What's Pastor Thinking

I suppose every one knows

who makes us feel less important than they, less human than they. These people seem to have it all town, but couldn't figure out why he had come to together - manicured lawn, neat-as-a-pin house, beautiful children, fancy cars. Yet, when you try to make friends with these people, you get the distinct impression that they would be doing you a favor by being your friend. And, that makes you feel second-class.

Today's gospel is about two people, both of whom communion. Yet, he kept returning. believed in God, both of whom prayed to God. One This morning, long after the Mass, he remained in was a first-class citizen, one who we should admire. He participated in church: Sunday morning Mass, Wednesday night prayer meetings and volunteered at everything. He was, as we say, in everything but the Christmas creche! If there was a church group formed or something to be done, he was there.

Like the Pharisee, he was a faithful man, but something was missing. Nothing in all his church activity had touched his heart. Nothing usually did. Last Sunday his wife commented about all those young people who had been in church that morning. Couldn't their parents contain them? Couldn't their parents keep them quiet? After all, when their children were young, they knew how to behave.

Also in church that morning, tucked away, leaning someone who is 'stuck up,' someone against the wall near the confessional, was a second man. The usher had seen him around our church. Actually, the second man had been coming to church for quite a while. He started when he lost his job, just before his marriage dissolved. He had been there ever week since, just to get right with God. He knew he wasn't good enough to be a volunteer, never mind receive

> church, overcome with joy or grief, he didn't know which. He could not explain what happened to him during that morning. All he could say was 'God will help me.'

> Two men went up to pray and God was available to both. God didn't love one more than the other. God did not love the tax-collector more than the Pharisee. God loves us all the same. The problem is that we don't love each other all the same. It is the Pharisee's lack of connection with the tax collector, his determination to set himself apart from, and above, the tax-collector that prevents the Pharisee from opening himself to God's grace. Two people went up to pray. One sought God to tell God how good he was. One sought God to ask for God's love.



EUCHARISTIC MINISTERS



In those instances when there remains more consecrated wine than was necessary, if needs dictate, Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion may consume what remains of the Precious Blood from their cup of distribution. 



- More people attending Mass on Sundays. The masses are not well attended.
- I was very happy to hear Fr.
 Adrian say how important our lay ministries are the life of the parish. We need to build up "our" parish, clergy, religious and laity all working together to build our church and the religion.
- There is nothing wrong with our parish. We are going in the right direction.
- Support school. Engage with parishioners to leverage interests, talents and treasures.
- A form of Religious Ed to go on until 18 years of age. A 14 teenagers can be vulnerable. - Is there a better way to know when all spots for EM's are covered for Mass and/or know beforehand that additional priests will take some of the spots? I am never sure whether to go up or not-tend not to go for fear of having to turn back.
- In fact I was delighted to be before the Blessed Sacrament. It was very thoughtful of you. More opportunity to grow together.
- Perpetual Adoration
- Encourage the parishioners to not leave the pews full of bulletins after Mass.
- More opportunity to hear what we can do as EM's, Lectors, Choir Members and Ushers.

ANY OTHER COMMENTS?

- Perhaps offering seasonal family activities, games or crafts.
- Religious Education should be centered around the Mass (classes should be in conjunction with Saturday evening or Sunday Masses). If possible, one or both parents should attend with the children. The parents need a refresher on the reason why "they are Catholic" and how to grow their faith.
- Ask for people to get involved-encourage people to get involved.
- We used to have the bells play hymns at night.
 The church may be made more aware of itself and it adds a nice touch to not only the parishioners but also the whole community at large.
- I also like the way that homilies are geared to daily life here and now.


Episode 4: Saint Charles Borromeo: The Good Shepherd



A Cardinal Dedicated to Reform

As the nephew of the Pope, Charles Borromeo was one of the most powerful men in Rome. Yet he chose the challenge of reform, and lived for his flock.





