
## Scripture & Prayer

## **St. Paul's Corner**

The Lord has revealed his saving power! How have we encountered God throughout this past week? When we speak of encountering God, His grace, it is to acknowledge the different ways God reveals Himself. The word revelation comes from the Greek apokalypsis, often translated in English as apocalypse or apocalyptic, meaning to uncover or to reveal. In Latin, revelare or revelatio meaning to unveil, uncover or lay bare. The Catholic Church has long taught three primary ways God reveals himself.

First Revelation refers to the multitude of different ways God reveals himself to humanity through the natural order of creation. The sun and moon rising and setting, the changing of the seasons, observing bees working in or around their hives, a spider spinning its web, appreciating the beauty of trees or waterfalls, the rushing or powerful sound of waves or the gentleness of the wind blowing. We could include any number of experiences each of us have had by delighting in God's creation around us and letting Him speak to our heart.

Second Revelation refers to the Sacred Scriptures. The Catholic Church has always taught and upheld that the Sacred Scriptures, the Bible, is the inerrant Word of God. The Scriptures were written by human authors, under the influence of God's Spirit, therefore there can be no error in them. What does it mean to inspire? In Latin, In-Spire, meaning to breath into whereas to ex-spire is to be without breath or spirit. God breathes his spirit into the Sacred Scriptures. God reveals himself and his plan for salvation through the five major covenants formed between God and: Adam, Noah, Abraham, Moses, and King David. The fulfillment of the New Covenant is established in the person of Jesus Christ. All six of these mediators stand between God and His people as they make God's plan known to humanity.

Third Revelation refers to the Incarnation—God taking on human flesh in the person of Jesus Christ. He becomes like us in all things except sin. Person, in Latin, per-se-una means by itself one. Jesus Christ is one person with two natures: Human and Divine, without mixture. The Incarnation is the distinguishing sign of the Christian Faith. It distinguishes us from Judaism, Islam and every other major world religion. In the Incarnation the visible and the invisible, as we profess in the Creed every Sunday, are joined together. Sts. Peter and Paul walked by the side of Jesus Christ and St. Anthony preached the Incarnation.

The Incarnation, Jesus Christ, is the firm foundation for the existence of the Catholic Church, the Sacraments, our spiritual life of prayer and service, morals, ethics, politics. In general, absolutely everything and everyone is dependent on God who has loved everything and everyone into existence. The Lord's saving power is revealed through the Pascal Mystery his Incarnation, Passion, Death, Resurrection and Ascension into Heaven.

Spend time out in creation, read the Sacred Scriptures, study the Faith!
