




Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults: If you would like to learn about becoming a Catholic, please contact the Religious Education Office. Classes begin at the end of the summer.

Contemplation in Action- learning to find God in real people not in my head

Ah, remember the days when we would write letters. I have been trying to organize a number of piles of paper that have accumulated here and in my personal effects. Fr. Storck exchanged hundreds, probably thousands of letters among himself and his two brothers. Mrs. Thoman facilitated communication among her children by receiving information and producing family updates with carbon paper. The point is not so much the paper, as the time to stop and think, digest and communicate with others. My mother saved everything I sent home for decades; beginning with letters from a week long Scout Camp, to letters from my first decade in the Jesuits.

I was ready to pitch them out, but I had to skim them first. In my letters from the novitiate, I was struck by the Jesuit ideal of being contemplatives in action, and how obvious that was in our early training. I spent six months at Wernersville, living in a religious community and studying the spiritual writing and the Constitutions of the Society of Jesus; all the while working in some local good work. I taught English; having no particular concern for written punctuation or spelling. I also ended up agreeing to be the Scoutmaster, and finding my whole troop grounded when their report cards came out. In the second semester, I worked as an orderly at Little Sisters of the Poor in Baltimore, and Calvary Hospital in the Bronx. Then I made my 30 day retreat and headed out again to minister after Easter in the southwest corner of Virginia.

We had intense experiences of prayer and learning humility in community under superiors. The two orderly experiences provided vivid experiences of mortality and suffering. We were not just having an experience for ourselves, we were providing essential assistance to those no longer able to care for themselves. Prayer and reflection helped in finding God in things I would not likely have chosen to do on my own. The real stretch was living with a Glenmary priest and brother in a simple house with no indoor plumbing or reliable heat. I was sent out to witness to any number of people whom I would have avoided if walking toward them on the street. I took the priest's place at a Baptist Lay Evangelism school to show we were indeed believing Christians. When it came time to put their techniques into practice, they kindly assigned me a non-practicing Catholic family. As much as I got into the methodology, I knew I could not push them to say they accepted Jesus as their personal Savior; given my own experiences. I knew it would be forced and of no lasting value.

That same month I counseled a young man out of necessity, his wife had walked out on him after a violent encounter. I knew counseling patience and avoiding violent acts on his wife was falling on deaf ears- and even more so when the ambulance headed up the street to a young gunshot victim. He had shot himself not his wife. I visited him both in the hospital in Pennington Gap as well as in Bristol Tennessee/Virginia.

Prayer and reflection had not led me to always say and do the right thing, but rather to have the strength to keep trying when I didn't. As I skimmed those letters the other night I was reminded of how different I was by June, from what I had been in September; how much I had found God in the craziest situations. Those letters helped me see the development and the joy I got in telling about what I was doing to learn about God, God's people and the world. Maybe it wasn't a bad thing for my mother to have saved those letters for nearly 50 years, and me to read them for the first time since I wrote them.

Fr. Clifford is on vacation and will return to the office on September 1.