The subject of the Readings for today is Humility just as it was a few weeks ago (September 4), so why would the Church bring this subject up again? Because humility is something that almost everyone thinks they have and, unfortunately, most of us do not. So what is humility? Let us go through the readings and see examples of this great, but seldom understood, virtue.

In the First Reading from the Book of Sirach (35:12-14, 16-18), the writer is expounding some of the many divine qualities of God. Please notice the examples of certain people that God hears and helps, e.g., the weak, the oppressed, the deaf, widows, etc. These are not necessarily poor people; rather, they are those who approach God in prayer with humility, recognizing their needs and their dependence upon God for help.

The Responsorial Psalm is (34:2 3, 17-19, 23). The Psalmist is also giving us many qualities of Godthat are related to those who seek help from the Lord, recognizing their own faults and failures and taking refuge in Him.

The Second Reading is from St. Paul's Second Letter to Timothy (4:6-8, 16-18). The time of the writing of this letter is near the end of St. Paul's life. He is in prison in Rome and recognizes that the end is near. He has already been saved from one execution ("rescued from the lion's mouth"). Here he is pouring out his thoughts to Timothy about his ministry over the years and his situation now. He rejoices that he has served God well and, because of his close relationship with

Jesus Christ, God is pleased with him. Therefore, the fate that is coming will only bring Him into heaven sooner. This is the ultimate in humility.

The Gospel Reading is taken from the Gospel of Luke (18:9-14). It is so easy for the healthy and wealthy to be pleased with themselves and to look down upon those who haven't "made it" in this life. But, listen to what Jesus says in this parable. He is not condemning wealth or social status or good health. Rather, he is saying that we must recognize that all of these things ultimately came from God in some way or another and that we should constantly give thanks to Him for His mercy and goodness. Recognizing and accepting this fact about ourselves is the essence of humility.

We must try to understand the spiritual (or Biblical) meaning of Humility. It does not mean to demean or belittle oneself. Instead, humility means to recognize who and what we are in the eyes of God and who God is in our life. Then we must learn to recognize that all of our possessions, talents and good qualities are God's gift to us. What we do with them is our gift to God! No one is a "self-made" person. We all arrived at where we are today with the help of others. So, the question that we might ask ourselves is "Have I given thought or thanks to those who have helped me along the way?" Something to think about during your Prayer Time this week!



To see how the Mass developed, it is necessary to look at the history of the Church. It didn't start out as Christian.

Jesus was Jewish. So were the apostles and all the original followers of what was viewed by both the Romans and the Jewish people as a Jewish sect, of which there were many in the Holy Land at that time. In fact, they weren't even called Christians. They referred to themselves as followers of The Way, likely related to both the words of Isaiah and John the Baptist (prepare the way of the Lord), and Jesus' words to St. Thomas, Jn 14:6, "I am the way and the truth and the life." They were first called Christians around 43 AD as we read in Acts 11: 25-26a, "Then he (Barnabas) went to Tarsus to look for Saul, and when he had found him he brought him to Antioch. For a whole year they met with the church and taught a large number of people, and it was in Antioch that the disciples were first called Christians." Over the next fifty years or so, the term became more widely used, and the separation between Jews and Christians became more apparent. During this period three things happened. First was the inclusion of Gentiles into the sect, and the consequent dispensation from Jewish dietary and circumcision laws. Second was the destruction of the temple in 70 AD, which was attributed by some as the fault of the new Christian sect not following the laws of God. Third, as the divinity of Christ came to be more understood among the followers of The Way, especially in the letters of St. Paul, they began to realize that they were expanding the traditional Jewish view of monotheism so as to include the person of Jesus and later the Holy Spirit as separate aspects of God. Note that the concept of the Spirit of God was not unknown to the Jews. In fact, the Spirit, or Breath, of God is cited often in the Old Testament. The Spirit is just not viewed in the same fashion as we see Him. But the result of this was that the Jewish Synod of Jamnia, in the mid-80s AD, excommunicated the Christians from mainstream Judaism for two reasons:


