Sacrament of Baptism: Parish Registration and a Baptism class is required. Please contact Teri Dwyer to register and plan to attend the class while awaiting the birth or adoption of your child.

Sacrament of Matrimony: In accord with the regulations of the Archdiocese of Washington, couples must contact a priest and begin preparation at least six months prior to the wedding. Parish registration and active participation for the minimum of three months is required before preparation may begin. Living together before marriage is sinful and harmful to the future marriage. Couples who are living together will be asked to live separately during the preparation time.

What does it mean to be an active Catholic? Frequently, those seeking to celebrate Marriage, have children baptized, or serve as sponsors for Confirmation or Baptism request a letter stating they are parishioners and active, practicing Catholics. To receive such a letter, one must be registered in the parish, attend Mass regularly, and be committed to a stewardship of time, talent, and treasure. We encourage all parishioners to become active in one of the parish organizations. In a community as large as St. Raphael, one means of verifying participation is through the regular use of parish offertory envelopes. If you choose not to participate in the support of the parish, or are unable to contribute at this time, please at least note your prayerful support on your envelope and place it in the weekly offertory. We will then be aware of your continued participation, and you will not be noted as "inactive" on our parish roster.

Vicar's Verbiage

"Never let me be parted from you"

Dear Friends,

How do you prepare to receive Holy Communion? Perhaps you have a prayer or two you learned in childhood, something you've memorized and said so often you don't even remember the words. Perhaps you have a set of prayers you think or say; or perhaps you have no prayer at all. Or perhaps you hadn't even thought it was something good to say some private prayers before Communion.

For priests celebrating Mass, the prayers they say before Communion are written out and obligatory--they're also beautiful and perfectly fine for you to say if you want to use as well.

Right before Communion is a wondrous moment of intimacy with the Priest and his Lord in the Eucharist, the prayers are meant to be spoken quietly, like a private whisper between spouses or friends. Its something that can be seen by everyone but in that moment (at least for me), there's no one else in the room except for Jesus. That's why I like to bend down as I say them, just to make sure He hears me whispering them.

Here's what we say:
Lord, Jesus Christ, Son of the living God,
who by the will of the Father
and the work of the Holy Spirit,
through your Death gave life to the world,
free me by this, your most Holy Body and Blood,
from all my sins and from every evil;
keep me always faithful to your commandments,
and never let me be parted from you.

Or:

May the receiving of your Body and Blood, Lord Jesus Christ, not bring me to judgment and condemnation, but through your loving mercy be for me protection in mind and body and a healing remedy.

The Eucharistic Prayer is addressed to God the Father, since its Christ the High Priest offering Himself as victim and priest in that moment, but these prayers are focused on Jesus himself, because of course after the Consecration He is there on the altar in the Eucharist.

I've always been drawn to the last line of the first prayer: "keep me always faithful to your commandments, and never let me be parted from you." That sort of sums up the whole point of why we are here, to be faithful to the Lord so that we can be with him forever in heaven. When we fall into sin we are parted from God, separated again like Adam and Eve. In the Eucharist we see God's answer to that separation, an act of love which allows us to have communion with God always, never to be separated from him.

Even though its not required to say, maybe you could whisper one of those prayers along with the priest at Mass and pray that the Eucharist will be protection for you in mind and body and a healing medicine to keep you close to God now and for ever.

SRRE offers ongoing faith formation for all children and teens, as well as preparation for sacraments. Each year of faith formation is designed to deepen relationships with Jesus and his Church through focus on what we believe, why we celebrate the sacraments, how we pray, and how we live.

An Encyclical for All Brothers and Sisters



In his most recent encyclical, *Fratelli Tutti*, Pope Francis invites us to consider how we are called "in the face of present-day attempts to eliminate or ignore others" to respond "with a new vision of fraternity and social friendship that will not remain at the level of words." This week we continue with Chapter 3: Envisaging and Engendering an Open World."

A Universal Love That Promotes Persons

106. Social friendship and universal fraternity necessarily call for an acknowledgement of the worth of every human person, always and everywhere. If each individual is of such great worth, it must be stated clearly and firmly that "the mere fact that some people are born in places with fewer resources or less development does not justify the fact that they are living with less dignity." This is a basic principle of social life that tends to be ignored in a variety of ways by those who sense that it does not fit into their worldview or serve their purposes.

107. Every human being has the right to live with dignity and to develop integrally; this fundamental right cannot be denied by any country. People have this right even if they are unproductive, or were born with or developed limitations. This does not detract from their great dignity as human persons, a dignity based not on circumstances but on the intrinsic worth of their being. Unless this basic principle is upheld, there will be no future either for fraternity or for the survival of humanity.

108. Some societies accept this principle in part. They agree that opportunities should be available to everyone, but then go on to say that everything depends on the individual. From this skewed perspective, it would be pointless "to favor an

investment in efforts to help the slow, the weak or the less talented to find opportunities in life." Investments in assistance to the vulnerable could prove unprofitable; they might make things less efficient. No. What we need in fact are states and civil institutions that are present and active, that look beyond the free and efficient working of certain economic, political or ideological systems, and are primarily concerned with individuals and the common good.

