### **PASTOR'S CORNER**

### August 16, 2020

Dear Parishioners of Divine Savior and our cherished visitors:

Isaiah 56:1, 6-7; Psalm 67:2-3, 5-6, 8; Romans 11:13-15, 29-32; Matthew 15:21-28

This weekend's Gospel provides a unique view into the personality of Jesus. During His interaction with a Gentile woman, He states that He "was sent only to the lost sheep of the house of Israel." That statement seems odd, given that several chapters earlier we read that Jesus interacted with an official of the Roman Empire, and did so in what was clearly a very cordial way.

So, what is going on in today's Gospel passage that prompted Jesus to act in the way that He did? Did Jesus have an issue with women, given that He interacted with a Gentile man in a very accommodating way? Is this woman an example of how Jesus could be prompted to change His mind? Was Jesus confused about whether He really was supposed to limit His concerns to the Jewish people? Was Jesus having a bad day? Perhaps He was exhausted and did not want to be bothered. If He was to be concerned only with Jewish people, why did He go into Gentile territory to begin with?

A couple of Sundays ago, when Jesus was caring for a very large crowd, His disciples had suggested to Him that, given that evening was setting in, He should dismiss the crowd. Here again they deal with their annoyance at the woman by suggesting that Jesus send her away; but, Jesus, in this case, says nothing about their request. Was this episode Jesus' way of teaching His disciples, and us, how to deal with people whom we might not consider our responsibility? Or was this a case of two Middle Eastern people interacting on the front running concerns of their day, namely, honor and shame?

The woman begins by honoring Jesus in calling Him Lord, Son of David. Jesus did not dishonor her by His being silent. For all we know, He wanted to see how serious she was about both her belief in Jesus and in her desire to have her daughter cared for. Jesus did not dishonor her when He stated what for Him was a conviction, namely, that He was sent only to the lost sheep of the house of Israel. She in turn retained her honor by repeating her request to have Jesus help her. In the culture of Jesus' day, it was acceptable to express what we would consider an insult in order to see whether doing so would finally shame the woman or be a catalyst for her to retain her honor and not take the insult seriously. We need to keep in mind that Jesus did not identify whom He viewed as children or dogs. For Him, it was a clever quip to see how serious this woman was. The answer came when she did not take personally the opened-ended statement about children and dogs. She was as clever as was Jesus.

What does this episode have to teach us? How can we maintain our honor when people make statements that would otherwise cause us to get defensive or take the statements personally? Or we might ask what the other person meant by a given statement. How can we be as clever as both Jesus and this woman were as we talk about controversial issues of our day? How can we interact in ways that we draw from one another the best we have to give?
