

What's Pastor Thinking

"Shhh..." We spent most of our younger life hearing that sound

"Shhh..." in the classroom. "Shhh..." in the library. "Shhh..." on the playground or in the cafeteria although that never made any sense to me! At home, how many times a day does a parent say, "Shhh..?" And now with global lockdown and social distancing the whole world is hushed. For some, its all too much! "Shush yourself Enough. I want the noise back."

Soon the noise will return, but in the meantime we can use this time of quiet and quarantine to listen to what silence might be revealing to you about yourself, about life, about God.

Do you remember another kind of 'shhhh' moment that we looked forward to hearing when we were children. When going to sleep a parent would tuck The spread of the coronavirus has shushed the a blanket around you, lean over and whisper "Shhh, whole world. Silence stills our lives, our hearts and I'm right here if you need me." They wouldn't shush souls to listen more deeply to the words of comfort because you were talking or were too loud, but because they wanted to make sure we heard the words of comfort offered to us. That's the kind of 'shush' moment Jesus has with his disciples in today's gospel. Today he is giving one of those final pep talks we see sprinkled throughout St. John's gospel. He tells them that He is going to be leaving them soon, but that God would send them someone in His place, the 'Counselor' or 'Comforter.' Those words of departure pierce the disciples' hearts as they realize that the One they had depended on, and turned to for support, through so many

difficult times, was not going to be with them for very much longer. What would they do? How would they carry on without Him? What would happen to them, to the movement? Jesus knew what they were feeling. He knew their fears, their doubts, their concerns and their questions. 'Shhh! ... the Father will send another to comfort you and to remind you of all that I have taught you. Now shhhhhh. I will not leave you orphans, I leave you my peace, a special kind of peace the world knows nothing about. Now ssshhhhh, listen, wait."

It wasn't because the disciples were being rude or talking too loud that Jesus had to shush them. It was simply that they might really listen to the words of comfort and hope that He had to offer. and hope that Jesus offers. This is that perfect time to listen to Him.

Dealing with the grief of losing a loved one? Shhh! Jesus offers peace the world cannot offer! Questions about your faith or your salvation? Shhh! Listen, Jesus offers meaning and eternal life! Trouble at home or maybe work or school? Problems with finances? Shhh! God will never leave us orphans. God will send His Spirit. Shhh! Whatever you might be facing now, or whatever you might face in the future, Shhh! God is offering hope and comfort.



Preparation for the Reopening of Public Mass

May 12, 2020

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ.

The Coronavirus has affected society and the Church in ways unlike anything we have experienced in our lifetimes. None of us could have imagined the impact on our families, our livelihoods, and our practice of the Faith. As treatments for the sick and potential vaccines are developed, it is important that we act prudently for everyone's wellbeing, body and soul.

What has the Church been doing?

Hospital chaplains have heroically ministered to the sick throughout this crisis and parish food pantries continue to support those most in need. Your priests have adapted as best they can to the limits of "distance ministry" while struggling to manage the devastating impact on our parishes and schools. Catholic school teachers, administrators and Faith Formation volunteers are admirably upholding standards of excellence while keeping our children engaged online. Catholic Charities is addressing the physical and emotional needs of people around the clock.

We know that there is a hunger to return to public Mass and the celebration of the Sacraments. Pray that this hunger spreads among active and inactive Catholics, so that our Churches may soon be filled and experience a lasting renewal when we reemerge.

The challenges facing us:

Much is still unknown about the virus and how best to deal with it. As a result, many decisions are actually judgment-calls based on a review of the information available. What is known is that the virus is deadly, particularly for the elderly and vulnerable. As of this writing, nearly 75,000 have contracted the virus and over 3,500 souls have returned to God, just within the territory of our Diocese. May our Heavenly Father welcome them and comfort their families. Our hospital systems, front-line doctors, nurses and support staffs were very nearly overrun.