109. Some people are born into economically stable families, receive a fine education, grow up well nourished, or naturally possess great talent. They will certainly not need a proactive state; they need only claim their freedom. Yet the same rule clearly does not apply to a disabled person, to someone born in dire poverty, to those lacking a good education and with little access to adequate health care. If a society is governed primarily by the criteria of market freedom and efficiency, there is no place for such persons, and

fraternity will remain just another vague ideal.

110. Indeed, "to claim economic freedom while real conditions bar many people from actual access to it, and while possibilities for employment continue to shrink, is to practice doublespeak." Words like freedom, democracy or fraternity prove meaningless, for the fact is that "only when our economic and social system no longer produces even a single victim, a single person cast aside, will we be able to celebrate the feast of universal fraternity." A truly human and fraternal society will be capable of ensuring in an efficient and stable way that each of its members is accompanied at every stage of life. Not only by providing for their basic needs, but by enabling them to give the best of themselves, even though their performance may be less than optimum, their pace slow or their efficiency limited.

111. The human person, with his or her inalienable rights, is by nature open to relationship. Implanted deep within us is the call to transcend ourselves through an encounter with others. For this reason, "care must be taken not to fall into certain errors which can arise from a misunderstanding of the concept of human rights and from its misuse. Today there is a tendency to claim ever broader individual - I am tempted to say individualistic rights. Underlying this is a conception of the human person as detached from all social and anthropological contexts, as if the person were a "monad" (monás), increasingly unconcerned with others... Unless the rights of each individual are harmoniously ordered to the greater good, those rights will end up being considered limitless and consequently will become a source of conflicts and violence.'

Caring for God's Creation – A Plan That Calls for Solidarity Five years ago, Pope Francis released his encyclical <u>Laudato Si'</u> (Care for Our Common Home). Many dioceses,



parishes, parish schools, and families have embraced the call of integral ecology, a key concept in Laudato Si'. lt says "everything is closely related" and

that "today's problems call for a vision capable of taking into account every aspect of the global crisis." In August, Cardinal Gregory announced the launch of Laudato Si: Embarking on a Seven-Year Journey Promoting an Integral Ecology in the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Washington. It contains easy to advanced ways for us to exercise stewardship over God's creation. Find the link to the plan at This is a wonderful opportunity for every www.adw.org individual, every family, and every group in our parish to make a difference in this all-important work.

Young people looking for Confirmation and community service opportunities will find many projects in this action plan. The plan names seven markers that help to measure the implementation of Laudato Si'. The second marker is

Response to the Cry of Those Who Are Poor/ Vulnerable: defense of human life from conception to death and all forms of life on Earth, with special attention to vulnerable groups such as indigenous communities,

migrant children at risk through slavery, etc.

Listening to 'the cry of those who are poor or vulnerable' means actively ensuring all communities; especially our cultural communities are consulted, listened to, and empowered to make decisions on environmental issues that affect them. Persons of all income levels including low-tomoderate income, the elderly, children, immigrants, people with disabilities, those experiencing homelessness, racial and ethnic minorities, and indigenous people must be included in discussions and decisions related to their communities. There are people in the Archdiocese of Washington who are suffering from the effects of structural racism and from political, social, and economic negligence, and who are disproportionately affected by climate change. The lack of environmental and racial justice is of great concern to our Church. In *Laudato Si'*, Pope Francis points to the global dimensions of the issue of environmental and racial justice, and how these issues are interconnected. Excessive consumption, extraction of Earth's natural resources, and the culture of waste in affluent countries, has led to dire consequences for the most vulnerable countries of the world and has had a negative impact upon the health of people living in vulnerable countries. Many vulnerable countries have experienced environmental consequences due to climate-change such as: rising temperatures, rising sea levels, intense flooding, severe drought, and dangerous fires. These consequences have resulted in water scarcity, devastated many farming communities, and people forced to flee their countries for better lives as climate refugees. Such climate refugees (e.g. from Central America and Africa) can be found in our communities, and some of them encounter discrimination in the archdiocese and this country.

Possible Actions for Individuals and Families:

☐ Create or expand parish and school libraries to feature a variety of voices and experiences on the impact of watershed pollution on low-income communities (easy)

☐ Explore local ecological educational opportunities in your community to learn about environmental justice (e.g. Tour Blue Plains in Washington, D.C., the largest advanced wastewater plant in the world; Chesapeake Bay Foundation Educational Tours.) (easy)

□ Volunteer to do a parish clean-up (éasy)

☐ Assist vulnerable persons (easy to advanced)

☐ Know your neighbors, develop relationships with

one another (easy)

☐ Run errands for those who need assistance in

your neighborhood (easy)

☐ Develop awareness of programs that can assist

vulnerable persons (easy)

 Support local charity programs to help and assist vulnerable persons, such as Catholic Charities DC, Catholic Relief Services, Catholic Campaign for Human Development (easy to advanced)

 Contribute food or financial donations to your parish food pantry (easy to advanced)

☐ Develop or expand parish emergency funds to help individuals with energy, water, and other bills (moderate to advanced)

Volunteer with a local clean the waterways project: Sweep Sligo Creek, Chesapeake Bay, and Anacostia River projects (moderate)

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
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
