Prayer & Scripture of the Week

Pray and read Wisdom 9, Psalm 90, or Luke 14.

Consider learning the Prayer of Abandonment by Charles de Foucauld:

Father, I abandon myself into your hands; do with me what you will. Whatever you may do, I thank you: I am ready for all, I accept all. Let only your will be done in me, and in all your creatures I wish no more than this, O Lord.

Into your hands I commend my soul: I offer it to you with all the love of my heart, for I love you, Lord, and so need to give myself, to surrender myself into your hands without reserve, and with boundless confidence, for you are my Father. Amen.

Eucharistic Adoration

Wednesday, September 3rd Eucharistic Adoration will begin at St. Anthony in Mooreton. Eucharistic Adoration begins immediately at the end of daily Mass, roughly around 9:00a.m. with exposition and conclude with the Divine Mercy Chaplet and reposition of the Blessed Sacrament at 11:30a.m. Sign up sheets will be available at the end of Mass throughout the month of September. Signing up helps assure that we have minimum 1-2 adorers an hour but it is not required to sign up. What is Eucharistic Adoration and why is it important?

The importance of Eucharistic Adoration is shown in the fact that the Church has a ritual that regulates it: the Order of Eucharistic Exposition and Benediction. This is an extension of the adoration of the Blessed Sacrament which occurs in every Mass: "Behold the Lamb of God, behold him who takes away the sins of the world. Blessed are those called to the supper of the Lamb." Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament flows from the sacrifice of the Mass and serves to deepen our hunger for communion with Christ and the rest of the Church. The Rite concludes with the ordained minister blessing the faithful with the Blessed Sacrament.




Sts. Peter & Paul Weekly Announcements

The International Pilgrim Virgin Statue of Our Lady of Fatima

Traveling since 1847 after being blessed by the Bishop of Latria Fatima, on October 13, 1847, the statue left Fatima and was flown to America to begin its tour to bring the grace of Fatima to those many millions of people who may not otherwise have the opportunity to make a pilgrimage to Fatima land. The Bishop prays that Our Lady's presence would travel with it wherever she

went. It was blessed again in 1922 by Pope Pius XI, who had crowned the original statue in Fatima as Queen of the world just a few years earlier. The International Pilgrim Virgin Statue has visited more than 100 countries, bringing Mary's powerful message of salvation and hope to millions. St. Paul's Corner

Sunday October 7th, 2025, Pope Leo XIV will canonize Blessed Pier Giorgio Frassati and Blessed Carlo Acutis elevating them to sainthood. Who were these two men?

“In an age where faith is often lived quietly, Blessed Pier Giorgio Frassati stands as a vibrant witness that holiness can be young, joyful, and alive in the world. Born on April 6, 1901, in Turin, Italy, Pier Giorgio was the son of Alfredo Frassati, a newspaper owner and diplomat, and Adelaide Ametis, a painter. Despite his privileged upbringing, he directed his life toward the poor and toward God, never letting wealth or status distract him from the call of the Gospel. From his youth, Pier Giorgio was deeply devoted to prayer and the sacraments. He attended daily Mass, prayed the Rosary with love, and spent time in Eucharistic Adoration. His faith was not hidden, he joined Catholic Action, was active in the St. Vincent de Paul Society, and became a Third Order Dominican, taking to heart the call to seek holiness in daily life. His personal motto, “Verso l’Alto” (“To the Heights”), captured both his love of mountain climbing and his spiritual pursuit of heaven. At just 24 years old, Pier Giorgio contracted polio, likely from ministering to the sick, and died on July 4, 1925. At his funeral, Turin’s streets were filled with thousands of mourners — many of them the poor he had served quietly and faithfully.” (Catholic Online News)

“Carlo’s life was characterized by a remarkable integration of faith and reason. Despite his young age, he exhibited an exceptional intellect and a keen interest in understanding the mysteries of technology and Catholicism. He spent many hours honing his skills as a computer programmer while remaining committed to prayer and devotion. At the age of seven, Carlo began participating in daily Mass and developed a deep love for the Eucharist. “My secret is to contact Jesus every day,” he said. He also prayed the rosary often, demonstrating his profound devotion to Jesus’ Mother, the Blessed Virgin Mary: “The Virgin Mary is the only woman in my life.” One of Carlo’s most significant contributions to the Church was the creation of both a portable exhibition and a related website cataloging Eucharistic miracles from around the world. He was able to catalog 187 Eucharistic miracles during a period of two-and-a-half years. Through his expertise in computer programming, Carlo sought to share the profound reality of the Real Presence with others, inviting them to encounter Jesus in the Eucharist. “The Eucharist is the highway to heaven,” Carlo often said. “When we face the sun we get a tan... but when we stand before Jesus in the Eucharist we become saints.” Despite his untimely death at the age of fifteen from leukemia in October 2006, Carlo’s legacy endures as a testament to the power of holiness in the digital age. His impact on the Church and the world continues to inspire countless individuals, particularly young people and computer programmers.” (Catholic.com)
