

## **St. Paul's Corner**

Blessed are those servants whom the master finds vigilant on his arrival; should he com in the second or third watch and find them prepared, blessed are those servants. Blessed is that servant whom the master on his arrival finds doing so. Death is the doorway we must each walk through to enter eternal life. Are we preparing for the hour of our death? How do we prepare for the hour of our death?

God is the Lord and giver of life. God did not create death, nor does He rejoice in the destruction of the living. Adam and Eve were destined to live in the most perfect relationship with their Creator. God provided everything they needed to live in the most perfect harmony with Himself and the created world. God commanded two things: (1) "Be fruitful and multiply and fill the earth and subdue it; have dominion over the fish of the sea and of the birds of the air and over every living thing that moves on the earth." (2) "You may freely eat of every tree in the garden; but of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil you shall not eat, for in the day you eat of it you shall die." How did death enter human experience?

Adam and Eve bought into a lie. The serpent, Satan, manipulated a truth and they bought into a lie. "Did God say, 'You shall not eat of any tree of the garden?'" but God said, 'You shall not eat of the fruit of the tree, which is in the midst of the garden, neither shall you touch it, lest you die.'" But the serpent says, "You will not die. For God knows that when you eat of it your eyes will be opened, and you will be like God, knowing good and evil." As a consequence of Original Sin, Adam and Eve's disobedience towards God, the human experience of pain, suffering, death and evil enter human history. In God's creative plan He has given us the Sacrament of Baptism.

In Baptism we officially begin our Christian journey through this life and, living in a new relationship in communion with God and His Bride the Church, we live life daily with eternity in mind. Each of us were individually clothed in a white garment as a sign of our Christian dignity, that is to be brought unstained by sin into eternity. On the day of our funeral Mass, we are clothed in white one final time as the white pall is placed over the casket. Thus, symbolizing the completion of our Baptism and Christian journey in this world. How do we prepare for the hour of our death?

We prepare for the hour of our death by living out our Baptism. We live out the Theological Virtues of Faith, Hope and Love. We believe in Resurrection of the Body. We strive to remain in a state of Grace in this life and seek God's mercy and forgiveness in the Sacrament of Reconciliation. We remain united with Jesus Christ and His Bride the Church through the Sacraments. We spend time in prayer, fasting and almsgiving. We strive to observe the Ten Commandments and the 5 Precepts of the Catholic Church. Most importantly we remain vigilant by observing the Two Great commandments by loving God and our neighbor as ourself.
