Gospel

Matthew 10:26-33

Jesus said to the Twelve: "Fear no one. Nothing is concealed that will not be revealed, nor secret that will not be known. What I say to you in the darkness, speak in the light; what you hear whispered, proclaim on the housetops. And do not be afraid of those who kill the body but cannot kill the soul; rather, be afraid of the one who can destroy both soul and body in Gehenna. Are not two sparrows sold for a small coin? Yet not one of them falls to the ground without your Father's knowledge. Even all the hairs of your head are counted. So do not be afraid; you are worth more than many sparrows. Everyone who acknowledges me before others I will acknowledge before my heavenly Father. But whoever denies me before others, I will deny before my heavenly Father."

A quote from Pope Francis:

"To be a good father, the first requirement is to be present in the family. To be close to his wife, to share in everything, joy and pain, burdens and hopes. And to be close to the children as they grow: when they play and when they make efforts, when they are carefree and when they are distressed, when they dare and when they are afraid, when they make missteps and when they return to the right path. A father must always be present, but being present is not the same as controlling. Fathers who seek to control end up stifling their children; they do not let them grow."

A Letter from Fr. Pablo Bonello

During the Liturgy of Easter, the Church reads a sermon of a great saint of our Church, St Peter Chrysologus (+450). The saint invites us to listen to Jesus crucified. The saint says, “*Listen to the Lord’s appeal: “**In me**, I want you to see your own body, your members, your heart, your bones, your blood. You may fear what is divine, but **why not love what is human?** You may run away from me as the Lord, but **why not run to me as your father?** Perhaps you are filled with shame for causing my bitter passion. Do not be afraid. **This cross** inflicts a mortal injury, not on me, but on death. **These nails** no longer pain me, but only deepen your love for me. **Come**, then, return to me and learn to know me as your father, who repays good for evil, love for injury, and boundless charity for piercing wounds.”*

“Come!” Jesus invites us. And we did so, thanks be to God. We came to Christ when we were baptized, and we continue to come to Him whenever we receive the sacraments, in our prayer, and in His Word. In a decisive way, we come to Jesus when we discover Him in our neighbor, because we are to recognize Him in our brothers and sisters if it is true that we wish to be His disciples. **In children** we will see His innocence; **in faithful husbands and wives**, we contemplate His love, which *bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things* (I Cor 13: 7); **in young people**, we perceive His generosity and magnanimity; **in the elders** we find His wisdom and perseverance.

Our saint mentions another way for coming to Christ: it is by offering God the sacrifice of our bodies and minds. It is mentioned by the Apostle and commented by our Saint, who says: “Listen now to what the Apostle urges us to do. *I appeal to you*, he says, to **present your bodies** as a living sacrifice. By this exhortation of his, Paul has raised all men to priestly status. How marvelous is the priesthood of the Christian, for he is both the victim that is offered on his own behalf, and the priest who makes the offering.”
