

THINGS TO DO AND REMEMBER

- Select 3 readers, for 2 scriptures and Prayers of the Faithful
- Select 2 people to bring up the bread and wine
- Select one person for remarks of remembrance/eulogy
- Consider designating Divine Savior Church as the recipient of any donations in lieu of flowers, in honor of your loved one (optional)
- Bring pictures/memorabilia 1 hour before the service
- Bring a personal Bible and Crucifix (optional)
- Bring donation to funeral coordinator or office before the service

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Suggested Donation for Funerals:

The Funeral Coordinator will discuss this with the family at the funeral planning meeting. This amount helps to defray the costs of utilities and liturgical supplies and preparations for funerals. If a vigil/wake is held in the church, an additional amount will be suggested.

All checks can be made payable to Divine Savior, and dropped off at the office or given to the coordinator any time <u>prior to the</u> service.

FAQs

- + Funerals are not celebrated during the time of the regular weekend liturgies, nor on Good Friday, but they can be scheduled at any other time depending on the availability of the church, funeral home, and the family's needs.
- + Catholics believe in the resurrection of the body at the end of time. For this reason, the presence of the full human body during the funeral rites better expresses this belief. Although the presence of the full human body is preferred for the funeral rites, cremation is an acceptable option for Catholics. The cremated remains of a body should be treated with the same respect given to the human body from which they came. This includes the use of a worthy vessel to contain the ashes, the manner in which they are carried, the care and attention to appropriate placement and transport, and the final disposition. The cremated remains should be buried in a grave or entombed in a mausoleum or columbarium. The practice of scattering cremated remains on the sea, from the air, or on the ground, or keeping cremated remains in the home of a relative or friend of the deceased are not the reverent disposition that the Church requires. Please see pages 113~114 of the "Through Death to Life" book for more information on cremation.
- + You are encouraged to invite adult family members or friends to participate in the funeral mass as lectors, altar servers, or extraordinary ministers of holy communion. Children ages 8 and up may bring up the gifts of bread and wine, and may also hand out worship aids or prayer cards. In addition, it is possible for one person to speak following communion about the one who has died. This talk should be limited to three minutes, should be written out, and should focus on the evidence of Christianity in the life of the deceased, and what Christian examples and lessons he/she leaves to family and friends. When you meet with our team member, we will walk through all of the planning steps with you, and provide guidelines for this speaker.
- + Some families wish to encourage family and friends to donate to a non-profit organization in lieu of sending flowers. If you opt for this, please consider Divine Savior Church as the recipient of these donations in honor of your loved one.

ADDITIONAL RESOURCES

Steps to Planning the Funeral

Step One: Contact the Parish office to let them know your loved one's name, date of death, and any ideas you may have for the date and time of the funeral services. Consider the needs of any family from out of town who may wish to attend. Also consider the extended time it may take for cremation services to be completed.

Step Two: Contact a Funeral Home or Cremation Service. The parish staff can make recommendations if you wish. Find out if there are any days or times to avoid for their services and availability. Funeral Directors often assist you with many arrangements, including obituary writing, prayer cards, choosing caskets or urns, cemetery coordination, and sometimes offer cremation services as well.

<u>Step Three:</u> Contact the Cemetery or Burial Site, unless this is a service of your Funeral Home. Note any days or times that may be restrictive for their availability.

<u>Step Four:</u> A Funeral Ministry Team Member will contact you usually within 24 hours to set up a time to meet to plan the service and answer the many questions you are sure to have.

Step Five: Talk openly with your family and note any names of people who wish to participate in a special way in the service, and any suggestions for readings or songs. We understand that families come to us in many stages of emotions and grief, and that this quite possibly is the most difficult task you have ever undertaken. We understand the effect of grief and exhaustion can be profound during this time. You may receive many suggestions or orders from family or you may receive none. Anywhere on that spectrum is okay, and our team will help you through the entire process.

Step Six: Meeting with Funeral Coordinator:

At this meeting we will:

- ♦ Confirm date/time/location of services
- Walk through the planning process for the service
- Assist you in the selection of scripture readings, prayers, and music
- Record all the information and give you a copy.

An Overview of the Catholic Christian Funeral

"Christians celebrate the funeral rites to offer worship, praise, and thanksgiving to God for the gift of a life which has now been returned to God, the author of life and the hope of the just. The Mass, the memorial of Christ's death and resurrection, is the principal celebration of the Christian funeral."

(Order of Christian Funerals, #4)

The Catholic Church honors Christ's death and resurrection during the Sacred Triduum as one continuous liturgical celebration lasting three days: the Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday, the Good Friday Liturgy, and the Easter Vigil. In the same fashion, the Church celebrates one continuous liturgy in three distinct Rites for the Order of Christian Funerals: the Vigil, (and related rites and prayers) the Funeral Liturgy, and the Rite of Committal. Each of these three parts is described below.

A. The Vigil Service ("the Wake")

The vigil, normally occurring the night before the funeral liturgy, offers an opportunity to bring the family and friends together in this time of loss to hear God's Word from the Scriptures and sing of our need in the psalms. The vigil is a time to share memories and to find God's strength in the Word and in one another. The vigil consists of hymns, prayers and Scripture readings. The vigil service is frequently held at the funeral home but it may be

possible for the service to be held at Divine Savior, availability permitting. A priest, deacon, or lay person may preside at the vigil service. The vigil may take place with the casket open or closed, or with the cremated remains present.

The typical order of the vigil service is:

Greeting
Opening Prayer
Scripture Reading
Responsorial Psalm
Gospel Reading
Homily
Remembrance (eulogy)
Blessing and Dismissal

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^{**}The recitation of all or part of the rosary may precede or

follow the vigil service, but should not be a substitute for it.**

B. The Funeral Liturgy

The fullest expression of the mystery of Christ's own death and resurrection is best experienced when we celebrate the Mass. The comfort of the Word of God and the spiritual nourishment of the Eucharist help us to continue our own journey in life after our loved one has passed into the next life. The funeral rites may also be celebrated outside of a Mass.

Here is the order of the funeral liturgy:

INTRODUCTORY RITES

Welcoming of the body Sprinkling the casket/urn with holy water Clothing the casket/urn with the white pall Placing of the Bible and crucifix Opening Song

Opening Prayer/Collect

LITURGY OF THE WORD

First Reading (frequently from the Old Testament)
Responsorial Psalm
Second Reading (frequently from the New Testament)
Gospel Acclamation
Gospel Reading
Homily
Prayers of the Faithful

LITURGY OF THE EUCHARIST **

Presentation of the Gifts
Eucharistic Prayer and Sung Acclamations
Lord's Prayer
Sign of Peace
Lamb of God
Communion
Prayer after Communion

CONCLUDING RITES

Remarks of Remembrance (Eulogy) Song of Farewell Final Commendation of the Bodily Remains Recessional

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** This section omitted if funeral rites are not held within Mass. C. The Rite of Committal ("Burial")

After death, the body of a baptized Christian may be embalmed and placed in a casket, or it may be cremated and placed in a sealed urn. Catholics believe in the resurrection of the body at the end of time, and for this reason, the presence of the human body better expresses this belief, which the Church affirms in the rites of Christian Burial. When the choice has been made to cremate a body, it is recommended that the cremation take place after the funeral Liturgy.

The typical order of the burial service is:

Opening Prayer
Blessing of the grave or crypt space
Scripture reading
General Intercessions
Commendation of the body or cremated remains
Lord's Prayer
Closing Prayer
