 8:38-39.

God never forgets His own.

PUBLIC MASS PROTOCOLS

There are some essential requirements as we ease back into gathering as a community of faith:

- The obligation to attend Sunday Mass is still suspended until further notice. No one is obligated to attend Mass for now.
- If someone is not feeling well, out of love of neighbor, they should remain at home and watch Mass on TV.
- Those in higher risk categories, over 65, preexisting health issues, are encouraged to stay home.
- Social distancing must be maintained in Churches. Family members may sit together, others must maintain 6 foot spacing, including in the communion line.
- Masks are to be worn in churches as an act of charity toward others.
- We ask parishioners to please use hand sanitizer and *sign the guestbook as they arrive*.
- Holy Communion will usually be distributed in the hand. Those wishing to receive on the tongue are asked to approach for reception at the end of the communion procession or right after Mass.
- We ask that people bring their own wipes to wipe down pews after each Mass.

Lent, a time for penance, reflection, and spiritual growth, is upon us. One way we can increase our holiness during this time is to incorporate the Rosary into our daily prayer life. The Diocese of Burlington offers a daily recitation of the Rosary featuring a member of our Vermont diocesan community. GUIDELINES FOR LENT

The time of Lent is to be observed by Catholics as a special season of prayer, penance, and works of charity.


- *Ash Wednesday and Good Friday, in particular, are the most important penitential days of the liturgical year. They are days of both fast and abstinence. All Fridays in Lent are days of abstinence.
- *The rule of fasting states that only one full meal a day can be taken. Two small meals, "sufficient to maintain strength", are allowed, but together they should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals breaks the fast, but drinking liquids does not. The rule of fasting obliges all Catholics from 18 to 59.
- *Abstinence refers to the eating of meat. The common estimation of the community is used to determine what falls under the category of meat. The rule of abstinence binds all Catholics 14 years or older.
- *The substantial observance of the laws of fast and abstinence is a serious obligation.
- *Self-imposed fasting on the other weekdays of Lent is recommended. Abstinence on all Fridays of the year is also highly recommended.
- *Parents and teachers should see to it that, even those who are not bound by the laws of fast and abstinence because of age, are brought up in an atmosphere that is conducive to a sense of penance.

For Lent, ask if one's life is centered on God or oneself, pope says

ent is a time to reconsider the path one is taking in life and to finally answer God's invitation to return to him with one's whole heart, Pope Francis said.

"Lent is not just about the little sacrifices we make, but about discerning where our hearts are directed," he said, "toward God or toward myself?"

The pope's remarks came in his homily at Mass Feb. 17 for Ash Wednesday. In his homily, the pope said one must bow to receive ashes sprinkled on the crown of the head, which reflects the "humble descent" one makes in reflecting on one's life, sins and relationship with God.

"Lent is a journey of return to God," especially when most people live each day ignoring or delaying their response to God's invitation to pray and do something for others.

"It is a time to reconsider the path we are taking, to find the route that leads us home and to rediscover our profound relationship with God, on whom everything depends," he said.

"The journey of Lent is an exodus from slavery to freedom," he said, noting the easy temptations along that journey, including yearning for the past, or hindered by "unhealthy attachments, held back by the seductive snares of our sins, by the false security of money and appearances, by the paralysis of our discontents. To embark on this journey, we have to unmask these illusions."

The way back to God, he said, starts with understanding, like the prodigal son, how "we have ended up with empty

- Fast from bitterness and fill your heart with joy.

hands and an unhappy heart" after squandering God's gifts "on paltry things, and then with seeking God's forgiveness through confession.

The pope again reminded confessors that they must be like the father in the story of the prodigal son and not use "a whip," but open their arms in a welcoming embrace.

"The journey is not based on our own strength. Heartfelt conversion, with the deeds and practices that express it, is possible only if it begins with the primacy of God's work" and through his grace, the pope said.

What makes people just is not the righteousness they show off to others, "but our sincere relationship with the Father," after finally recognizing one is not self-sufficient, but in great need of him, his mercy and grace.

The pope asked people to contemplate daily the crucified Christ and see in his wounds, "our emptiness, our shortcomings, the wounds of our sin and all the hurt we have experienced."

"We see clearly that God points his finger at no one, but rather opens his arms to embrace us," he said.

It is in life's most painful wounds, that God awaits with his infinite mercy because it is there "where we are most vulnerable, where we feel the most shame" and where he comes to meet his children again.

"And now," the pope said, "he invites us to return to him, to rediscover the joy of being loved."
