Palm Sunday of the Passion of the Lord

REFLECTION

Under normal circumstances, we would be holding branches today, recalling Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem, the holy city. While we can't celebrate this holy day together we can virtually recall this holy tradition. It is a bittersweet remembrance because we know that no sooner had he celebrated the Passover meal with his disciples than he was arrested, tried, convicted, and put to death. But Jerusalem is more than the site of his crucifixion. It is also the site of his resurrection. Through his sacrifice we all hope to one day reach the eternal Jerusalem.

We've probably heard the narrative dozens of times: Jesus enters Jerusalem to cries of "Hosanna," but just a few days later the shouts he hears from the crowd are "Let him be crucified!" Isaiah's prophecy, Paul's testimony, and Matthew's account of the Passion echo those who came to believe almost two thousand years ago: "Truly, this was the Son of God!"

What is Palm Sunday without Palms?

Actually, there is a lot to Palm Sunday, also known as Passion Sunday. It begins Holy Week – the most important week of the year for Christians.

In the Passion Sunday liturgy, we unite the triumphal entry of Christ – the anointed one, the Son of David – into Jerusalem with the solemn proclamation of His Passion. Jesus, the anointed Son of David, enters Jerusalem to restore right relationship between God and His people.

At the beginning of the Liturgy, the celebrant reminds us that we “gather together to herald with the whole Church the beginning of the celebration of our Lord’s Paschal Mystery, that is to say, of his Passion and Resurrection. For it was to accomplish this mystery that he entered his own city of Jerusalem. Therefore, with all faith and devotion, let us commemorate the Lord’s entry into the city for our salvation, following in his footsteps, so that, being made by his grace partakers of the Cross, we may have a share also in his Resurrection and in his life.” Therefore, on Palm Sunday, we should understand our participation in the procession of Jesus into Jerusalem as more important than the palms we hold. We are indeed welcoming our salvation!

Read: the Gospel of St. Matthew 21:1-11

When Jesus and the disciples drew near Jerusalem and came to Bethphage on the Mount of Olives, Jesus sent two disciples, saying to them, “Go into the village opposite you, and immediately you will find an ass tethered, and a colt with her. Untie them and bring them here to me. And if anyone should say anything to you, reply, ‘The master has need of them.’ Then he will send them at once.” This happened so that what had been spoken through the prophet might be fulfilled: *Say to daughter Zion, “Behold, your king comes to you, meek and riding on an ass, and on a colt, the foal of a beast of burden.”* The disciples went and did as Jesus had ordered them. They brought the ass and the colt and laid their cloaks over them, and he sat upon them. The very large crowd spread their cloaks on the road, while others cut branches from the trees and strewed them on the road. The crowds preceding him and those following kept crying out and saying: “Hosanna to the Son of David; blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord; hosanna in the highest.” And when he entered Jerusalem the whole city was shaken and asked, “Who is this?” and the crowds replied, “This is Jesus the prophet, from Nazareth in Galilee.”

The Church teaches that palms, olive branches and other greens are all suitable for the Palm Sunday procession. Look around your yard. What green can you use? Hold them as you join in the Palm Sunday liturgy.

Keep your greens in your home throughout the coming year as a reminder of your faith in Jesus Christ, the messianic king, and in his Paschal Victory.

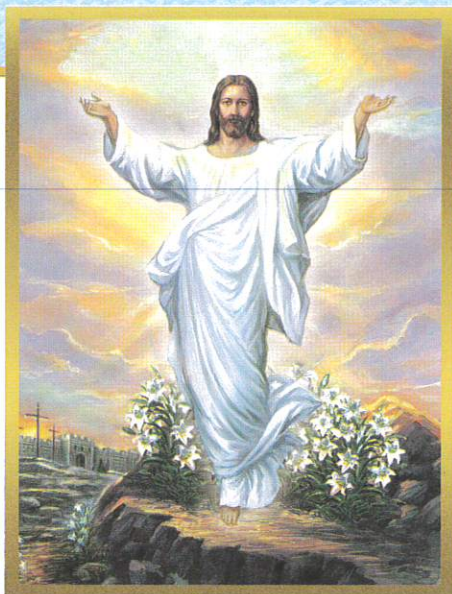

Pope Francis prayed for an end of the COVID-19 pandemic, standing alone in St. Peter's Square on a rainy March 27, and offered a rare *Urbi et Orbi* blessing. An excerpt from his beautiful meditation:

"The Lord asks us and, in the midst of our tempest, invites us to reawaken and put into practice that solidarity and hope capable of giving strength, support and meaning to these hours when everything seems to be floundering. The Lord awakens so as to reawaken and revive our Easter faith. We have an anchor: by his cross we have been saved. We have a rudder: by his cross we have been redeemed. We have a hope: by his cross we have been healed and embraced so that nothing and no one can separate us from his redeeming love. In the midst of isolation when we are suffering from a lack of tenderness and chances to meet up, and we experience the loss of so many things, let us once again listen to the proclamation that saves us: he is risen and is living by our side. The Lord asks us from his cross to rediscover the life that awaits us, to look towards those who look to us, to strengthen, recognize and foster the grace that lives within us. Let us not quench the wavering flame (cf. Is 42:3) that never falters, and let us allow hope to be rekindled.

"Embracing his cross means finding the courage to embrace all the hardships of the present time, abandoning for a moment our eagerness for power and possessions in order to make room for the creativity that only the Spirit is capable of inspiring. It means finding the courage to create spaces where everyone can recognize that they are called, and to allow new forms of hospitality, fraternity and solidarity. By his cross we have been saved in order to embrace hope and let it strengthen and sustain all measures and all possible avenues for helping us protect ourselves and others. Embracing the Lord in order to embrace hope: that is the strength of faith, which frees us from fear and gives us hope."

LORD, HELP US TO WORSHIP YOU WORTHILY

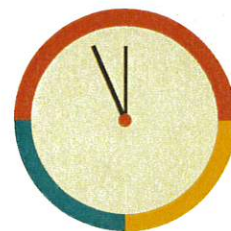


GET DRESSED

Let God put someone's name on your heart and ask for the grace to forgive them.

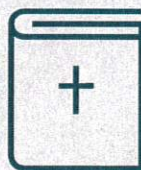

The Corporal Works of Mercy

Jesus taught us to love God, and to love our neighbor as ourselves. To help us understand what this means in our daily lives, our Catholic faith teaches us the Works of Mercy. These are acts of Christian love in which we come to the aid of our neighbor in his or her spiritual and bodily need. The works of mercy that address the needs of the body are called the Corporal Works of Mercy. They are: feed the hungry, give drink to the thirsty, shelter the homeless, clothe the naked, visit the sick, visit those in prison, and bury the dead.

This activity will help you better understand these seven Corporal Works of Mercy and reflect on ways you can make them part of your daily life. Read the scripture passage and match the Corporal Work of Mercy that is best described in that passage.
