Anointing of the Sick

THE BLOOD OF THE COVENANT

God, Who is Love, wants to love us in a permanent, faithful relationship, which is similar to marriage, only better. As married couples make a covenant with each other by exchanging marriage vows, so the Lord made covenants with Noah, Abraham, Moses, David, and all His chosen people. The problem with these covenants was that God's people broke them all. Human beings seem incapable of keeping a covenant with God, incapable of loving God faithfully. Therefore, God promised to make a new covenant. He said: "I will place My law



within them, and write it upon their hearts; I will be their God, and they shall be My people". We will be able to keep this covenant because God will place it inside us and write it on our hearts. This means that God will give us a new nature, one capable of love and faithfulness.

Jesus gave us this new nature and new covenant by His death on the cross. We receive our new nature and covenant by being born again of water and the Spirit, by being baptized into Jesus and into His death and resurrection. By faith, we live according to our new nature and in the new covenant.

Two weeks from today, you will be asked to renew your baptismal promises. You will be asked to decide if you will live a life of covenant love. What will you decide?

Prayer: Father, may my life be like a grain of wheat which falls to the earth and dies to bear much fruit.

FROM FR. MARIO

KENOSIS...What?

IF IT DIES, IT PRODUCES MUCH FRUIT. Jesus gives a new direction; he presents a paradigm shift that he lives himself. It is in self-giving that we have self-fulfillment, in self-emptying that we have fullness of life, and in self-offering that we have self-worth. The focus is on giving rather than receiving, service rather than self-preservation, and dying to self rather than security of self.

The seed must fall to the ground and die. It must take in water, sun, and nutrients in the soil. And it must depend on the care of the planter. Only with this situation then can the seed live, grow and bear fruit. This is also what it means to empty self, to suffer, and to sacrifice. We must be totally dependent on the care and guidance of Jesus. Only then can we grow in faith and bear lasting fruits of good works.

Our baptism is our dying to self and sin. Our rising to a new life is in Jesus. How do we experience dying to self as to produce much fruit? We can be of real service to God if we bury our selfish ambitions and whims. We can be true workers for God if we reject the lure of pleasure, prestige, and popularity. We can devote to God and his people if we are willing to give our time, talents, and treasure for the good of others.

Kenosis makes us attentive to God's presence, allow us to be touched, and truly be transformed by God. Lenten season is the best time to learn the art of kenosis so that we have all the empty space in our lives for God and him alone.

RCIA Lenten Journey

RCIA Lenten Journey for the week of March 22:

As Lent's "purification and enlightenment" processes continue, our RCIA candidates and inquirers will take a close look at the way personal sin and social sin erode our relationship with Jesus Christ. This is in response to Sunday's special penitential rite.

Sunday we witnessed the candidates (who will receive the Sacraments of Confirmation and Holy Eucharist at the Easter Vigil,) experience a special Penitential Rite that helps prepare them to celebrate the sacrament of penance prior to full communion in the Catholic Church. This rite can be just as valuable to us in the Assembly. We are reminded in this rite of the comforting message of pardon for sin. We are reminded of our God's infinite love for us and mercy toward us. The celebrant asks God at one point in the ceremony to give each of us a true spirit of repentance, a deepened sense of sin and the true freedom of the children of God. We will explore each facet of this request as well as each of the intercessions where we ask our God to give us a deeper appreciation of our baptism into Christ's death and resurrection, And to grant the grace to approach the sacrament of reconciliation with whole-hearted trust in God's Mercy. We also God to grant the spiritual stamina to continue our life-long efforts to grow, to love, and to seek virtue and holiness of life; and to give us the courage to renounce ourselves and put others first. We pray for the freedom and know-how to share the joy of our faith! As Easter approaches, we continue our attempts to reconcile our lives with God's plan for us!

FROM THE DIOCESE

Lenten Guidelines

Catholics between the ages of 18 and 59 are obliged to fast (two small meals and one regular meal, no eating between) on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. In addition, all Catholics, 14 years old and older, must abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday, Good Friday and all the Fridays of Lent.

FASTING is to be observed by all, 18 years of age and older, who have not yet celebrated their 59th birthday. On a fast day, one full meal is allowed. Two other meals, sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken according to each one's needs, but together they should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted, but liquids, including milk and juices are allowed.

ABSTINENCE is observed by all 14 years of age and older. On days of abstinence no meat is allowed. Note that when health or ability to work would be seriously affected, the law does not oblige. When in doubt concerning fast and abstinence, the parish priest (pastor) should be consulted (CCL, Nos. 1251-1252).

Fasting, almsgiving, and prayer are the three traditional disciplines of Lent. The faithful and catechumens should undertake these practices seriously in a spirit of penance and of preparation for baptism or of renewal of baptism at Easter.
