Twenty-Third Sunday in Ordinary Time

In today's readings the riches of the kingdom of heaven are offered to those who are poor, deaf and blind, who are chosen to remind us that God does not have preferences of culture, class or race. We might say God only views us through one lens – the lens of the heart. We are being asked to look beyond external appearances and to see the holiness and beauty within the heart of others. It's not always obvious at first sight, but we are called to look through God's lens, God's eyes. In the first reading, the prophet Isaiah speaks of a time of joy to come, when "the eyes of the blind shall be opened, the ears of the deaf unsealed" and the tongues of those without words will "sing for joy". It would seem that the Lord is offering everything to those who, having little or nothing in this world, still cling on to faith and hope; to these the prophet proclaims the words of God, "Courage!" Do not be afraid... your God... is coming to save you."

It is apparent from today's second reading that St. James does not feel that faith in Christ Jesus is compatible with making distinctions between classes of people. We are offered a very clear example of preferential treatment being given to a rich man, while a poor man is ignored, left to "stand over there" or to "sit on the floor". Our own partiality may not be as obvious, though it can be just as real. We are reminded that it is those who are poor by the standards of our world whom God chooses to be rich in faith and to be beneficiaries of God's kingdom.

Jesus in the Gospel goes by way of Sidon towards the Sea of Galilee. Taking this route brings Jesus into the world of the Gentiles, people regarded as being outside the love and care of the God of Israel. Jesus chooses to open the ears and give back the voice to the deaf man who has an impediment in his speech. Jesus is showing his love for this man, who is an outsider in the Jewish society of his day, by touching his ears and his tongue. Jesus is giving this man back his dignity as a beloved child of God, his Father. The man obviously has faith, as Jesus is able to cure him. We know from other healing stories in the Gospels that faith and trust would seem to be hallmarks of those chosen by God, those poor by the world's standards

"Did not God choose those who are poor in the world to be rich in faith and heirs of the kingdom that he promised to those who love him?" - JAMES 2:5

What is more important – being rich in faith or rich in possessions? Society tells us that possessions are most important. God teaches a different lesson. When we are rich in faith, we keep God first and experience true joy and peace. When we put possessions first, we soon realize we can never have enough and happiness is fleeting. When we put faith over possessions, we truly realize it is better to give than receive.
