<u>Fratelli Tutti- Brothers All</u> An encyclical issued on the Feast of St. Francis of Assisi Oct 2, 2020

On Monday, this week, the Gospel was Luke 10:25-37, in which a scholar of the law states the two great commandments:

"You shall love the Lord, your God, with all your heart, with all your being, with all your strength, and with all your mind, and your neighbor as yourself."

Then when the questioner asks about who were these neighbors he was supposed to love, Jesus told the tale of the Good Samaritan and the asked:

Who in your opinion, was neighbor to the robbers' victim?" He answered, "The one who treated him with mercy." One might then ask who then showed loved of God and it would be again the one who treated the victim with mercy. For Jesus the test of discipleship, was not merely words, but actions. (That parable is the centerpiece of Chapter two of *Fratelli Tutti*.

In this letter Pope Francis shows himself to be a follower of Jesus, inspired and focused by Francis of Assis his Papal namesake and Ignatius of Loyola the founder of the Society of Jesus of which he has been a member for sixty-two years.

In the pre- notes to <u>The Spiritual Exercises</u>, Ignatius of Loyola said the **love is shown** more by deeds than by words. (Ignatius of Loyola <u>Spiritual Exercises # 230).</u>

In the Collected <u>Rules and Admonitions</u> of St. Francis, he addressed his followers: <u>Let all of us, brothers</u>, look to the Good Shepherd Who suffered the passion of the Cross to save his sheep. 2. The sheep of the Lord followed him in tribulation and persecution, in insult and hunger, in infirmity and temptation, and in everything else and they have received everlasting life from the Lord because of these things. 3. Therefore, it is a great shame for us, servants of God, that while the saints [actually] did such things, we wish to receive glory and honor by [merely] recounting their deeds. (Francis of Assisi *Admonitions* #6)

If we have the gospels, if we have the example and writing of great saints, why do we have to keep asking how we are to be Christians in the world today? Jesus addressed the people of his day, for whom neither the free market nor Marxism existed, neither did representative democracy nor social media, neither globalism nor nationalism.

Jesus is very clear on principles of love and mercy, but as has been obvious through the whole history of Christianity, His followers have not always agreed on how to live out His ideals and mandates in evolving political, social and economic structures. There are usually two questions. First question is what is the best way to achieve the ideal in the world, often, the common good? That is certainly a perennial question when it comes to diplomacy, economic structures, development and regulation. People of good will might be deficit spenders or balanced budget advocates. They might believe that letting businesses fail makes the good of society greater in the long run, while others would support various forms of assistance to businesses in time of stress.

The Church regularly encourages concern and action in areas of personal, economic and social policy. The Church does not however claim infallibility in how to achieve the common good and protection of rights. This not surprising, all of the great reform movements have suffered division over how to achieve even an agreed upon end. There are always people demanding instantaneous change and others preferring gradualism. There are those who adhere to an ideology and others who simply seek practical means of change.

Annual Parishioner Financial statement – St. Ignatius Chapel Point The purpose of the annual parishioners report is to help those who contribute and benefit from the parish income to understand our real operating expenses and income. A good understanding of parish finance should as much as possible separate out extraordinary income; especially that which was given for a particular purpose. Donor designated gifts and our capital campaign contributions must legally be restricted to their designated purpose. At St. Ignatius Chapel Point that means our Restore and Renew campaign as well as those gifts designated for Restoration but given before the official beginning of the campaign cannot be used for ordinary expenses. In a campaign we need to accumulate money before we can begin to spend it. That would make it seem that we had large surpluses for years and then a sudden deficit. Clearly we do not have regular annual income of over \$500,000 per year. When we begin to carry out the restoration we would necessarily show a deficit since most of the expenses would be covered by gifts that were given in previous years.

The shutdown of public worship took place with about ¼ of the fiscal year remaining. You will notice in the 2018-19 fiscal year, that we had a decrease of about \$30,000 in collection income. The value of our investment dropped about \$10,000 from our previous year. As you know, as the economy was shutting down in March, stock value dropped deeply and quickly. Nevertheless, the total income might make it seem to have had a surplus of income over expenses of around \$200,000. Our campaign only began in March of 2019, but we had received over \$120,000 in designated gifts last year before we kicked off the campaign. Actually our ordinary income should be higher than our budget estimate. More people have begun to use on-line giving, others have continued to mail in donations and Mass attendance and in person contributions have increased.

A report on the progress of the Restore and Renew campaign will follow.
