


WE HAD A DREAM—PART IX

When I went to Chapter meetings and mentioned what we were doing I was told "You can't do that, you have to get permission, and another thing.....:" I thought it best not to hurt our guys' feelings, so I never mentioned it to them and we just went onward. We learned, prayed and grew together.

GAIL:

HISTORY OF THE KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS—PART VIII

1939: In response to Pope Pius XII's petition for prayers for peace, the Knights of Columbus sponsors an international prayer for peace program on Armistice Day 1939 and a radio prayer for peace broadcast on May 19, 1940.

1939: Less than two weeks after World War II is declared, Canadian Knights establish a welfare program for soldiers comparable to the KC huts program that operated during World War I. Within a year, Canadian Knights raise nearly \$250,000 to support troops.

1941-1950: War & Peace

By the time Pearl Harbor was attacked and the United States entered World War II in 1941, a K of C welfare program for servicemen had been well established by Canadian Knights, built and modeled on the Knights' World War I work. In the United States, the Order's outreach to soldiers was conducted through the National Catholic Community Service organization, which itself modeled many of its programs on the Knights' war efforts.

At the Supreme Convention in 1944, the Order established a \$1 million trust fund for the children of members who died or became disabled in World War II. Following the end of the war in 1945, the Order turned its attention to the growing threats of communism and fascism. To combat these dangers, the Knights launched in 1946 the Crusade for the Preservation and Promotion of American Ideals, which published books and pamphlets to educate the public on "the perils of communism."

Meanwhile, the postwar years saw a membership boom for the Order in the Philippines. Jesuit Father George J. Willmann envisioned the Knights as the premiere lay society in the Philippines and set about establishing new councils and recruiting new members. He appealed to the Supreme Council in 1947 for permission to establish three new councils there and served as the country's first district deputy. By the time Supreme Knight Luke E. Hart visited Manila in 1955, the Order had expanded to include 50 Filipino councils.

Purgatory

Between the sinfulness of this life and glories of heaven, we must be made pure. Between death and glory there is purification (CCC1030-1031). The church gives the name purgatory to this final purification.

The concept of an after death purification from sin and the consequences of sin is also stated in the New Testament (1Cor 3:11-15) (Matt 12:31-32) (Matt 5:25-26).

The texts of the early church fathers (Justin, Martyr, Ireanaeus, Tertullian, and Origen) found in the second and third centuries, says that we are punished for our sins.

St. Augustine (419) wrote, "Temporal punishments are suffered by some in this life only, by some after death, by some here and hereafter, but all of them before the last and strictest judgment. But not all who suffer temporal punishments after death will come to eternal punishments, which are to follow after that judgment."

The doctrine of purgatory or purification has been part of Christianity since before Christ

(2 Macc 12:41-45).

Jews, Catholics, and the Eastern Orthodox have always historically proclaimed the reality of the final purification.

The doctrine of purgatory was given definitive expression at the Ecumenical Council of Lyons (1274), Florence (11439) and defined again at the Council of Trent in 1545-1563.

Entirely aside, however from the evidence offered by Scripture and tradition, reason alone would suggest and even demand the existence of a midway state between heaven and hell.

The Catholic Church has three essential components of the doctrine of purgatory: 1) that purification after death exists; 2) that it involves some kind of pain and 3) that purification can be assisted by prayers and offerings by the living to God.

God is pure holiness. No imperfection can enter His sight. (Rev 21:27). The temporal traces left behind by sin must be removed before we can enter God's presence. In purgatory, the fire of God's love burns away the impurities not already removed by devotion to God or suffering before death readying us for God's presence.

Those who die in a state of grace - no mortal sins- undergo purification so as to achieve the holiness necessary to enter the joy of heaven. Whatever may be the suffering involved in this purgation, souls in purgatory must be very joyful, because their ultimate salvation is assured. Let us pray that their time in purgatory be as short as possible.

ARCHDIOCESE NEWS

The archbishop reflected on the state of the family.

