

Our Palm Sunday Scriptures



No other Sunday in the liturgical year reflects such dramatic contrast as today. What begins with songs of triumph quickly shifts into remembrance of the Lord's

passion. His royal entrance into the holy city of Jerusalem was also an entrance into the mystery of his suffering, death, and resurrection. As we enter this holiest of weeks with Christ, may our participation in each solemn liturgy draw us into deeper union with him and with one another.

Today begins the first day of Holy Week. Palm Sunday commemorates the entry of Jesus into Jerusalem, where he is proclaimed king.

The First Reading, from Isaiah, is one of four poems that are called "the Servant Songs." Another of these poems will be heard on Good Friday. While these texts are believed to have originated during the exile, the Church sees these words as speaking to the identity of Jesus, the one who has given himself for the life of others.

The psalm refrain, "My God, my God, why have you abandoned me," will be heard in today's Gospel reading from Mark. Since this line also appears in the Gospel of Matthew, Psalm 22 is perhaps one of the best known of the lament psalms.

Today's text from Philippians is often referred to as the "Christ Hymn." Paul uses this poem of uncertain origin to speak of the humiliation and the exaltation of Jesus. Similarities between this test and the reading from Isaiah are self-evident.

Since Mark's passion account is lengthy, involving multiple scenarios, it can be difficult to follow the details of the Gospel. The text opens with the religious authorities plotting to arrest Jesus and put him to death and is followed by a meal in Bethany, where Jesus was anointed, the preparation for the Passover meal, and the meal itself. Jesus' foretelling of Peter's denial, Jesus' prayer in the garden, Judas' denial, Jesus' arrest and trial, and finally his death and burial.

Holy Week is a week for being mindful. We must set loose the baggage of Lent, and not be deterred by the dazzling sunrise of Easter morning beckoning in the distance.

It's okay for us to be excited for Easter. We've waited so long, after all. In my opinion it's one of the best feelings there is: the yearning we have in our hearts for the Resurrection as we embark on Palm Sunday. And in a purely logical sense, many of us have Easter celebrations for which we are preparing, and practical considerations to contend with. It's going to be a busy week, one likely full of happy distractions.

But my friends, we simply must keep our feet on the ground. Let's not "skip" Holy Week. Resist the urge to flip to the last page of the book, to fast-forward to the final scene of the movie. Don't rob yourself of the journey. This week is a blessed opportunity. It is this week that teaches us who we are. In the span of the Triduum, we have the birthday of the priesthood, the institution of the Eucharist, the sacrifice on Calvary and so many other vivid and meaningful scenes.

It may sound strange, to advise someone to savor the moments of Holy Week. There are so many violent and heartrending moments, after all. But this is the valley of tears, remember — we are not in Heaven yet. And here, in our fallen, sin-filled world, it is the heartrending moments that seem to matter the most.

These are the moments that define us as Catholics. Live them. Cherish them. Be present for each one.


St. Elizabeth Ann Seton Award

In 1980, the

The Last (Registered) Came in First


A few week ago, many of you might remember how I asked everyone leaving Mass if they were bowlers or not. My question was simple enough. Alex Adragna was trying to put together a four-person bowling team to participate in this year's Holy Rollers Tournament sponsored by Lynch Funeral Home in Troy. We needed three more bowlers to be a team to represent St. Lucy. Of the four bowlers on the team, at least three needed to be parish members.

With a "yes" from Don Yaklin and John Boudia, and the help of John's brother Chuck, together with Alex the St. Lucy team was the last to register among the 16 teams this year.

The two-day tournament took place at Bowlero Lanes and Lounge in Royal Oak on February 19th and 28th. The 16 teams were cut to 8 at the end of the first round; St. Lucy's was in second place, some 40 pins behind the leader.

The excitement increased in Round Two. Not only did our team bowl well, they were able to overcome their 40 point deficit in Round One, and also pulled ahead by nearly the same number of points to take 1st place and win the \$1,000 prize for the parish!

The trophy is currently in the Parish Offices where St. Lucy's name joins 2022 and 2023 champs Nazarene Missionary Baptist Church and Holy Name, Birmingham as 2024 Holy Rollers Champs. Congrats, Guys!





Thanks for the many kind wishes and thoughtful remembrances as I celebrated my birthday a few weeks ago. To those who offered personal greetings, cards (the crazy one I can always count on from my brother), the heart felt ones, the ones that made me chuckle, the homemade ones and all the greetings on Facebook, along with the treats, small gifts, kind notes, and prayers — thank you.

Seventy is quite a mile marker. At 70, priests in the Archdiocese can take "senior status" stepping back from the daily tasks of parish work. In meeting with Archbishop Vigneron earlier this year, I agreed to postpone that decision for a few years, mostly likely serving until my 40th anniversary of ordination in 2026 and the conclusion of my current term as moderator of our Family of Parishes. At 70 though I am able to begin receiving my pension and also collecting Social Security benefits. Together, those funds will begin to create the "nest egg" for the next part of the journey when the time comes.
