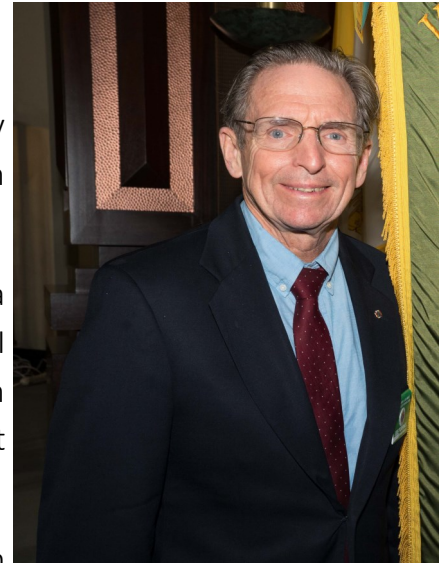

Easter

The scene was a Communist prison camp in North Korea. Among the prisoners, all American officers, was Father Emil Kapaun, the outstanding hero of the Korean Conflict. He had won the heart of every P.O.W and the rage of the captors by his Christ-like devotion to the physical and spiritual good of all his comrades, no matter what their religion, race or nationality. "All man-all priest" was the way they described him. With threats and actual punishment the Communists hindered his every effort to conduct services, but he always managed.



On Easter of 1951 the heroic chaplain planned a sunrise service. It was a cold, raw day with the wind howling from Manchuria over the Yalu River. About 85 prisoners gathered on the steps of a bombed-out church. Catholic, Protestant and Jew were there, plus some who had no religion at all, but were starting to find one. Father had no facilities for offering Mass, but he did recite the Rosary and the Stations of the Cross. He read some of the Mass prayers and a few passages from the Bible, especially the story of the Resurrection. Very few eyes were dry when it was over. There was hope. Here was new courage. Here was new meaning to their almost unbearable life!

Why did Chaplain Kapaun and his companions risk inhuman punishment from their godless captors by holding an Easter service? Because they really believed that Jesus rose from the grave, because they hoped that Christ would deliver them from the living grave of that horrible camp, because they believed that death itself would be overcome by Him who promised: "He who lives and believes in me shall never die.

This was not mere wishful thinking on the part of those prisoners of war, nor on our part. We are certain, we are positive that Christ rose from the grave and that we will rise from the grave.

Easter greetings! As we roll through the first full month of spring we celebrate Easter with thoughts of gratitude for the gift of new life. The Resurrection and thoughts of our Savior's sacrifice and triumph over death are fresh in our minds and hearts. The dreariness of winter and Lent fade away with April rains that seem to have their own scent. All nature seems in bloom. Trees barren not long ago are now budding and flowers begin to poke through the warming soil. For many, it's their favorite season of the year.

Along with everything else going on in April, it is also Autism Awareness month. The Autism Speaks website (www.autismspeaks.org) contains much more information that I can give you here. Autism has been more widely discussed and better understood in recent years. Although the TV show "The Good Doctor" portrays a doctor who has autism, those with Autism Spectrum Disorder exhibit a broad range of characteristics. Many have much less functionality than the doctor portrayed on the show. I mention this because many of us know of someone who is on this autism spectrum. If diagnosed early in childhood and intervention begun, those with autism may still live a relatively normal life. However, many with autism struggle and have other complicating medical or psychological issues and need much support during their lives.

That's where the Knights of Columbus Family Fraternal Benefits may be able to help. The Family Fraternal Benefits cover a number of situations. One benefit addresses the child who is older than 60 days and younger than 18 and is uninsurable according to our ordinary underwriting practices. The Number 1 Lifestyle Factor Impacting Health and Longevity

Last year more money moved into longevity research than any time in history, and this year will exceed the one before. Reported studies hint at possible breakthroughs in lifespan/healthspan, but then conclude that more study is required to realize these potentials. Way more letdowns than excitement, but progress is accelerating in my mind.

Meanwhile, the basic strategies to maintain health long-term are those I site in my 6-Pillars for Senior Fitness promoted [on my website](#): Keep current with Antiaging technology, Eat real food - not in excess, Exercise, Sleep adequately, Use proven supplements and Cultivate productive thinking and a Grateful attitude. A few years ago I added Rejuvenation Strategies as a 7th Pillar, and productive strategies are indeed being realized. Most of the experimental drugs in the research pipeline are tested on short-lived animals or lower life forms, and show great improvements, some on the order of doubling lifespans. But when tried on humans, add mere weeks or months rather than years or decades to projected lifespan. Often these benefits are compared to the benefit of lifelong exercise, and found to be significantly less than simply being physically active on a daily basis.

