First Sunday of Lent

"The Lord, your God, shall you worship and him alone shall you serve."

Finding a village in Lent by opening a door. We are justly proud of the beauty of our church on the hill. I wander through the church from time to time during the day. Sometimes people are looking at the windows, or of the painting of St. Ignatius at LaStorta. It might be an individual kneeling at the statues in front of lighted candles. They might also be fixed not on works of art, but on the tabernacle and the gift of God's presence to us which continues day in and day out through the day and through the night. I meet people from other states, counties and yes, religions. I would say I encounter more of tourists and wandering pilgrims than I do of parishioners.

It isn't that we are less pious or more busy, we are just more familiar. When we think of places to visit, we think of places to stop and think, pray and or soak in beauty, we jump to sights at some distance, ones that give us a new perspective. We forget that we can have that new perspective, in old places, familiar spaces. It is easy to have new wonders staring into the cloudless big sky of Montana, or across the wide deep and colorful Grand Canyon. That new wonder is often just an opportunity to find a place within us that the quiet; helps us discover, beauty, silence or God; to enter into Lent.

In Lent, when we are looking for something new to help us find God, there are lots of places, but we should not forget the one we can find without opening an app or a map. If we were in a small walking village we might stop into any unlocked church for 2 minutes or 2 hours. Yet though we are familiar with St. Ignatius, while we are in a motor vehicle with windows up and radio on, it is just not as natural to pull into the lot and walk across the road as it would be walking along a sidewalk to pop open a door and adjust eyes to the light and ears to the sound.

We can make this a village by slowing down, opening a door and stepping into sacred space. It is true that at this moment from dawn to 3 pm one might hear a worker who is sanding or a lift beeping, but God is even in those sounds.

MORE WAYS TOWARD PRAYER, FASTING, ALMSGIVING DURING LENT

Lenten Guidelines on Fasting and Abstinence Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are obligatory days of fasting and abstinence for Catholics. In addition, Fridays during Lent are obligatory days of abstinence. For members of the Latin Catholic Church, the norms on fasting are obligatory from age 18 until age 59. When fasting, a person is permitted to eat one full meal, as well as two smaller meals that together are not equal to a full meal. The norms concerning abstinence from meat are binding upon members of the Latin Catholic Church from age 14 onwards.

St. Ignatius is sponsoring <u>The Restorers of Mt. Carmel's</u> Lenten Prayer services on three Thursdays in March (the 2nd, 16th, and 30th) from 3 to 4pm in the parish hall. All parishioners and their family are invited to attend. Members of the Restorers of Mt. Carmel will lead shared prayer, readings, and reflection on how these 40 days assist us to walk a little farther in our Lenten journey.

CRS Rice Bowls give meaning to our Lent! St. Augustine teaches, "What you deprive yourself by fasting, add to your almsgiving." Please be as generous as possible to help Catholic Relief Services worldwide and locally. Join our faith community—and nearly 13,000 Catholic communities across the United States—in a transformative Lenten journey with CRS Rice Bowl to support the mission of Catholic Relief Services. Lenten Food Drive Our annual food drive will run through Lent. Food collected will be sent to Wayside Food Bank to feed the needy in our local community. There are paper bags in the back of the church if you need some. Any non-perishable food items are gratefully accepted. Please check the expiration dates. We cannot distribute out of date food. Some items on our wish list are oatmeal (single serve and boxes), ramen noodles, mac and cheese, canned veggies, fruit, canned meat (tuna, chicken), soups, spaghetti sauce and noodles, peanut butter, jelly. We can also use small containers of detergent and bleach. With prices at the grocery stores your donations are even more appreciated. If you'd rather make a monetary donation, checks can be made out to Wayside Food Bank, Inc. Put them in a separate envelope with WFB on the front, place in the collection or mail it in to the office and your donation will be given to the appropriate person at WFB.

Meals and Hope Mobile Food Truck Our parish for a number of years has sponsored monthly meals for those in need for the Catholic Charities/So. Md. Food Bank mobile food truck program, *Meals and Hope*. Pre Covid, ladies of the parish prepared a meal in the parish hall. Once the truck resumed serving meals at various locations, for the safety of our volunteers, the parish has purchased a meal (around \$400) for the truck that So. Md. Food Bank picks up in La Plata from Pizza Hotline and takes to a location in Charles or St. Mary's County. Staffing decline at So. Md. Food Bank after covid and less places interested in sponsoring meals has changed things. They have 2 staff members to cover 2 counties and sometimes are preparing meals themselves, so that has impacted also who and where they serve as well. If you are interested in sponsoring a meal for the parish, please contact the parish office for more information. This is a great way to help "the least of our brothers" with almsgiving during Lent and after.

THIS WEEK IN FAITH FORMATION we are learning about the season of Lent. Lent is a season where we slow down, reflect upon, and commit to our belief in Jesus Christ as our Savior. As he journeys into the desert for forty days, we follow Him spiritually. We make small sacrifices of fasting, prayer, and almsgiving to remind ourselves that the earthly pleasures should not be our worry. We fast to strengthen our souls to cling closely to God; we fast to strengthen our bodies so as to train ourselves to avoid temptation; we give alms to recognize that we are all beloved children of God and we should all be worthy of care. As I prepare to lead my children through this season of Lent, I find myself reflecting on the Shema, which is the first prayer of the morning for Jews. I feel connected to my Savior's faith, and also, I feel convicted to take up my cross, too. I commit to returning to the Lord by having daily conversations with my family members about our faith. We will help each other in keeping our Lenten resolutions. "Hear, O Israel: The Lord our God is one Lord; and you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your might. And these words which I command you this day shall be upon your heart; and you shall teach them diligently to your children, and shall talk of them when you sit in your house, and when you walk by the way, and when you lie down, and when you rise." (Deuteronomy 6:4-7) Don't forget, though, that we are an "Easter people." We may fast for forty days, but the time between Ash Wednesday and Easter is actually forty-six days. Every Sunday is a feast day! May you have experience a Lenten journey that leads you closer to our Lord.

This is one of the first "threshold" rites of Christian Initiation. We mark our catechumens and candidate with the cross of Christ as His own, and we welcome them into our community of believers.
