

"Often Jesus asks the sick to believe. He makes use of signs to heal: spittle and the laying on of hands, mud and washing. The sick try to touch him, 'for power came forth from him and healed them all'. And so in the sacraments Christ continues to 'touch' us in order to heal us. On the cross Christ took upon himself the whole weight of evil and took away the 'sin of the world', of which illness is only a consequence. By his passion and death on the cross Christ has given a new meaning to suffering: it can henceforth configure us to him and unite us with his redemptive Passion."

named a cardinal. Such are the basic facts of his life. But

the real question is whether his character, his preaching,

his impact can be sketched.

Great men and women cannot be described without distortion. A sketch conceals as much as it reveals. John Henry Newman – convert, cardinal, priest, Oratorian, scholar, poet — is no exception. And the great temptation, as C.S. Lewis says, is to settle for a bog of superlatives. You've gushed, but your subject remains as nondescript as before.

I'll try to avoid the swamp by triangulating Newman with the characteristics of other prominent figures. Newman wielded a laser-like literary accuracy akin to G.K. Chesterton's finesse, (though not quite as quotable, because Newman is not infatuated with paradox or alliteration.) Newman's tone is also different from Chesterton's: much less playful, more serious and solemn. Jordan Peterson's tone reminds me of Newman's: insistent, grave, sincere, measured. His theological approach is patristic and biblical, not Thomistic. Think Benedict XVI or C.S. Lewis, as opposed to the distinctions and syllogisms of a scholastic. His depth matches St. Augustine's, his effortless clarity equals Bishop Robert Barron's, even amid Newman's paragraph-length sentences (like reading Latin in English, one person said).


His sermons have two features for which no comparison suggests itself. The first is that they raise immense challenges of holiness, yet without being discouraging the reader. They warn and critique, yet somehow exhilarate. Second, they are intellectually rigorous without being either intellectually laborious or emotionally dry.

They drive through the head yet hammer on the heart.

Well, there's the sketch; I hope it piques your interest enough to join us for a celebration in his honor at Newman Night 2021 in Holy Family Parish hall in Essex Junction. The evening will include solemn evening prayer, dinner and two presentations on the thought and impact of St. John Henry Newman. early two years ago, in October 2019, John Henry Newman was added to the Church's canon of officially recognized saints. To celebrate the new saint and his great impact, Father Kevin Chalifoux and I hosted the first Newman Night on the very day of his canonization. About a hundred people showed up to pray evening prayer, have dinner and listen to talks highlighting the life and work of the saint. This year the second Newman Night celebration will take place on October 10 at Holy Family Parish hall in Essex Junction.

Who is St. John Henry Newman?

Like many saints, his life's road included tumultuous turns. He rose to prominence as an Anglican in the Oxford movement in England, well-known for his preaching and writing. Compelled by conviction, however, he gave up his role to investigate questions concerning Anglicanism, which eventually led to his conversation to the Catholic Church. He was ordained a priest and became a member of the Oratorians of St. Philip Neri. By the time of his death in 1890, he had been
