



'They need to see you in love with Jesus'


TIPTON — Teenagers need the accompaniment of well-formed adults to combat the overload of information and violence in a relativistic world and to embrace a passionate relationship with Jesus Christ.

"The best, most effective way to help kids fall in love with Jesus: missio ad extra," said Michael Havercamp as he wrote the Latin words on a flip chart. "They need to see you in love with Jesus. His love, his freedom, his happiness ... if they see those things in you, they'll naturally trust you, then be curious" about personally falling in love with Christ.

Havercamp was the guest presenter at the Lafayette diocese's 2018 Youth and Young Adult Ministry Summit, held May 23 at the St. Joseph Retreat and Conference Center.

Nearly 20 youth and young adult ministers from across the diocese attended.

Priests' lives

n June 2, I ordained two men to the transitional diaconate and two to the priesthood. In the words that follow, I want to remind us of who (not what) a man becomes in priesthood, and how he fits into the ministry of the diocese. Then I offer a few thoughts about his

new relationship to the
Eucharist, the Word, to service
and to suffering.
You might have noticed that

last week's column was a repeat. That was a timely accident. This week I return to some of the same themes. And since the seminarian appeal is in progress, it helps us all to reflect on what is entailed in

the call to diocesan priesthood.

Again this week Î point to the *Catechism of the Catholic Church* (*CCC*), and to numbers 1533 through 1600. These 16 pages underline the graces and interrelated duties of bishops, priests and deacons. Each level of ordained ministry is part of the hierarchy of the Catholic Church. What follows is mainly about diocesan priesthood, but most applies to our priests who are Precious Blood Missionaries or Dominican friars.

While Church teaching is clear about the reality of our shared baptismal priesthood, ordination consecrates a man to a priesthood that is different in kind, not only in degree. It has permanent character, as do baptism and confirmation. Its privileges and obligations may be dispensed or suspended, but one always remains a priest.

Diocesan priests do not so much "have" priesthood as they participate in priesthood with their bishop and

brother priests. It is this presbyterium that leads and serves the people under the direction of the bishop. Priests are the bishops' "prudent co-workers."

Those of you who have partici pated at the annual Chrism Mass witness this connection in the renewal of priestly promises.

A careful reading of the CCC reveals the tremendous dignity of the ordained priesthood. While bishops exercise a different level of authority, it is incorrect to say that other men are "only priests." When one recognizes that priests and bishops act "in the person of Christ" and share in his priesthood, and at Mass make present Christ's one sacrifice, we

all are directed to Christ himself. We teach this while at the same time recognizing that the human ministers are not preserved from human weaknesses.

The whole of priestly ministry draws its strength from the sacrifice of the Mass. It takes a while for a man to adjust to this felt reality. Praying publicly is one thing, presiding at Eucharistic celebrations is another.

Knowing God's word and preaching the Gospel are also at the heart of priestly ministry. The Liturgy of the Word is an encouragement not only to the assembly of the faithful, but to the priest himself. By immersing himself in this aspect of his ministry, God's grace reaches out to him.

Service. Our diocesan priests are ordained first for the service of the diocese as a whole, and then as leaders in individual parishes. A few men serve specialized ministries as chaplains or canon lawyers, but each serves

the needs of the diocese. Priest assignments are given in this light, and sometimes changed in order to build a man's capacity for future leadership, or to make an allowance for health or age. While we all desire "the right match" of priests and parishes, there are more variables than you might imagine. I consult with a "personnel board" of priests over many months.

During the past 12 months, it has become apparent that we are getting stretched thin, especially when trying to find "supply priests" when a pastor gets sick or takes a vacation. Later this year, I hope to have some graphic representations about the facts that are impacting our ministries. ("Date driven" decisions are only part of our reality, but they cannot be discounted.) Every bishop here has had to deal with growth and change, and sharing our realities with priests and parishes is a work in progress.

Lastly, the priest daily participates in the dying and rising of Christ especially as he encounters the sufferings of his people. Seamus Heaney's poem "The Biretta" depicts a type of sadness that grace helps a priest to withstand. It is part of the calling to be with those who are suffering and help them unite their suffering with Christ's. As Pope Francis points out, there is suffering from loss, death and deprivation. He also acknowledges suffering in the "existential margins" when things don't seem to make sense or offer hope. Or where the truth about things is difficult to find or defend.

Please pray for priests in each of these four areas. Our men, as do we all, continually return to Jesus as the way, the truth and the life (Jn 14:6). We do this so that we can be who, not just what, the Lord calls us to be.







Diocese hosts Youth and Young Adult Ministry Summit

"Truth matters because God wants you to be happy," Havercamp said he has told teens.

