

Sacrament of Baptism: Parish Registration and a Baptism class is required. Please contact Teri Dwyer to register and plan to attend the class while awaiting the birth or adoption of your child.

Sacrament of Matrimony: In accord with the regulations of the Archdiocese of Washington, couples must contact a priest and begin preparation at least six months prior to the wedding. Parish registration and active participation for the minimum of three months is required before preparation may begin. Living together before marriage is sinful and harmful to the future marriage. Couples who are living together will be asked to live separately during the preparation time.

What does it mean to be an active Catholic? Frequently, those seeking to celebrate Marriage, have children baptized, or serve as sponsors for Confirmation or Baptism request a letter stating they are parishioners and active, practicing Catholics. To receive such a letter, one must be registered in the parish, attend Mass regularly, and be committed to a stewardship of time, talent, and treasure. We encourage all parishioners to become active in one of the parish organizations. In a community as large as St. Raphael, one means of verifying participation is through the regular use of parish offertory envelopes. If you choose not to participate in the support of the parish, or are unable to contribute at this time, please at least note your prayerful support on your envelope and place it in the weekly offertory. We will then be aware of your continued participation, and you will not be noted as "inactive" on our parish roster.

Vicar's Verbiage

Advance Planning

Dear Friends,

Whenever we go on a trip somewhere, we like to plan ahead. It's a good thing to make sure you will have someplace to stay, that you have bought your tickets, that you know generally what the plan is for the trip and when you will be returning. For modern diplomats and officials of state, these preparations also involve a huge advance contingent to make sure everything goes according to plan. In the case of presidential visits, the Secret Service spends months planning and scouting routes, locations and developing contingences for every possible scenario. They send equipment and personnel ahead as well in preparation—there are two (!) Air Force One's...just in case.

We could say that Saint John the Baptist is like the Secret Service for Jesus. We know him as "the Baptist" because of his role as the one who baptizes Jesus but he is also known as "the Forerunner" or the "Precursor." His major role is to prepare the way for the Messiah. He sets the scene, he calls the people of Israel to repentance and shows them that the Messiah is near. He bursts on the scene as the last of the prophets of the Old Testament, when everything is finally ready for the Messiah. John is not the One but is making the way smooth for the One who is to come.

Saint John the Baptist is a great figure and one that we need for this time. He was unconcerned with the riches and titles of this world, his whole life was dedicated to his mission and he was willing to die for the truth. Its always been interesting to me that even though he is the Forerunner to the Messiah, he died defending the truth of marriage—perhaps a sign of how important that institution is to God.

John is courageous, zealous, dedicated and committed. He is also humble and recognizes that he is the Voice, not the Word. In this time of preparation for Christmas, we can use the example and image of Saint John the Baptist to see if we are truly preparing our hearts and minds for the Messiah. How straight is the path to our hearts?





An Encyclical for All Brothers and Sisters



In his most recent encyclical, *Fratelli Tutti*, Pope Francis invites us to consider how we are called "in the face of present-day attempts to eliminate or ignore others" to respond "with a new vision of fraternity and social friendship that will not remain at the level of words." This week we continue with Chapter 3: Envisaging and Engendering an Open World."

Rights without Borders

- 121. No one, then, can remain excluded because of his or her place of birth, much less because of privileges enjoyed by others who were born in lands of greater opportunity. The limits and borders of individual states cannot stand in the way of this. As it is unacceptable that some have fewer rights by virtue of being women, it is likewise unacceptable that the mere place of one's birth or residence should result in his or her possessing fewer opportunities for a developed and dignified life.
- 122. Development must not aim at the amassing of wealth by a few, but must ensure "human rights personal and social, economic and political, including the rights of nations and of peoples." The right of some to free enterprise or market freedom cannot supersede the rights of peoples and the dignity of the poor, or, for that matter, respect for the natural environment, for "if we make something our own, it is only to administer it for the good of all."
- 123. Business activity is essentially "a noble vocation, directed to producing wealth and improving our world." God encourages us to develop the talents he gave us, and he has made our universe one of immense potential. In God's plan, each individual is called to promote his or her own development, and this includes finding the best economic and technological means of multiplying goods and increasing wealth. Business abilities, which are a gift from God, should always be clearly directed to the development of others and to eliminating poverty, especially through the creation of diversified work opportunities. The right to private property is always accompanied by the primary and prior principle of the subordination of all private property to the universal destination of the earth's goods, and thus the right of all to their use.

Caring for God's Creation – A Plan That Calls for Solidarity

Five years ago, Pope Francis released his encyclical *Laudato Si'* (Care for Our Common Home). Many dioceses,

parishes, parish schools, and families have embraced the call of integral ecology, a key concept in *Laudato Si*'. Integral ecology means that "everything is closely related" and that "today's problems call for a vision capable of taking into account every aspect of the global crisis." *Laudato Si*': *Embarking on a Seven-Year Journey Promoting an Integral Ecology in the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Washington* contains easy to advanced ways for us to exercise stewardship over God's creation. Find the link to the plan at www.adw.org. The plan names seven markers that help to measure the implementation of Laudato Si'. The fourth marker is

4: Adoption of a Simple Lifestyle: In Laudato Si', we are called to adopt a prayerful and intentional approach to our purchases, and to be mindful of the toll our choices have on God's creation and the world we live in. Laudato Si' calls us to live more simply. There are many ways to live more simply that foster care for creation. For example, living simply can include buying less goods, purchasing re-usable products to reduce single use plastics, using plant-based home cleaners and consuming more in-season fruits and vegetables over meat- based meals. Another way to live simply is to use what Pope Francis calls the "circular economy of materials." The circular economy of materials includes the trading, exchanging, and donation of office, home, and personal items within our communities.

bottles) (easy)




