## Sixth Sunday of Easter

The laying down of life for life for love is the theme of today's Gospel. In these final weeks of Eastertide we listen once again to the words of Jesus at the Last Supper. Jesus offers himself as the model of love, willing to go so far as to suffer danger and death to express love. The second reading today explains this more fully. John is writing to the early Christian community and tells them, "My dear people, let us love one another since love comes from God." And in the first reading we learn that God loves everybody. Peter has been hesitant to go into the home of Cornelius, because he is a Roman soldier, outside the Jewish faith community. But when he does, then suddenly the Holy Spirit is poured forth upon that home. The people receive the Spirit just as the first disciples did after Jesus rose from the dead. Peter says, "they have received the Holy Spirit just as much as we have".

Loving as Jesus loved will require sacrifice. Love is not just a sentimental, warm, fuzzy feeling: it's a conscious decision to share ourselves with others, to give of ourselves for the sake of another. Taken from The Living Word

**SUNDAY MASS** - "Beginning May 1, 2021," wrote Bishop Folda, "the general obligation to attend Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation is reinstated in the Diocese of Fargo." The COVID pandemic changed many things for us. Little by little, we've come to this moment where we can welcome people back to celebrate the gifts of our faith. As we begin down this road of crafting post-pandemic church life, the Responsorial Psalm for this 5<sup>th</sup> Sunday of Easter rings wonderful: *"I will praise you, Lord, in the assembly of your people."*

The *Catechism of the Catholic Church* calls the Eucharist "the foundation and confirmation of all Christian practice." As a result, "the faithful are obliged to participate in the Eucharist on days of obligation, unless excused for a serious reason (for example, illness, the care of infants) or dispensed by their own pastor. Those who deliberately fail in this obligation commit a grave sin" (2181).

Hope everyone has had a chance to read bishop's article in the *New Earth*. He noted many exemptions to the obligation. We count on everyone to do what their conscience tells them is best.

One thing CRL promotes is the feast day of Sts Isidore and Maria, patron saints of farmers.

When he was barely old enough to wield a hoe, Isidore entered the service of a wealthy landowner from Madrid. He worked faithfully on his estate for the rest of his life. He married a young woman as simple and upright as himself, Maria de la Cabeza. They had one son, who died as a child.

Isidore had deep religious instincts. He rose early in the morning to go to church and spent many a holiday devoutly visiting the churches of Madrid. All day long, walking behind the plow, he communed with God. His devotion became a problem. Fellow workers complained that he showed up late after lingering in church too long.

He loved the poor and had a great concern for the proper treatment of animals. He died May 15, 1130, and was declared a saint in 1622.

One way Catholics have honored Sts Isidore & Maria is by blessing crosses to be placed in fields and gardens. Would anyone be interested in making a basketful for our parishioners? Call Fr Michael if interested.