All of this leaves us with an enormous challenge: when and how to reestablish public liturgies in a way that does not irresponsibly place the common good and the health of our people in grave danger. These are serious moral issues. If we can protect the sanctity of human life and the stability of our healthcare system by cooperating with sensible limitations and safety practices, then we have a moral obligation to do so. This is not a surrendering of our right to practice our Faith. It is an exercise of our moral responsibility for the common good. Therefore, we are carefully forming our plan for the reopening of public Mass in consultation with medical experts and civil authorities who share in our responsibility for the common good.

The Holy Mass

The Holy Mass is the sacrifice of Jesus Christ for our Salvation (Catechism of the Catholic Church – Article 3, Paragraphs 1322 – 1419). The Mass unites us to the sacrifice of Christ, the gift of himself to the Father for us. Spiritual Communion, which has been a continual part of the Church's theology through

Saints Augustine, Aquinas, John Vianney, John Paul II and others, has allowed us to remain united to the Lord's Body and Blood, offered daily by our priests, even when we are not physically present or do not physically receive Holy Communion.

Considerations for Reopening

The conditions on Long Island are being carefully monitored and preparations are being made. However, we do not yet have a date for reopening public Masses. Medical experts and civil authorities have urgently asked that congregate gatherings of any size remain suspended until we better understand the risks and how they are managed.

When it is determined that we can gather for Mass with reasonable safety, it will likely involve precautions that will require everyone to make sacrifices. However, the Mass is not our "personal possession". It is a gift from God entrusted to the Church. Therefore, the dignity of the Mass and the Church's liturgical laws must be respected and observed. Certain elements of the Mass can be adapted while others cannot because we do not have the authority to alter them.

Limitations may involve facial coverings or masks, limits on seating capacity to maintain social distancing, changes to the Mass schedule to allow for cleaning, modified procedures for the distribution of Holy Communion, etc. This will involve tremendous coordination between clergy, parish staffs and volunteers, as well as training and preparation. Guidelines and protocols are being developed that will be shared with pastors. The dispensation from the obligation to physically attend Mass will likely remain in place for a time, especially to protect the elderly and most vulnerable among us.

Other Sacraments

The period of isolation has delayed celebrations of Baptisms, First Communions, Confirmations and Weddings. Funeral Masses for loved ones have also been postponed. We understand the sorrow and sacrifice of those awaiting the celebration of Holy Sacraments. Please understand the enormous stress that this will place upon your very limited number of priests, some of whom are older and particularly vulnerable because of health concerns. We ask for your patience, understanding and compassion as your clergy serves you as best we can through these complex and very challenging times.

Our Prayers and our Gratitude

Dear friends, thank you for your prayers and support throughout this crisis. Your parish Church depends on weekly contributions in order to survive and carry on Christ's saving mission. The loss of Palm Sunday and Easter Sunday collections is a serious hardship for the functioning of a parish. Likewise, Catholic Charities, our Catholic Schools, and the Catholic Ministries Appeal all rely on support from the Faithful to carry out their missions. We are so grateful for your dedication, especially during these most challenging times. Please know that you are remembered in my prayers and daily Masses.

The risen Christ has won the victory over death. His grace will strengthen us to carry this cross so as to share in his resurrection.

It's thanks to the generous support of parishioners that St. Aidan's Church and School will continue to serve the people in this area. FAMILY MASS

Today is the Sixth Sunday of Easter. Each week we are continuing to focus on a Word of the Week to provide a simple link to Sunday Mass that families can use throughout the following week during this time when we cannot attend Mass in person. This week's Word of the Week is LOVE. (John 14:15-21) Jesus gives his followers a very clear direction: "If you love me, you will keep my commandments". He then promises to send them an "Advocate," the Holy Spirit to help them live the way Jesus wants us to live and to continue Jesus' work in the world. Keeping rules has a huge learning curve for all children. Parents are constantly trying to help their children to regulate behavior by setting and enforcing reasonable rules. Most children have no problem understanding the concept but they are also very