first, this expansion of monotheism, and second, the repudiation of Torah dietary laws and circumcision that came with the acceptance of the Gentiles. Therefore, the Jewish Christians in the late 1st century found themselves expelled from the synagogue. So how did this affect the liturgy? During the earliest years of Christianity, the Liturgical ritual was rooted in the Jewish Passover, Seder, and synagogue services, including the singing of hymns (especially the Psalms). Early Christians used and revered the Hebrew scripture, mostly in the Greek or Aramaic translations, later augmented by copies of early Christian writings, notably St. Paul's letters. Most of what we call the Gospel was handed down orally. Over time, as the actual witnesses to Jesus passed away, they also developed their own canon of the New Testament, including the Gospels, Acts, letters of the Apostles, and Revelation, all written after St. Paul's epistles, but before about

120 AD. They also continued to celebrate communal meals in homes, descending from the Jewish Seder, both agape, or love feasts, and over time, the Eucharist, which grew out of the agape meals. They would also share the oral traditions of Jesus and, especially in the communities to whom St. Paul wrote, share the letters. For the Eucharist itself, three of the Gospels, Matthew, Mark, and Luke, tell us what happened at the Last Supper. Each has its own character and style. Plus, they addressed different audiences. So while they are not word for word exactly the same, it is the essential truth that matters. Also, remember that these written accounts are simply versions of the verbal tradition. Paul and the evangelists knew what the early Christians were doing. Bread and wine were brought to the table. The words of consecration were being said at the Eucharistic meals and they wrote down what they heard. But also think of what was happening with

the apostles in those days between Christ's Resurrection and his Ascension. They would listen with a dawning sense of what had just happened and it would have been critical to pay close attention, because of what He was saying. The time was short. Indeed this was a critical time in their understanding of what Jesus taught them. Given the whole story of the Last Supper and what followed, and their new understanding, how could they fail to learn in detail how they were to carry on doing what He told them to do at His Last Supper? Christ knew and they knew that this was to be the very heart of the liturgy going forward. So the formulas given us by the evangelists and Paul were those that were being used by the early Christians as they celebrated the Eucharist. So the Eucharist, using the words we hear today, and the passing on of the Word of God, from what we now identify as both the Old and New Testaments, were there in these earliest liturgies.

Little Sisters of the Poor Sued Once Again. The Little Sisters of the Poor filed a petition with the Supreme Court on Oct. 1 asking the court to once again protect them from the Health & Human Services (HHS) mandate, under the Affordable Care Act, as they face lawsuits from California, Pennsylvania, and several other states. The mandate requires that cost-free coverage for contraception, abortion inducing drugs

and sterilization be included in employer health plans. The Sisters are a religious order of nuns in the U.S. since 1868, dedicated to caring for the elderly poor. Catholic teaching holds abortion and contraception to be gravely immoral. Thus, it violates conscience and religious freedom rights for Catholic nuns or any group with closely held religious beliefs, to comply with this mandate. In 2016, the Supreme Court tossed the Little Sisters case and several similar cases back to their respective courts of appeal for reconsideration. In 2017, the President issued an Executive Order supporting a new rule that would allow the Little Sisters 2019; cruxnow.com, 10/10/19; dailycaller.com, and similar groups to claim a religious exemption



against the mandate. He told the Little Sisters their "long ordeal will soon be over." "Today we are grateful for the president's order and look forward to the **ATHOLICS** agencies giving us an exemption so that we can continue caring for the elderly poor and dying ... without the fear of government punishment," said Mother Loraine. A new HHS rule protecting religious freedom rights was subsequently issued. Yet,

California immediately sued the federal government to take away that religious freedom exemption. Although CA admits that it has many of its own programs to provide contraceptives, etc. to women, 13 other states joined them and are forcing the Little Sisters of the Poor back to court. "It has been six long years since we began our legal battle against government mandates that threaten our ministry," said Mother Loraine.