Last month I wrote about eliminating senescent cells with [Senolytic Activator](#) as a viable strategy to extending healthspan, which I have been using for a few years. This practice looks to reduce inflammation that intensifies with aging, and in doing so, slows late-life decline into the diseases of aging – possibly staying healthy decades longer.

Sometime before that I wrote about boosting NAD⁺ levels (an enzyme required for energy production) with a precursor Nicotinamide mononucleotide (NMN) which will restore youthful energy levels: for how long, we don't know, but I stopped needing naps when I started using it, and 4 years later never think about needing a nap.

Still, these potential breakthroughs are measured against the life-extending benefit of exercise, and so far exercise wins. Of the forms of exercise in practice, nothing works as well for aging as Progressive Strength Training. The primary hallmark of aging is muscle loss, and Strength Training grows muscle, at every age.

Strength Training is complicated; many practices need to be learned, and every body part requires a particular movement and proper form to get the full benefit and avoid injury. One needs to acquire a fondness for moments of extreme exertion and for the soreness that comes a day-and-a-half later and lasts for two days. A well-equipped gym is a realistic requirement, and learning this on your own is an injury trap – you need a competent trainer, with a specialization in senior fitness. I work out of [Island Health and Fitness](#) and have openings in my schedule, and free advice is available to all by email or phone.

Dominick's Corner

Military Service of SK Gerald Pitstick

I lived in Earlville Illinois when I joined the Illinois National Guard in Nov. 1966. I was ordered to active duty March 17, 1967 and sent to boot camp March through July at Fort Dix, New Jersey. I completed my Basic and Advanced Infantry training and was assigned an MOS of 11B10 which is light weapons infantry. I qualified as a sharpshooter on the M14 assault weapon. I also qualified on 45 pistol, the 50 caliber machine gun and the grenade launcher. I was then sent for duty to the National Guard unit in Ottawa, Illinois and given a WW11 M-1 rifle with a bayonet. In basic training I volunteered for motor pool training, ATP21-114. I also completed the Military Code of Conduct and course B-Military Justice. Later they selected me to be the Company Captain's driver during AIT. This minimized my forced marching and limited my gas mask training. Before my first summer camp and after two Federal call-outs (Nov.'67 Democratic Convention and Martin Luther King assassination) anti-war protests and riots in Chicago, I was sent to the National Guard Cook Section where I progressed to First Cook and the rank of Specialist 4th Class. I participated in four, 2-week summer camps at Camp Riley near Brainerd, Minnesota; 52 monthly weekends at the local National Guard Armory; 5 flood alerts; and 2 Federal Call-outs. My service time was reduced to 5 1/2 years of a 6 year commitment for being activated twice for the Ant-War protests and the Chicago riots.