autonomous at times. They rarely associate following the rules with showing love for the giver of the rules. To help each family member to grow in understanding the importance of following God's rules as a way of showing our love for Jesus, try to establish some clear family rules your family has not already done so. Write them done and review why your family has each rule. If you are just making rules, involve the whole family in making the rules. Hold children responsible to follow the rules. Discuss some of the commandments with the children. Make hearts throughout the week and ask children to write or draw about how and when they followed a particular rule. Have children reach out to others in and out of the family by doing acts of kindness. Have a special prayer time inviting each family member to share how they showed love (or didn't show it) for others. Since May is the month when we particularly honor the Blessed Virgin Mary, say a decade of the rosary together. Create a family LOVE poster and have each person focus on one of the commandments.

Our Second Grade Students!



Before the revision of the Catholic Church's liturgical calendar in 1969 coinciding with the adoption of the Novus Ordo, the Church celebrated Ember Days four times each year. They were related to both the changing of the seasons of the year and to the liturgical cycles of the Church. In each season there were three of them, Wednesday, Friday, and Saturday. The spring Ember Days were during the week after the First Sunday of Lent; the summer Ember Days were the week after Pentecost; the fall Ember Days followed the third Sunday in September; and the winter Ember Days were the week after the Feast of Saint Lucy (December 13). The Ember Days are a good example of how the Church repurposed pagan practices by taking advantage of what people were accustomed to celebrating and using them for a better purpose. The Romans had three sets of similar days scheduled in June for the harvest, in September for a rich vintage, and in December to prepare for the seeding. Repurposing these as Ember Days wasn't as much to remove pagan devotions as it was a way to simplify the lives of Romans converting to Christianity. The pagan practiced had a basis in practicality and was, on that level, a good thing. What was necessary was to redirect the prayers from pagan gods to the Christian God, and add one more set of days in the spring to coincide with Lent. Originally celebrated only around Rome, the practice spread informally throughout the Empire. St. Augustine brought them to England; the Carolingians introduced them to Gaul and Germany. Spain adopted them along with the Roman Liturgy in the eleventh century. Eventually they were established throughout the entire Church by Pope Gregory VII.

The Ember Days were celebrated with fasting (no food between meals) and half-abstinence, meaning that meat was allowed at one meal per day. For those observing the traditional Friday total abstinence from meat, they would observe complete abstinence on an Ember Friday. As usual, fasting and abstinence serve a greater purpose. As the Catholic Encyclopedia notes, through these activities and through prayer, the Ember Days were used to "thank God for the gifts of nature... teach men to make use of them in moderation, and... assist the needy." When the liturgical calendar was revised in 1969, the Vatican left the celebration of Ember Days up to the discretion of each national conference of bishops. In the United States, the bishops' conference has decided not to celebrate them.

Rogation Days, similar to the Ember Days, were days set aside to observe a change in the seasons. Rogation Days were tied to the spring planting. There were four Rogation Days: the Major Rogation, which was on April 25, and three Minor Rogations, which were celebrated on the Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday immediately before Ascension Thursday. Rogation Days were days of prayer and fasting. The primary purpose of the Rogation Days was to ask God to bless the fields and the parish in which they were located. Like the Ember days, the Major Rogation probably replaced a Roman feast, that of Robigalia, which involved an animal sacrifice to protect grain fields from disease. So again, a smooth transition was made to help assimilate Roman converts into Christianity. And, as with the Ember days, the tradition ultimately spread throughout the entire Church. And, like the Ember Days, Rogation Days were removed from the liturgical calendar when it was revised in 1969.

Parts of the world still celebrate Ember Days and Rogation Days, but as the Western world has become more industrialized, with their focus on agriculture and the changes of the seasons, they have become less relevant. Still, they are good ways to keep us in touch with nature and to remind us that the Church's liturgical calendar is tied to the changing seasons, and individual Catholics can, and many traditional Catholics still do celebrate them.



