

Dear Parishioners of Divine Savior and our cherished visitors:

Jeremiah 20:10-13; Romans 5:12-15; Matthew 10:26-33

From this Sunday until the last Sunday of November, we will be reflecting on passages from the Gospel of Matthew. What a passage to start out with! "Fear no one." "Do not be afraid." Jesus assures us also that a sparrow does not die nor a hair fall from our head without the Father's knowledge. Jesus was quite serious when He said that everything we try to conceal will be revealed.

Prior to today's passage, Jesus commissioned the twelve to proclaim that the kingdom of heaven is at hand. He spoke of how they were to imitate Him in seeing to the needs of those who were hurting in any way. Just as Jesus met and dealt with opposition, so Jesus indicated to them that they should expect similar treatment; they would display their faithfulness to Jesus by not compromising the message of God's goodness or by indicating in any way that they would not be clear about their close association with Jesus.

In our world today, we can easily see the significant challenge we face as we ponder how to respond to the many issues pertaining to how every human being is equal in the eyes of God and is to be treated accordingly. We realize that this is one significant issue among many. We pray that we will say with Jeremiah in our first reading that we believe that the Lord is with us and that we entrust our cause to God. We pray that in our collaboration with God we will do our part in rescuing the life of the poor from the power of the wicked.

Hopefully, we can smile when we think about how Jerry wanted to watch how God would take out His vengeance against those who would try to denounce Jerry. It is such a human inclination to think that we can even suggest how God is to treat those who do not respect us or the message of love that we do our best to make known.

This takes us to our second reading. Paul talks about sin entering the world through one man and that through that one man death comes to all. We want to be reminded again that what is in the Bible is a collaborative effort between human beings and the inspiration of the Holy Spirit. We might wonder why the Holy Spirit would allow Paul to blame Adam for bringing sin into the world. We know only too well how people today think that if it weren't for Adam and Eve, we would be living in paradise. We now know that human history extends back into history millions of years before the third chapter of Genesis was written.

Because of our current knowledge and our knowledge of the culture of the time, we realize that what the third chapter of Genesis is revealing is that human beings tend not to be satisfied with the way God created us and provides for us. We want more. We notice that when we become aware of our dissatisfaction with God, it is not something we can keep secret, as our Gospel makes clear. However, at the end of that third chapter, God is portrayed as making clothes for the pair, so God's love will also dissolve any shame or needless guilt we might experience when we botch up things. And this is what we are commissioned to make known in our world today.
