St. Paul's Corner

Pope Leo XIV reminds all Christians, “Love for the Lord, then, is one with love for the poor. The same Jesus who tells us, “The poor you will always have with you” (*Mt 26:11*), also promises the disciples: “I am with you always” (*Mt 28:20*). We likewise think of his saying: “Just as you did it to one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did it to me” (*Mt 25:40*). This is not a matter of mere human kindness but a revelation: contact with those who are lowly and powerless is a fundamental way of encountering the Lord of history. In the poor, he continues to speak to us.” *On Love for the Poor #5*

Know your Faith

Archbishop Fulton Sheen once said, “There are not one hundred people in the United States who hate The Catholic Church, but there are millions who hate what they wrongly perceive the Catholic Church to be.”

Father, Do Catholic worship Mary? The Church’s devotion to the Blessed Virgin dates back to the very first believers. The Catechism states that “although it is ‘very special’, Marian devotion ‘differs essentially from the adoration which is given to the incarnate Word and equally to the Father and the Holy Spirit’.” It goes on to say that “prayer to the Blessed Mother of God always remains centered ‘on the person of Christ manifested in his mysteries’. All that we believe about Mary is based on our faith in Christ”.

Mary was given a special role in God’s plan of redemption. She is seen as the New Eve, preserved from original sin and set apart from all sin by divine grace. The Catechism makes clear: “But this privilege does not place the Virgin outside the universal sphere of redemption. Mary has received all that she is from Christ. She is the first to be redeemed by the blood of the cross.”

A simple way of understanding believers’ relationship with Mary is one of imitation – we seek to imitate her openness to and acceptance of God’s will in our lives. In turn, she, as the Queen Mother of Christ’s Kingdom, hears our petitions and presents them to Jesus, in the same way that she asked Jesus to provide wine at the wedding at Cana.
