My dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

When I say the “Ten Commandments,” what comes to your mind? For some, it might be memories of watching the classic old movie “The Ten Commandments,” starring Charlton Heston as Moses—a great movie. For some it might be memories of religion classes as children when we tried to be the first student to memorize all ten in the correct order. For me, it brings to my mind an examination of conscience and preparing to celebrate the Sacrament of Reconciliation. Often the Ten Commandments are used as the basis for many examinations of conscience, and the discipline of prayerfully reflecting upon our observance of the Commandments helps prepare us to acknowledge our failures in faith and pen ourselves up to God’s forgiveness.

Noting this, it should come as no surprise that I am extending an invitation to all of us to accept the challenge presented by the Ten Commandments, make a good examination of conscience, and celebrate the Sacrament of Reconciliation sometime during Lent. Whether it has been one month, one year, or ten years since we came to confession, there is no better time than now to come back, to know God’s love through the forgiveness of our sins. If you are a little out of practice, have no fear; you will be guided through the celebration with patience and kindness.

As in the past few years, there will be extra times added for the celebration of the Sacrament as we move through Lent and get closer to Holy Week and Easter. Just keep an eye on the parish bulletin, website, and Facebook page.

In closing, consider the following from Pope Francis: “Let us thank God for instituting the Sacrament of Mercy—the Sacrament of Confession—by approaching it frequently, moved by our faith that we are in need of God’s pardon and mercy, for all of us are sinners. It is there where we encounter God’s mercy and strong fatherly embrace when we approach it with a humble and contrite heart.”

Daylight Savings begins on Sunday, March 14th. Be sure to set your clocks one hour forward on Saturday night!




PUBLIC MASS PROTOCOLS

There are some essential requirements as we ease back into gathering as a community of faith:

- *The obligation to attend Sunday Mass is still suspended until further notice.* No one is obligated to attend Mass for now.
- If someone is not feeling well, out of love of neighbor, they should remain at home and watch Mass on TV.
- Those in higher risk categories, over 65, pre-existing health issues, are encouraged to stay home.
- Social distancing must be maintained in Churches. Family members may sit together, others must maintain 6 foot spacing, including in the communion line.
- Masks are to be worn in churches as an act of charity toward others.
- We ask parishioners to please use hand sanitizer and *sign the guestbook as they arrive.*
- Holy Communion will usually be distributed in the hand. Those wishing to receive on the tongue are asked to approach for reception at the end of the communion procession or right after Mass.
- We ask that people bring their own wipes to wipe down pews after each Mass.

DAILY ROSARY

Lent, a time for penance, reflection, and spiritual growth, is upon us. One way we can increase our holiness during this time is to incorporate the Rosary into our daily prayer life. The Diocese of Burlington offers a daily recitation of the Rosary featuring a member of our Vermont diocesan community. GUIDELINES FOR LENT

The time of Lent is to be observed by Catholics as a special season of prayer, penance, and works of charity.

*Ash Wednesday and Good Friday, in particular, are the most important penitential days of the liturgical year. They are days of both fast and abstinence. All Fridays in Lent are days of abstinence.

*The rule of fasting states that only one full meal a day can be taken. Two small meals, "sufficient to maintain strength", are allowed, but together they should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals breaks the fast, but drinking liquids does not. The rule of fasting obliges all Catholics from 18 to 59.

*Abstinence refers to the eating of meat. The common estimation of the community is used to determine what falls under the category of meat. The rule of abstinence binds all Catholics 14 years or older.

*The substantial observance of the laws of fast and abstinence is a serious obligation.

*Self-imposed fasting on the other weekdays of Lent is recommended. Abstinence on all Fridays of the year is also highly recommended.

*Parents and teachers should see to it that, even those who are not bound by the laws of fast and abstinence because of age, are brought up in an atmosphere that is conducive to a sense of penance.

New Christ Our Hope Legacy Society



With the launch of the historic Christ Our Hope: Building a Vibrant Church campaign this year, the Vermont Catholic Community Foundation (VCCF) has created the Christ Our Hope Legacy Society to honor all those in the Diocese who have chosen to leave a legacy of faith for the next generation. The present generosity of our Catholic community coupled with planned gifts ensures that our Church can weather any storm and that the doors of our churches, schools, and social service agencies remain open to meet the spiritual and material needs of the community.

A legacy gift offers future support of the mission of the Catholic Church in Vermont and can be designated to meet the needs of a specific ministry, parish or school with the help of the Vermont Catholic Community Foundation. Legacy gifts come in many different shapes and sizes from a simple bequest or Charitable Remainder Unitrust, to the designation of an IRA or life insurance policy, to the transfer of stock, real estate and much more. No matter the vehicle, each gift can have an enormous impact on a ministry of the donor's choosing and provide opportunities to spread the faith.

Here are a few examples.

- *Recently, Angelo Pizzagalli established a Charitable Remainder Unitrust with the Diocese of Burlington to benefit Rice Memorial High School in South Burlington. The full remainder of the trust will provide financial aid to students seeking a Catholic education who could not otherwise afford to attend Rice. Angelo's commitment to Catholic education, particularly Rice Memorial High School, inspired him to make this generous gift now. He stated, "Parochial schools consistently deliver excellent results. Even in the face of the pandemic, parochial schools in Vermont rolled up their sleeves and calmly went about their mission of producing the nation's most precious product: capable, caring, and engaged citizens of all stripes, well-prepared to achieve anything."*
- *Brigitte White, VCCF board member, decided to honor her parents with a legacy gift: "At first I thought this might not be the right time in my life to make a legacy gift given that I still have a child in high school. However, after giving this more thought, I realized that I could honor my parents and*

their faith, and their compassion for the most vulnerable, by designating the IRA I inherited from them to establish a fund in the foundation to feed the hungry."

- *The impact of a bequest on a small parish can lift many financial burdens and allow the community to flourish. Father William Giroux, former pastor of St. Patrick Parish in Fairfield, said, upon receiving the Dr. Thomas G. Howrigan bequest: "We were excited to establish the Dr. Thomas G. Howrigan Fund for St. Patrick Parish because this enables our parish to continue the good work it has always done without having to worry as much about fundraising. This fund has already benefited our parish and we expect it will continue to do so in the years to come."*

The mission of the VCCF is to support and serve apostolic activities of the Church and make grants to nonprofit organizations in the statewide Diocese of Burlington that reflect the compassion of Christ in service to the community. Planned gifts are one way the foundation can support the larger Catholic community.

Burlington Bishop Christopher Coyne expressed his gratitude at the outpouring of support and commented, "Thanks to the generosity and faith of the Catholic community and the gifts of many, the Vermont Catholic Community Foundation has grown exponentially over the last five years to serve the apostolic ministries of the Diocese. As in all acts of charity and goodness, we acknowledge that all is of God and all comes from God in praise of His name and in service to our brothers and sisters. We thank the Lord for all His love."