"At the root of the family crisis is a crisis of confidence in God-a loss of the sense that he is our Father and Creator, and that he has a plan, a 'dream' for his creation, a plan for our lives. The family today is threatened by the same 'anthropocentric' and 'technocratic' mentality that Pope Francis warns about in 'Laudato Si,' his encyclical on creation," Archbishop Gomez said.

This mentality rejects the realities of creation and human nature and sees nature, social institutions and the human body and mind as material to be engineered.

The archbishop suggested that some Catholic bishops' sense of urgency and even anxiety at the synod drew on the sense of the "profound" family crisis and the economic, cultural and ideological threats to the family.

For Archbishop Gomez, these threats include forced sterilization and abortion, embryonic experimentation, contraception, the redefinition of marriage and the "surgical manipulations of femininity and masculinity."

"In confronting this broad cultural crisis of the family, the Church needs to proclaim once more the beautiful truth about the human person and God's loving plan for creation and the family," Archbishop Gomez said, adding: "if we lose the family, we lose God's plan for our lives and for the world."

Archbishop Gomez did not ignore non-Catholics and inconsistent Catholics.

"The Church is also called to reach out with tenderness to those who are having trouble understanding and living these truths," the archbishop said.

He also noted Pope Francis' call after the 2014 synod not to sacrifice truths in order to "please the people." He recalled the Pope's warning against a deceptive view of mercy that "binds wounds without first curing them."

Archbishop Gomez said that "kindness and compassion can never be separated from God's plan."

"A person's conscience is sacred. But our conscience is only reliable if it is formed according to the truth that God has written into our hearts and the loving plan he has for our lives," he said.

HEALTH AND FITNESS REPORT

As the guy who passes along health news for the Knights, I have been off-line for some time, dealing with cancer issues and treatment to which my wife Jo has been subjected. It has been quite a learning experience. I have spent a lot of time reading studies and researching current cancer treatment methods and alternatives used around the world. I've done my best to incorporate foods and supplements which enhance the benefits of the cancer treatments her doctors suggested, and protect her body and health from the destructive effects of those treatments. We seem to have done well; she has weathered the storm with grace and strength and seems to be mending well and quickly. We give God much of the credit, and have strongly felt the love and prayer support from our community over the months; so thank you very much for all the divinely sought help your prayers have brought us.

I want to hand on a few things I think have helped in her treatment. Without getting into a lot of science, here are some important findings. Our immune system is the only function that prevents cancer, of any type. It recognizes that a cell is damaged or abnormal, and then sends immune cells to kill and eat the damaged cell before it can multiply into a tumor. But as we age, our immune system gets less effective, and lets more of these bad actors set up tumors. The standard approaches of surgery, radiation and chemotherapy can kill these aberrant cells and shrink or eliminate tumors, but they also damage our immune system, so quite often the surviving cancer cells can flourish and rebound after treatment. Our chemotherapist used the drug Neulasta to boost immune function after each infusion; we could see that white cell blood counts came roaring back within the three week interval before the next infusion. We also used several supplements that make immune function stronger in hopes of mounting an attack on any surviving cancer cells.

HEALTH AND FITNESS REPORT, CONTINUED

Our oncologist was aware of many alternative approaches used around the world to treat cancer, but he is professionally prevented from suggesting any complementary, integrative or alternate therapies. We found many promising complementary strategies and took it upon ourselves to use them. We used these strategies to enhance the effectiveness of both radiation and chemotherapy and to prevent collateral damage from these very toxic treatments, and we used several nutritional supplements to help boost Jo's immune system back to full function rapidly. We told the doctor what we were doing at each visit; he could only say that Jo was doing surprisingly well and to keep doing what we were doing.

Two specific cancer "markers" – chemicals found in the blood that are produced excessively by cancer cells – were used to measure the effectiveness of the treatment over its duration. These markers are now well below levels where recurrence of the cancer is likely. We will keep using the nutritional supplements and watch the marker levels from here on. We are optimistic that we may yet grow old together in good health. So in this time of Thanksgiving, we do give thanks for God's grace in this, and for the prayers of our friends – please don't stop just yet.