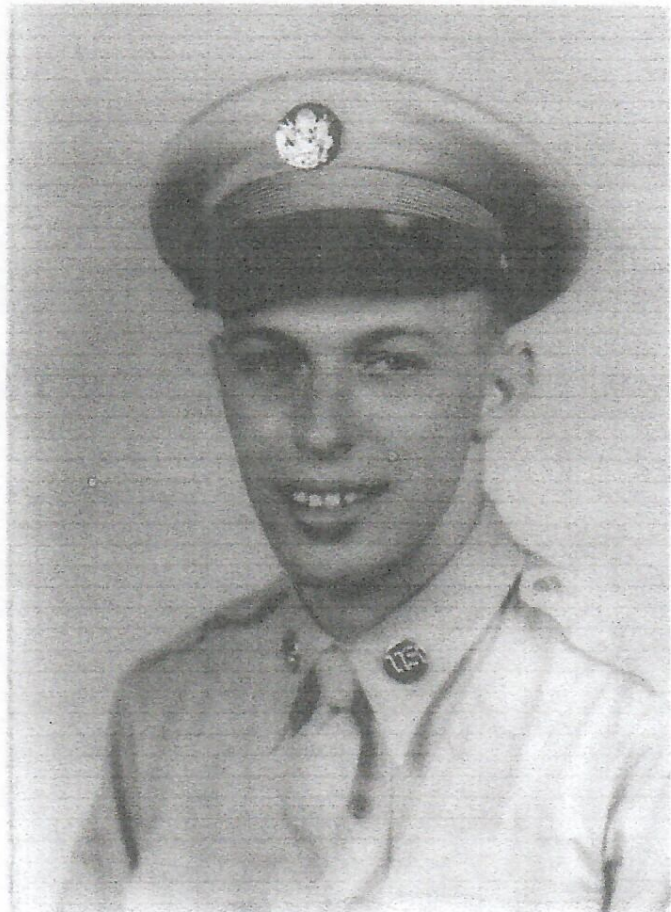

I joined the United States Army in April of 1952 and was sent to Fort Riley, Kansas for my boot camp training. After boot camp I was assigned to the 371st Army Band at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas. My hobby was drumming in civilian life so the Army decided to use that experience and add me to the Band as a drummer. I was happy with that assignment because I was doing what I liked and it was quite interesting. We played for all important dignitaries who visited the base, such as generals, senators, congressman, etc. When Kansas City, Mo. had its Centennial Celebration, we became part of the entertainment group along with the famous Ray Anthony Band and many other entertainers. Fort Leavenworth was also the Army's Officers College where they trained officers. Whenever they had an event of any kind we had to perform as requested. All in all I was quite happy with my job. I was doing what I liked and it kept me out of combat. I did what the Army asked me to do and I am proud to have served my country. After two years of active duty I was discharged in March of 1954.

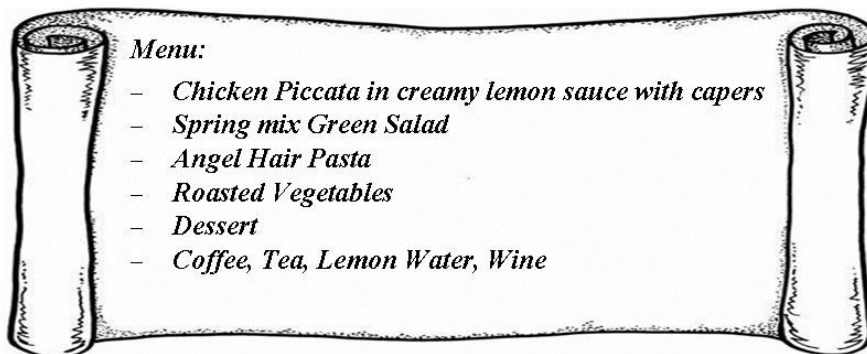

HISTORY OF PRO-LIFE BREAKFASTS KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS COUNCIL 5803

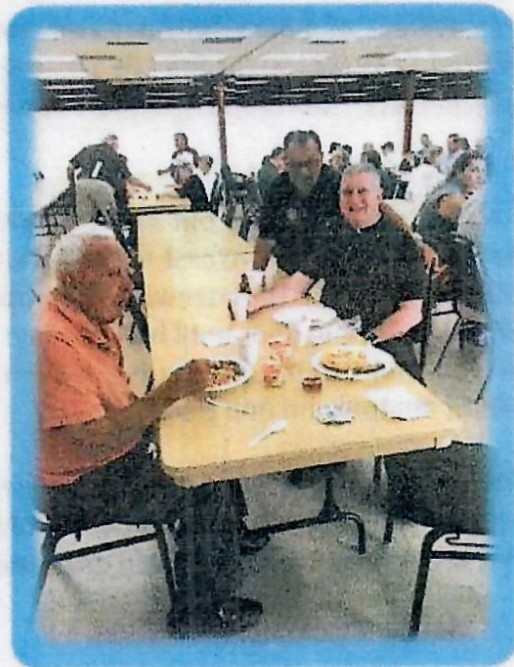
In the Fall of 1993, when the late great PGK Al McKinley wanted to retire as Pro-Life Chairman so that he could concentrate his efforts on the Chili Cook-off, PGK Bob Medeiros asked a few of us if we would be willing to put on a Pro-Life Breakfast at St. Peter Claver Parish. We served the usual eggs, sausage and pancakes – and made about \$350.00.

Having grown up working in the restaurant business, we knew there was a bigger potential for making more money for the cause. So, in the years that followed, we experimented with a few new ideas like adding items to the menu such as potatoes O'Brien, quiche, biscuits & gravy, Danish, fruit – and eventually champagne mimosas. With an average of 3 Breakfasts per year and approximately \$1500.00 per event, we have been able to raise an estimated \$135,000.00 for the Life Centers of Ventura County in the last 30 years.

In the early days, we even experimented with a couple of Mexican Dinner fundraisers, which were also successful.

Our wives have been on hand to help out at every event, as have our children, who have grown up serving at these breakfasts. We've had our core cast of regulars, including our "Egg Man" Eddie Perez, "Sausage Guy" John Lemos, Robert "Flap-Jack" Tomaszewski, "Champagne Bob" Smith, "DJ" Victor Lemos – and the great Ralph Rogers, who worked the door until his final days. There are too many others to name that have assisted us over the years, but some of the standouts are Norn Oullette, Neil Fanning, Tony Bonomo, Paul Friedeborn, Chris Smith, Richard Beutow and Bob Hacia.

It has been quite a ride, lo, these past 30 years – and we'll continue to do this as long as we can, God willing. We have to – because, as a Council and as a people of God, we can never stop fighting against the horror of abortion until it is eradicated from our nation once and for all.