Havercamp is the national liaison to the Catholic Church for the non-profit organization Young Life. He spoke on the topic of "Accompaniment: Keys to Relational Ministry to Young People."

Participants at the Tipton event also built upon already-existing camaraderie by sharing program ideas, their difficulties evangelizing youth, and personal ongoing formation.

"You are an incarnated witness of the healing power of God in you, in your person, if you adequately receive it," Havercamp told them.

He stressed the importance of pursuing ongoing adult formation on a personal and professional level, because otherwise, "we send ill-equipped, wounded people out into the mess and we make more of a mess."

Accompanying the youth of the diocese in their encounters with Christ begins with cultivating open and honest relationships with teenagers at the parishes, he said.

This means disconnecting from distractions and embracing silence.

"The remedy for noise and distraction is the spiritual practices of silence, solitude and nature," he said.

The average teen spends nine hours a day online. To help break that cycle, Havercamp suggested adults "habituate their hearts to appreciate" nature and silence.

"Outside is awesome. Outside is what God created. Everything God created is good," he said. "God put us on a planet where our very habitation, our environment is a liturgy. Do you realize how powerful the liturgy of nature is?"

Once the break has been made, it will be easier to answer "the call to help youths and young adults encounter Jesus Christ and embrace the Catholic faith as personal," Havercamp explained.

If youth are uninspired with religious education in a classroom setting, Havercamp said, "There's still you.

He said that this smaller scale may be difficult, as it is more personal, but "programs won't evangelize; it is the person who does the changing."

He also suggested talking to teens "about the pathways God allows them to go on" and to ask how it is working for them. This technique has helped Havercamp build authentic friendships with youth and "I've earned the right to be heard."

That is the pivotal moment when a youth minister can explain, "God wants you to be happy. There's a deep, authentic, lasting, enduring happiness (that) God wants for you just like any parent does," he said.

Jonathan Sullivan, diocesan director of catechesis, said, "I'm a big believer these kinds of things are really important for our ongoing formation and to strengthen our ministry, to be helped to form disciples of Jesus Christ."

He explained the necessity of ongoing formation for youth ministers to better serve the youth.

Retreats and presentations that the Office of Catechesis has planned are intended to help everyone "assist the ministry of the bishop and ultimately bring it back to our parishes," he said.

"We need to be missionary disciples ourselves until Jesus comes back," said Paul Sifuentes, associate director of youth and young adult formation for the diocese.

He said the diocese's upcoming programs, as well as the "beautiful liturgy" of ordinations, will "help you continue your ministry."

"All of us have to be attentive to evangelization and how that connects with our individual ministries," Sullivan said. Building the parishes' impact on their youth starts with "working with our priests to understand the importance of adult faith formation."

That is why youth ministers, pastors, priests, deacons and administrators are being encouraged to attend the diocese's Adult Faith Formation Symposium on Aug. 8-9.

Sullivan said there is more that all catechetical leaders can do in regards to parishlevel adult faith formation.

"It is not just about dumping knowledge into heads," he said. "It is about how we live together, pray together, celebrate the Mass. All of that is formative."

"To personally see and hear all of this stuff your diocese is doing to propel you forward into the mission of evangelization and discipleship is a really good thing," Havercamp said. "You are really blessed."

Catholics should pray daily, attend Mass weekly, and retreat regularly to build the practice of a habitual prayer life, Havercamp said. Adequately receiving the grace of God is like marriage where "you have to invest in it every day."

Returning to the flip chart, he wrote another Latin phrase: "Missio ad intra is what you are physically doing" to build individual love of Christ.

Sullivan supported this with a personal story of how the practice of praying the

rosary got him out of a prolonged disruption of his prayer life.

"Just the practice of praying the rosary and getting back into that habit is what finally drew me back into a deeper prayer life," he said. "It wasn't what I learned in graduate school; it was the practices that I had to develop."

Referring to the work of diocesan clergy as "captaining the ships of the parishes," Sullivan said a concerted effort to attend the adult symposium would help to build stronger youth and young adult ministries.

"The Church says that adult faith formation is really at the center of all of our catechetical efforts, because we need to have wellformed adults if we're going to have well-formed youth," he said.

Sifuentes spoke of other upcoming events, with an emphasis on how the middle school and high school events will "really get back into the Bible."

"Devoted," a high-school retreat named after Acts 2:42, will be held on Nov. 18; the Vigil for Life, planned for students who cannot participate in the March for Life due to school schedules, will be held on Jan. 21, 2019; and "Encounter," a Catholic middle-school event, will be Feb. 2, 2019.

Sifuentes reminded the summit participants that the diocese also provides a podcast, "Pizza and Side Hugs," as a resource for missionary disciples in youth and young adult ministries. It can be found at www.dol-in.org/pizzasidehugs.
