



St. Alphonsus Liguori received a doctorate in both canon and civil law by acclamation at the age of 16, but he soon gave up the practice of law for apostolic activity. He was ordained a priest, and concentrated his pastoral efforts on popular parish missions, hearing confessions, and forming Christian groups.

He founded the Redemptorist congregation in 1732. It was an association of priests and brothers living a common life, dedicated to the imitation of Christ, and working mainly in popular missions for peasants in rural areas. Almost as an omen of what was to come later, he found himself deserted after a while by all his original companions except one lay brother. But the congregation managed to survive and was formally approved 17 years later, though its troubles were not over.

Alphonsus' great pastoral reforms were in the pulpit and confessional—replacing the pompous oratory of the time with simplicity, and the rigorism of Jansenism with kindness...He was made bishop at age 66 after trying to reject the honor, and at once instituted a thorough reform of his diocese.

His greatest sorrow came toward the end of his life. The Redemptorists, precariously continuing after the suppression of the Jesuits in 1773, had difficulty in getting their Rule approved by the Kingdom of Naples. Alphonsus acceded to the condition that they possess no property in common, but with the connivance of a high Redemptorist official, a royal official changed the Rule substantially. Alphonsus, old, crippled and with very bad sight, signed the document, unaware that he had been betrayed. The Redemptorists in the Papal States then put themselves under the pope, who withdrew those in Naples from the jurisdiction of Alphonsus. It was only after his death that the branches were united.

At 71, Alphonsus was afflicted with rheumatic pains which left incurable bending of his neck. Until it was straightened a little, the pressure of his chin caused a raw wound on his chest. He suffered a final 18 months of "dark night" scruples, fears, temptations against every article of faith and every virtue, interspersed with intervals of light and relief, when ecstasies were frequent.

Alphonsus is best known for his moral theology, but he also wrote well in the field of spiritual and dogmatic theology. His *Glories of Mary* is one of the great works on that subject, and his book *Visits to the Blessed Sacrament* went through 40 editions in his lifetime, greatly influencing the practice of this devotion in the Church.

Summer 2021 was a busy one for Christ the King School! In addition to the regular cleaning and painting, we had some exciting updates and changes to our campus. One of our favorites is the new energy efficient windows that were installed! The new windows are bigger, easier to open for better ventilation, let in more natural light, will lessen our environmental impact, and save on fuel costs. The original wood floors in the 4th/5th grade wing were refinished and look beautiful! Our library/maker space also has a new home. The move to a larger space will allow our students more room to work on STEAM projects and additional space to lounge with a good book. While not as flashy or visible, we also installed a new boiler system to heat our building more efficiently and be more environmentally conscious.

We've also been getting ready to welcome back students at the end of August. Based on the science, area vaccination numbers, and the success of the 2020-2021 school year, CKS has opened up additional spots in our early education (3 and 4 year olds) and Kindergarten classes. While we are still keeping class sizes smaller than pre-pandemic numbers, we are thrilled to be inching closer to "normal" each day. O My Jesus, forgive us our sins, save us from the fires of hell.
Lead all souls to Heaven, especially those most in need of Thy mercy.

The World Apostolate of Fatima USA — Our Lady's Blue Army will sponsor a Prayer Day on the Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary, Aug. 15, from 10:30 a.m. to 2 p.m. at St. Anne's Shrine in Isle La Motte.

The 10:30 a.m. Mass will be followed by recitation of the rosary, a noon procession and presentation of prayer intentions. Bring your own lunch.

The mission of The World Apostolate of Fatima USA — Our Lady's Blue Army is to spread the message of Fatima as given by the Blessed Mother to the three shepherd children, Lucia Dos Santos, Francisco and Jacinta Marto, during six apparitions in 1917.

The apostolate was founded in 1947, 30 years after the apparitions and at the beginning of the Cold War. A co-founder, Msgr. Harold Colgan, called for a blue army of prayer to counter the red army of atheistic communism. It is believed that approximately 20 million people signed the pledge to pray and do reparation as requested.

There is active membership in more than 100 countries. Members are located in 77 Dioceses in the United States including the Diocese of Burlington.

The World Apostolate of Fatima is made up of individual members around the world who strive to practice the spiritual requests of Our Lady of Fatima in reparation for sins and for the conversion of sinners:

- Offer up every day the sacrifices demanded by daily duty
- Pray the rosary every day
- Wear the Brown Scapular as a sign of consecration to the Immaculate Heart of Mary
- Practice the First Saturday devotion.
