**SECURED BY MERCY.** It's a luxury to keep our churches unlocked. Even in rural ND, alarm systems are as common as the kitchen table.

We all like to jump in a vehicle and zip off to another city or state. We fly anywhere in the country in a few hours. Just as we can get elsewhere easier, strangers have easier access to us. Long gone are the days when you rarely left the vicinity and everybody knew who was around. But the easier travel is, the more we fear for our security.

We rarely think about all the precautions we take to protect ourselves with multiple keys and pushbutton carlocks, etc.

There are other senses in which we're closed in. We're slow to open up if

we think someone will judge us. We hesitate to share ideas or get involved because we might get shot down. Fear of others often stunts our growth.

In the Gospel, the disciples lock themselves in a room.

They were afraid of the Jewish authorities. Even Magdalene's thrilling news about the empty tomb and her encounter with Jesus didn't overturn their fear. What had been done to Jesus could

be done to them. So they hid.

Jesus himself broke into their self-imposed confinement. He breathed the Holy Spirit on them. He filled them with new energy. "Do not be afraid!" Freeing them from fear, they could share in his mission. "As the Father sent me, so am I sending you." He sent them to begin a movement of Mercy, announcing forgiveness of sin.

People might struggle to name their sins, yet they readily admit to feeling afraid. We know what worry and doubt look like.

Jesus is determined to enter our lives. He puts an end to any reign of terror that keeps us closed in. He pokes holes in the timidity that keeps us apart.

No locked doors, nor even locked hearts, can keep Jesus out.

His Presence is Mercy.

Faith is our response. Believing in Jesus' Resurrection frees us from every threat. We're more open to others because we've let Jesus' Love shine through our human weakness.

# DIVINE MERCY CHAPLET & HISTORY

The Chaplet is easy to say. Using ordinary Rosary beads:

CHRIST

Is Calling

Our Trust In

HIM

1. Begin with the Sign of the Cross, 1 Our Father, 1 Hail Mary and The Apostles Creed.

2. On the Our Father Beads say: Eternal Father, I offer You the Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of Your dearly beloved Son, Our Lord Jesus Christ, in atonement for our sins and those of the whole world.

3. On the 10 Hail Mary Beads say: For the sake of His sorrowful Passion, have mercy on us and on the whole world. (Repeat step 2 & 3 for all 5 decades).

4. Conclude with (three times): Holy God, Holy Mighty One, Holy Immortal One, have mercy on us and on the whole

In 1933, God gave a Polish Sister, Sister Faustina Kowalsk, a striking vision of His Mercy: "I saw a great radiance, in the midst of it, God the Father. Between this radiance and the Earth I saw Jesus, nailed to the Cross and in such a way that when God wanted to look at the earth, He had to look through the wounds of Jesus. And I understood that it was for the sake of Jesus that God blesses the Earth." (Diary 60)

Jesus said later to Sister Faustina: "Say unceasingly this chaplet that I have taught you. Whoever will receive great Mercy at the hour of death. Priests will recommend it to sinners as their last

hope of salvation. Even if there were a sinner most hardened, if he were to recite this Chaplet only once, he would receive grace from My Infinite Mercy. I desire that the whole world know My Infinite Mercy. I desire to grant unimaginable graces to those who trust in My Mercy. When they say this Chaplet in the presence of the dying, I will stand between My Father and the dying person not as the just judge but as the Merciful Savior."

During the course of Jesus' revelations to Saint Faustina, he asked a number of times for a feast day dedicated to the Divine Mercy, the Sunday after Easter. The liturgical texts for today concern the institution of the Sacrament of Penance, the place where Divine Mercy is specifically celebrated.

This Feast was extended to the Universal Church by Pope St. John Paul II when he canonized Sr. Faustina on April 30, 2000. In a decree that May, the Congregation for Divine Worship stated that "throughout the world the Second Sunday of Easter will receive the name Divine Mercy Sunday, a perennial invitation to the Christian world to face, with confidence in divine benevolence, the difficulties and trials that mankind will experience in the years to come."

"On one occasion," Sr. Faustina writes in her diary, "I heard these words: My daughter, tell the whole world about My Inconceivable mercy. I desire that the Feast of Mercy be a refuge and shelter for all souls, and especially for poor sinners. On that day the very depths of My tender mercy are open. I pour out a whole ocean of graces upon those souls who approach the fount of My mercy. My mercy is so great that no mind, be it of man or of angel, will be able to fathom it throughout all eternity. Everything that exists has come forth from the very depths of My most tender mercy. Every soul in its relation to Me will contemplate My love and mercy throughout eternity. The Feast of Mercy emerged from My very depths of tenderness. It is My desire that it be solemnly celebrated on the first Sunday after Easter. Mankind will not have peace until it turns to the Fount of My Mercy" (*Diary*, 699).