The Readings today, Sixth Sunday of the Easter Season, continue to tell us about the joy that is derived from loving and serving the Lord in a sincere and cheerful manner. However, in order to understand this and find the source of this joy and enthusiasm that the early followers of Jesus had, as well as the Psalmist, we must search a little deeper because when we talk about "Joy" in the spiritual sense, we do not mean the "Ha! Ha!" or the "Whoopee!" kind of joy of the body. Rather, spiritual Joy is a peaceful serenity that fills our being from within.

In the First Reading from the Acts of the Apostles (8:5-17), we read or hear how Philip, one of the new deacons,

went to Samaria to proclaim the Word of God. To draw attention to Philip's preaching, God worked many miracles through him, and many Samaritans were converted and baptized. The joy that was exhibited was not from the miracles or from Philip's preaching, rather, it was from the Spirit of Jesus that they received in Baptism. The conversion of heart and the commitment of Baptism bring the Holy Spirit who, in turn, gives joy, love, peace and many other gifts In the Responsorial Psalm, (66:1-20), we hear the psalmist extol the great wonders or miracles that God had worked in the past through his people who were faithful and obedient to Him. In the end, the psalmist is praising God for blessing him and answering his prayers.

The Second Reading is from the First Letter of St. Peter (3:15-18). In this passage, Peter is telling his followers, and us, that we should share the Good News of the Gospel with anyone who is interested, not with force or domination, but gently sharing with them the great things God has done for all of us. If you need help in doing this, call on the Holy Spirit. He will never fail you.

The Gospel Reading is from the Gospel of John (14:15-21). This is a continuation of the Gospel from last Sunday. The scene is the Last Supper, and Jesus is telling the apostles that he is about to leave them "for a while" but that He would be with them through His Spirit. In this passage, we learn about the Trinity (the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit: All are One yet each has His specific role in God's Plan of Salvation. The "Oneness" of the Trinity is held together by the divine and perfect spiritual love that they share and want to share with us. This is the love that Philip shared with the Samaritans. This is the love that made the Psalmist sing the praises of God.

And this is the love that made St. Peter so brave and bold after the Holy Spirit descended upon him that first Pentecost Sunday.

Does the love of God reign in your heart? If not, pray to the Holy Spirit to help you find this love, joy and peace. Something to think about during your prayer time this week! MFB



"The Constitution Is Not Suspended in Times of Crisis"

"Standing up for liberty is one of our highest priorities, my highest priorities," said AG Barr during a White House conference call with more than 500 faith leaders, including CFFR, in April. He assured priests, rabbis, and ministers that the administration is on guard against overzealous state governments intent on "singling out" religious groups with punitive lockdown measures. He explained that while "Draconian measures" were initially necessary to stop the spread of the coronavirus, they will combat efforts that apply these disproportionately to religious organizations. "Many policies that would be unthinkable in regular times have become commonplace in recent weeks, and we do not want to unduly interfere with the important efforts of state and local officials to protect the public,"

said AG Barr in a memo. "But the Constitution is not suspended in times of crisis." (2)

The Supreme Court has long held that Constitutional rights can be lawfully restricted, to some degree, when emergency health orders are in place. But the line demarcating where one begins and the other ends is a legal gray area.

In a memo to the nation's 93 U.S. attorneys, AG Barr said, "We must be vigilant to ensure its (the Constitution) protections are preserved, at the same time that the public is protected." (3) "If a state or local ordinance crosses the line from an appropriate exercise of authority to stop the spread of COVID-19 into an overbearing infringement of constitutional and statutory protections, the Department of Justice may have an obligation to address that overreach in federal court." (4)

"One example of what Barr is concerned about is how churches have been singled out for different treatment," said Commissioner Gary Bauer, of the U.S. Commission on International Religious Freedom. "Why is it okay for people to gather at Walmart but not at church?" (5)
