One lesson from this parable: it's never too late to get it right.

A Co-RESPONSIBLE CHURCH. Last wk, we continued our look at women in ministry—an extenuation of the Sep 3rd Feast of St. Phoebe (see below). After considering the Gospels and Acts of the Apostles, we now turn to the writings of St. Paul.

But first, I wish to acknowledge the anonymous letter I received last week; not so much a letter, but an article anonymously sent. I appreciate the fact that this September discussion on women in ministry has provoked some response from a reader. The article by Dcn Dominic Cerrato is a personal opinion piece taking exception to the stance of Cardinal McElroy (San Diego), who welcomes a change in Church discipline regarding the exclusion of women from the diaconate. Cerrato may very well be correct when he concludes how unlikely it is Pope Francis will change Church practice on only ordaining men to the diaconate. To be clear, I am not advocating for women deacons, but for the discussion about them as posed by the documents of the upcoming Synod in Rome, beginning Oct 9.

Two comments: I.) Dcn Cerrato's credentials are meager, an online doctorate from an unaccredited institution for continuing education, in comparison to Cardinal McElroy's undergraduate degree at Harvard, master's degree in American history from Stanford, a doctorate in moral theology from the Gregorian University in

Rome and a doctorate in political science from Stanford. Gospel truth is not settled by 'degrees', but credentials still mean something when it comes to forming others' minds.

2.) While I'm grateful that someone is taking these bulletin articles seriously, remaining anonymous undercuts any chance of dialog. The Church is becoming synodal, whether we like it or not. To quote the Vatican, "Synodality is an attitude and an approach of moving forward in a co-responsible way that is open to welcoming God's fruits together over time."

Part of that attitude is welcoming face to face discussion. If nothing else, I hope my flock can find in their pastor someone easy to talk to.

Moving on to Saint Paul. His letters show how he trusted women and valued their ministry. In Paul's time, women had many roles and ministries in the Christian community.

Paul valued Priscilla, Euodia, and Syntyche as his co-workers in Gospel ministry. He refers to Junia (Rm 16:7) as a fellow Jew, his fellow prisoner, and as outstanding among the apostles. Paul commends Phoebe to the church at Rome as our sister, as minister/deacon of the church at Cenchrea, and as a benefactor for many, entrusting to her his letter to the Romans. Paul acknowledges positively the ministry labors of Mary of Rome, Tryphena, Tryphosa, and Persis. He warmly mentions no less than ten women in Romans I6. Paul had met some of these women when their journeys intersected. Other women in Romans I6, such as Julia, hosted house churches in Rome. He took seriausly a report from Chlae of Carinth's people. He passed on greetings from Claudia of Rome and sent greetings to Apphia of Colossae. He recognised the house church of Nympha in Laodicea (Col 4:15) and asked that greetings be passed on to her and her church. He respected the faith and teaching of Lois and Eunice (2Tm I:5).

Point is, Paul valued the ministry of women. He even compared his own apostolic ministry to that of a nursing mother (IThes 2:7). At least 18 women are mentioned in Paul's letters; 16 by name. Some he mentions along with a male relative, but most are mentioned independently of a man.

Moreover, Paul used his favorite ministry terms, coworker, deacon/minister, and apostle, for both male and female ministry colleagues. Don't let all their foreign names fool you. The women of the Church today are the heirs of these collaborators among the first generation followers of Jesus.
