

The Pope, Parents and the nature of Marriage Parents over the past centuries have dealt with the tensions between love of their children and their children's decisions but the last half centuries has produced tensions that might have existed, but they were seldom spoken. The same sorts of tensions exist in the church. I certainly grew up in a church where you could tell a priest just about anything- without fearing you would be yelled at or condemned. Loved, encouraged, even admonished, but rejected-no.

In 2010 as archbishop of Buenos Aires, Pope Francis had encouraged his fellow bishops to accept some form of civil union for committed couples both gay and straight. Some union that was not marriage, but which gave some legal protections. He did so to prevent Argentina from adopting gay marriage, since he believed, as he does now, that marriage is between a man and a woman. He lost the argument and Argentina establish gay marriage.

In 2018 when Pope Francis was returning from Ireland, he engaged in a very free floating press conference, including his thoughts on homosexuality and parental responses. He encouraged parents to love their children and keep them in the family. He said:

There have always been homosexuals, people with homosexual tendencies. Always. Sociologists say, I don't know if it's true, that in times of epochal changes, some social, ethical phenomena increase; one of them would be this. This is an opinion of some sociologists. Your question is clear: what would I say to a father who sees that his son or daughter has that tendency? I would say first to pray, pray! Don't condemn. Dialogue, understand, make space for son and the daughter. Make space so they can express themselves.

Then, at what age does this restlessness of the child express itself? It's important. One thing is when it shows itself in a child. There are many things to do with psychiatry, to see how things are. Another thing is when it manifests itself after 20 years of age... But I'll never say that silence is a remedy. To ignore a son or daughter with homosexual tendencies is a lack of paternity and maternity. You are my son, you are my daughter as you are! I'm your father, mother. Let's talk! And if you, father and mother aren't up to it, ask for help, but always in dialogue because that son and that daughter have the right to a family and that family of not being chased out of the family.

In an interview in 2019, the Pope said essentially the same things in an interview in response to two similar questions. In between he was asked about the church's teaching which he indicated had not changed, he repeated the traditional Catholic statement about the ideal marriage; a man and a woman.

In 2020, an award winning film maker wanted to make a movie on the Pope, so he sat for a number of unrecorded interviews. The filmmaker was given access to prior Papal interviews including the 2019 Mexican interview. The two answers were presented without the Pope's statement on the nature of marriage.

Thank you also to Emily who prepared them last year and joined the congregation for the evening. This was not first time life intruded on the administration of sacraments at Chapel Point. Prior to 1791, there was no bishop to administer confirmation. Until 1808, John Carroll was the only bishop for the United States from Georgia to New Hampshire. The difficulty of travel among a disbursed population left Confirmations uncertain for decades to come. One can presume there were some disruptions due to the 1918 pandemic.
