When formation for the diaconate started more than 20 years ago in Waterloo, I had no idea where the road would lead me. I guess I depended on God to lead me to the place where I am now. Before you start to get the idea that I am going to announce my retirement, I am not quite there yet. When I was still teaching at St. John School of Religion, a comment from a student stuck in my memory and has troubled me ever since: "You can give me all the information you know, but if my folks never talk about it again, I'm not going to remember it". That's where Generations of Faith comes in. These evenings, set aside twice a year, give parents, grandparents, neighbors and friends a chance to share experiences of their faith with the next generations of believers. It demonstrates the importance faith has in the lives of people they love and respect. These are experiences that raise the importance of Faith in their lives. The Generations of Faith event this past February 7 was titled Called to Serve. We did a modified scavenger hunt focusing on identifying 12 main elements every Catholic Church has. There were 5 areas in Church and the Gathering Space where small groups of cluster members shared information and experienced each holy item. The participants got to look into the empty tabernacle, ring the liturgical bells, stand behind the lectern, gaze into the eyes of Jesus in the sculptures of the stations, see where Fr. Jim hangs his fancy vestments, touch the altar stone containing the relic of a Saint, and participate in an activity to identify their spiritual gifts. It was so rewarding to see the interest in everyone's faces and hear the presenters tell me how exciting it was to hear so many questions from young and old alike. Having people question what you're showing them is the most rewarding thing that can happen to a teacher. It means they are interested and care about the topic. Since then more than 20 people have volunteered to serve our parishes as lectors, altar servers, ushers, choir members, catechists, etc. Join one of these ministries and invite others to join, too. It's an extra layer of belonging and helps us get to know our fellow cluster members.

As Catholics, the Eucharist is a vital aspect of our Faith. The Eucharist is more than bread and wine. We believe that Jesus is truly present: body, blood, soul, and divinity in the Eucharist. Our First Communion program forms our First Communicants and their families to cherish the real presence of Jesus in the Eucharist and everything which radiates from the Blessed Sacrament. Parents are given the opportunity to share their knowledge and learn with their children about the Eucharist. The Eucharist primes our First Communion families by focusing on the word Communion. Jesus desired the unity of all peoples, hence why the reception of the Eucharist is called communion. We profess that we are one Church in the unity of Jesus Christ when receiving the Eucharist. The Eucharist series closes by reminding us the Blessed Sacrament is the bread of life that provides the grace to share Christ with all peoples.

There is also the chance to come together as a First Communion Class at our retreat where students can practice the communal aspect of the Eucharist and prepare to receive. First Communionicants hear the story of St. Imelda, the patroness of First Communionicants. They also have the opportunity to practice receiving with Father Jim and to make their banners. We celebrated First Communion at St. Boniface and Holy Family on Divine Mercy weekend and April 13th at Immaculate Conception.
