St. Paul's Corner

This weekend we celebrate the Dedication of St. John Lateran in Rome. In the 4th century the Emperor Constantine had the original church built. With the Edict of Milan (313AD) Constantine decreed the end of the bloody persecutions by promulgating the freedom of Christians with legal recognition. The Emperor gave Pope Melchiade (311-314AD) the land on Mount Celio, previously owned by the patrician family of the Lateran.

The cathedral was dedicated to the Savior in 318. It was adorned with splendid friezes including seven silver altars with seven gold candelabra inlaid with portraits of prophets. Constantine also built the Baptistery on the northwestern corner of the church, which still continues to stand in its original design.

The Basilica was consecrated in 324 by Melchiade's successor, Pope Sylvester I, and dedicated, by the will of the Emperor, to the Most Holy Christ the Savior. In the 9th century, Sergius III also dedicated it to St. John the Baptist, while in the 12th century Pope Lucius II (1144-1145) also added St. John the Evangelist. The Lateran Palace, known as the Patriarchate, was the official residence of the Pope until the 15th century.

St. John Lateran is the "Mother church" of all Christian churches. How tall and what are the width of the doors? Entering into St. John Lateran a person should notice the doors which are made of bronze and are roughly 25ft tall and 7.5ft wide. You really cannot miss them.

Many of us often say we are going to church on Sundays, but what does the word church mean? The Catechism reminds us, "**Church** is the name given the "convocation" or "assembly" of the People God has called together from "the ends of the earth." In Christian usage, the word "Church" has three inseparable meanings: (1) The People that God gathers in the whole world; (2) The particular or local church (diocese); (3) and the liturgical (above all Eucharistic) assembly. The Church draws her life from the Word and the Body of Christ, and so herself becomes Christ's Body. In the Creed, the sole Church of Christ is professed to be one, holy, catholic, and apostolic."

Let us keep in mind a physical church building is a sacred place. The essential purpose of going into a church is a place of prayer and worship. So often many people in our own time have forgotten, disregard, or dismiss the sacredness of churches. They are places of spiritual refuge from the world. Jesus reminds us of this when he calls out those who are profaning the sacredness of the Temple in Jerusalem. Even Jesus had a holy and righteous anger when the sacred is profaned.
